An humble Address of Walter Hambleton, Esq; Captain-General and Chief Governour in and over all his Majesty's Leeward Charibbee Islands in America, and of the Lieutenant-Governour, Council and Assembly of His Majesty's Island of Nevis. Also an humble Address of Daniel Smith, Esq; the Lieutenant-Governour, Council and Assembly of the said Island of Nevis. Presented to His Majesty by Joseph Jory, Esq; Agent for the said Islands, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Bayliffs, Common-Council, Clergy, Gentlemen, and other Inhabitants of the Town and Corporation of Bedford. Presented to His Majesty by William Farrer, Esq; one of the Members of Parliament for the said Town, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Kent, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Bedford.

An humble Address of the Mayor, High-Steward, Deputy Recorder, Aldermen, Chamberlain, Assistants and Common Council of the Borough of Colchester, in the County of Essex. Presented to His Majesty by Sir Isaac Rebow, High-Steward, and Richard Du Cane, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Manchester.

All which Addresses His Majesty was pleased so receive very graciously.

Venice, May 29. An English Ship lately come from Zant reports, that Signor Andrea Pisani was under sail towards the Archipelago, with a Fleet of 18 Men of War, and 2 Fireships. The Senate has resolved to chuse 4 Citizens, and admit them into the Body of the Nobility; but they are to pay each 100000 Ducats for that Honour. 1400 Men were embarked here last Week, and sent to strengthen our Forces in Corfu and Dalmatia. The 25th Signor Pietro Emi made his Entry in Quality of Procurator of St. Mark. Letters from Rome of the 23d say, that the Miseries continued in the Ecclesiastical State, and that tho' several thousand Measures of Corn had been lately bought up in the Kingdom of Naples, yet there was not enough to keep many poor People from starving, unless the Rains, which began to fall, should make the Herbs grow, and help to nourish them till the Harvest comes.

Ratisbon, June 11. The Dyet has not been assembled since the 8th, the Ministers here not being thoroughly instructed to proceed on the two most material Points that are at present lying before them, that is, The Assistance which the Emperor desires against the Turks; and, The r coming to some Resolution concerning the Affairs of the North. We hear that the Duke of Wolfembuttel is come to the Court of Saxe Gotha, and it is thought he will proceed from thence to Hesse Cassel. This Journey occasions several Conjectures; but it is generally judged, that it relates to the concerting a Plan, with regard to the Conduct of the Princes of the Empire, in the Business of the North. M. Gergy, the French Minister, having stayed some Days at the Court of Wirtemberg, to execute a Commission there, is gone from thence to Munich, and will now be here in a very short Time. Advices from Vienna of the 7th, speak with as much Uncertainty as ever of the Rupture with the Port. There was not the least News yet concerning M. Fleischman's Courier, and Matters continued still in a peaceable and neighbourly manner on the Frontiers. Count Palfy is to have the chief Command of the Imperial Army in Hungary, till the Arrival of Prince Eugene. Count Caunitz was to set out from Vienna the 7th, being appointed to go to the several Courts of the Empire, to solicit Succours against the Turks.

Copenhagen, June 13. We have had no Post, nor any certain Accounts from Norway for some Time, which causes a little Impatience here. The Prames which lately returned hither from Pomerania, are going to be sent to that Kingdom: There are different Reports concerning the Use they are designed for, the first was, that the Swedish Flotilla could not be attacked without them, but some say the Intention is to ruin, by their Assistance, the Bridge which the Swedes maintain over the Swinsund; others think they are necessary for conveying Provisions to Frederickstadt, which is said to be invested in such a Manner, that unless a Supply of Victuals and other Things necessary can be carried in, there is some danger of that Place's falling into the Hands of the Swedes. The Preparations go on here for putting in Execution the Project of making a Descent in Schonen; the Muscovite Troops to be employed in this Expedition, are expected to come hither by Sea from Rostock.
