The humble Addresse of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, do, with all due Thankfulness to God, most heartily Congratulate your Majesty upon that glorious Success with which your Councils and Arms have been of late so signally blessed.

The Assurance we have that by this Means an End is put to that most wicked and unnatural Rebellion, which in some Parts of Great Britain disturbed the Quiet of your Majesty's Reign, fills us with unspeakable Joy, and encourages us to believe, that the Peace and Quiet which we of this Kingdom have had, and hope long to enjoy, under your Majesty's most auspicious Government, will be happily secured to us.

We shall never be wanting in our earnest Supplications to Almighty God, that his wonderful Providence which conducted your Majesty peaceably to the Throne of your Royal Ancestors, and has hitherto preserved you on it, may still watch over

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Commons of Great Britain in Parliament assembled, with Hearts full of the sincerest Joy and Satisfaction, beg Leave to Congratulate your most sacred Majesty on the happy Success wherewith it has pleased Almighty God to crown your Councils and Arms in extinguishing the late horrid and unnatural Rebellion, ris'd and carry'd on in Great Britain by Papists and perjured Traytors, to deprive us of the incalculable Blessings of your Majesty's most auspicious Reign, and place on the Throne of these Kingdoms a tender bred up in Romish Superstition and Arbitrary Principles.

So wicked an Intreprize, aggravated by the blackest Crimes of Perjury and Ingratitude could never prosper, but has contributed to your Majesty's Glory, by rendering your Justice and unparalleled Mercy equally conspicuous.

May it please Your Excellencies,

WE His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons in Parliament assembled, being truly sensible of the many Advantages we have received from your Excellencies just and prudent Administration, beg Leave to return our most humble and hearty Thanks for the same; as likewise for the several good Laws obtained for this Kingdom by your Excellencies Interposition.

We cannot sufficiently acknowledge the early Care your Excellencies took, and the wise Dispositions you made for the Defence of this Kingdom in the late Time of Danger; nor shall we be ever un-mindful of the just Regard your Excellencies have had to the several Applications made to you by the faithful Commons, whereof we have lately had an eminent Instance in the Promotion of our Chaplain to a Bishoprick by your Excellencies Recommendation to His Majesty, which we doubt not will prove a reasonable Encouragement to the Clergy to exert their Zeal for the Protestant Interest, and His Majesty's Service; but we are more particularly indebted to your Excellencies Justice and Frugality, for having employed so many Half pay Officers in the new Levies, to ease the Charge of the Establishment.

Hambourg, June 23. 'Tis advised from Staden, that the 14th Instant in the Night, the Marquis de Langalerie (who lately engaged to assist and serve the Turks in their Designs against Christendom) was seized there by some Soldiers, pursuant to an Order in the Emperor's Name, and all his Papers and Servants were secured. The King of Poland left Dantzick on the 28th past, and proceeded by easy Journeys through Prussia to Soldaw, the last Town on that Frontier; near which Place, at his entering Poland, he was joined by a Guard of 300 Men, and arrived late at Warsaw on the 5th Instant; since which the Bishop of Cujiva and Velt-Marshal Flemming set out from Warsaw for Lublin, where Conferences between them and some Deputies from the confederated Poles were to begin on the 12th. We have Advice from Copenhagen of the 16th, that Major General Count Sponck and Colonel Mestling were arrived there from Norway, to give his Danish Majesty an Account of the Situation of Affairs in that Kingdom, where there has not been any Action yet between the Danish and Swedish Armies, which continue in their respective Camps near Fredericksstad and Fredericks-Hall.

Brussels, June 24. Count Konigsfegg has published a Placart or Proclamation, in the Name of his Imperial and Catholick Majesty, importing, That all the Subjects of the Austrian Netherlands, who are actually in the Service of France, or in the Service of any Power in Amity with the Emperor, or Neutral, shall continue to enjoy the Benefit of their Estates: But if any, who shelter themselves under that Pretext, shall be hereafter discovered to be directly or indirectly in the Service of the Duke of Anjou, their Estates shall be immediately sequestered and forfeited: That those, who quitted the Service of the Duke of Anjou, and returned during the War, or the Administration of the two Maritime Powers, shall likewise enjoy the Benefit of their Estates; altho' they came in after the Term prescribed by the Amnesty. And as to those who are still in the Service of the Duke of Anjou, or any Power in Enmity with his Imperial and Catholick Majesty; and who returned into the Austrian Netherlands by Leave from the two Maritime Powers, or from the Imperial Minister, if they do not immediately declare their Intention of quitting the aforesaid Service, and take the Oaths of Allegiance to his Imperial and Catholick Majesty, they are ordered forthwith to quit the said Netherlands, and their Estates, Goods, and Chattles declared to be forfeited. On Sunday last Count Konigsfegg, the Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, went into Mourning for the Elector Palatine.

Hague, June 26. The Lord Polwarth, (His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Courts of Denmark and Prussia,) arrived last Night at Rotterdam in the Fubs Yacht, on board

which the Lord North and Gray will embark for England the first fair Wind. Lieutenant-General Lauder died at Dendermonde on the 20th Instant, of an Apoplexy. The Princess Dowager of Nassau-Friseland is expected here in 2 or 3 Days, with the young Prince of Orange, in her Return from Aix la Chapelle. On the 24th the Count de Tarouca made an Entertainment for celebrating the Birth of the Infante of Portugal, to which the foreign Ministers, several Deputies of the States-General, and other Persons of most Distinction here, were invited: The Entertainment began with an Opera, after which the Company were treated with a Collation at 12 Tables in 4 Apartments, and then there was a Ball, Maquade, and Illuminations.
