To George, King of Great-Britain, &c. The humble Address of the People called Quakers, from their yearly Meeting in London, the 26th Day of the 3d Month called May, 1716.

E thy faithful and peaceable Subjects, being W met in this our annual Affembly, de hold our felves obliged, in Poiut of Principle and Gratitude, rather than by frequent and formal Address, hum-bly and openly to acknowledge the manifold Blef-fings and kind Providences of God which attended these Kingdoms ever fince thy happy Accellion to the Throne.

And as our Religion effectually enjoyns us Obe-dience to the supream Authority, so it is with great Satisfaction that we pay it to a Prince whole Justice, Clemency and Moderation cannot but endear and firmly unite the Hearts and Affections of all his true Protestant Subjects.

We are therefore forrowfully affected for the Unhappinels of those of our Country-men, who have so little Gratitude or Goodnels as to be uneasie under so just and mild an Administration : Nor can we reflect on the late unjust and unnatural Rebellion, reflect on the late unjuit and unnatural Rebellion, without concluding the Promoters thereof, and Ac-tors therein, were Men infaruated and hurried by fuch an evil Spirt as would lay wafte and defiroy both the Civil and Religious Liberties of these Proreftant Nations.

Aud as God, the Lord of Hofts, has most fignally appeared to the contounding that black Conspiracy, fo we pray his good Providence may always attend the King's Councils and Undertakings, to the eftab-"Aning his Throne in Righteoufnels and Peace, and making His House a fure Houle.

Permit us therefore, great Prince, to lay hold of this Opportunity to approach thy Royal Prefence with our hearty Thanks to the King, and His great Coun-cil, for all the Privileges and Liberties we enjoy. To behold a Pri ce upon the Throne follicitous for the Eafe and Happinels of his People beyond any other Views, to heightens our Satisfaction and Joy, that we want Words to express our full Sence thereot. And therefore we can do no lefs than af-fure the King, that as it is our Dury to demean our fure the King, that as it is our Duty to demean our felves towards the King's Perfon and Government with all faithful Obedience, fo we are determined, by Divine Affistance, devoutly and heartily to pray the God and Father of all our Mercies, to vouchfafe unto the King a long, peaceable and prosperous Reign; and that when it shall please the Almighty to remove from us so precious a Life, by taking it to kimself, there may not want a Branch of thy Royal Family, endued with Wisdom and Vertue, to fill the Throne till Time shall be no more.

Vienna, May 27. Our Letters from Hungary re-late, that the Courier difpatched to M. Fleifhman, the Imperial Refident at Constantinople, for the final Refolution of the Port on the Emperor's Propolals, not being returned to Peterwaradin on the 15th Iditant, General Loffelholtz, purfuant to Orders fent him, has taken Possestion of Mitrowitz, a small Town and Pass on the Save, in order to prevent the Turks from fending any more Ammunition or Provisions up that River. The faid General immediately fent to acquaint the Baffa of Belgrade with what he had done, and that it was not intended for an AC of Holtility, but that it not being decided when the Limits were fettling, to which Party that Place should belong, and the Turks having posselied it only by Connivance of this Court, the Emperor judged he had a Right to fecure it till he should receive a favourable Resolution from the Port on his last Proposition. The Bassa answered, that he would fend an Account of it to the Grand Signior, and that he supposed the Courier had been delayed by his Highness's Journey to Adrianople: In the mean

while he continues to treat the Imperialis civilly. Copenbagen, June 2. Letters from Norway dated the 27th paft, which arrived Yesterday Morning, advife, that the Danish and Swedish Armies in that Kingdom were pretty near each other, the Danes being encamped between Morfs and Frederickstad, and the Swedish Army lying almost in Sight of the lat-ter Place, which they had also begun to invest. It being judged necellary to reinforce out Troops in that Kingdom, Vice-Admiral Gabel is, with his Squadron, actually taking on board 4000 Men in Jutand to transport them to Norway. The Swedish Fleet is retired to Carlfcrona. On the 30th paft Com-madore Schindel, with three Men of War and as many Frigates, failed from hence into the Baltick, in order to fetch home under his Convey the remaining Part of the Flotilla from Pomerania- His Danith Majefty

jefty is expected here next Week. 'Tis faid the Czar's Gallies are to come hither to be employed in a Defcent on Schonen, and that the Czar himfelf will come and command in Person his own Troops which are to affift the Danes in that Enterprize.

Hambourg, June 5. On the 28th paft the Czar and the King of Denmark had an Interview at a Place which they had chosen in the Suburbs of this City for that Purpole. Both their Majesties, and their Ministers, had frequent Conferences the following Days; and on the 3d Inftant they parted, the Czar to go to Pyrmont, the King of Denmark to Pinnenberg, in order to be at Gottorp to Night, and at Copenhagen on the 8th Inflant; where his Danish Majesty will ha-ften the peceffary Dispositions for the intended De-scent on Schonen. 'Tis reported that the faid two Princes have refolved to employ above 20000 Men each in that Defcent; and that the Ruffian Gallies,48 in Number, which failed from Dantzick on the 28th paft, are to transport to Zeeland as well the Troops they have on board, as others which are now in the Country of Mecklenbourg.

Haghe, June 9. On the 1st Instant M. Heems, his Imperial Majefty's Envoy, gave an Entertainment, and made Rejoycings for the Birth of the Archduke Leopold, and the like were continued the two fol-lowing Days. He had caufed a kind of Dome to be built before his Houfe, adorned with Paintings and Inferiptions, on the top of which, Statues were placed that fpouted Wine to the People : A great Hall was built in his Garden, in which were three Tables, where the Deputies of the States, the fo-reign Ministers and other Persons of Distinction, were nobly entertained, to the Number of 64 Per-fons: The Healths of the Imperial Family were drank at the found of Drums, Trumpetal rainly were drank at the found of Drums, Trumpetal rainly were Mufick; Teveral finall Pieces of Cannon placed in the Gar-den fired at the fame Time; and every Night there were Balls, Maiquerades, and Fire-works. The Marquis de Prie is thorely expected here from Vien-The na, to treat with the States-General about some Alterations which the Inhabitants of the Austrian Netherlands are defirous should be made in the 17th and Separate Articles of the Barrier-Treaty.
