AT the Court at St. James's, June the 25th, 1716.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Nicholson, Esq; Sheriff for the County of Cumberland.

Westminster, June 26. This Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman-Usher of the Black-Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act to continue the Duties for encouraging the Coinage of Money, and to charge the Duties on Senna as a Medicinal Drug; and for the appropriating several Supplies granted to His Majesty.

An Act for appointing Commissioners to enquire of the Estates of certain Traitors, and of Popish Recusants, and of Estates given to superstitious Uses, in order to raise Money out of them severally for the Use of the Publick.

An Act for the continuing the Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one Sixth of a Penny Sterling, on every Pint of Ale and Beer that shall be vended or sold within the City of Glasgow, and Privileges thereof, for the Benefit of the said City.

An Act to oblige Papists to Register their Names and real Estates.

An Act for repealing so much of the Act of the Twelfth and Thirteenth Years of the Reign of King William the Third, intituled, An Act for the further Limitation of the Crown, and better securing the Rights and Liberties of the Subject, as enacts, That no Person who should come to the Possession of the Crown, shall go out of the Dominions of England, Scotland, or Ireland, without Consent of Parliament.

An Act for the more effectual securing the Peace of the Highlands in Scotland.

An Act to prevent the Mischiefs by manufacturing Leaves, or other Things, to resemble Tobacco, and the Abuses in making and mixing of Snuff.

An Act for the more effectual and exemplary Punishment of such Persons as shall seduce Soldiers to desert, or who being Papists shall enlist themselves in His Majesty's Service, in Great Britain or Ireland, or in the Islands of Jersey or Guernsey.

An Act for holding the Assize for the County of Cornwall, at a convenient Place within the said County.

An Act to encourage the planting of Timber Trees, Fruit Trees, and other Trees for Ornament, Shelter or Profit, and for the better Preservation of the same; and for the preventing the burning of Woods.

An Act for the Attainder of Thomas Forster, Junior, Esq; and William Mackintosh, Esq; (commonly called Brigadier Mackintosh) of High-Treason.

An Act to disable any Person from being chose a Member of, or from sitting and voting in the House of Commons, who has any Pension for any Number of Years from the Crown.

An Act for making the Laws for repairing the Highways more effectual.

Act for the better regulating Hackney Coaches, Carts, Drays, Carrs and Waggon within the Cities of London and Westminster, and the weekly Bills of Mortality, and for preventing Mischiefs occasioned by the Drivers riding upon such Carts, Drays, Carrs and Waggon.

An Act to revive and continue An Act of the Eighth and Ninth Years of the Reign of his late Majesty King William, for Repair of the Peers of Bridlington, alias Burlington, in the East Riding of the County of York.

And two several private Bills.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I Cannot put an End to this Session, without expressing to you my Satisfaction in the Proceedings of this Parliament. The wholesome and necessary Laws which have been passed with so much Steadiness, Resolution and Unanimity, will (I trust in God) answer those good Ends which it is evident you have had in View, by defeating the Designs, and reducing the Spirit of our Enemies; by encouraging our Friends, and raising the Credit and Reputation of the Nation abroad to such a Degree, as that I may reasonably expect the Fruits of a settled Government, especially being supported by a Parliament zealous for the Prosperity of their Country, and the Protestant Interest of Europe.

I am

I am confident, my Conduct hitherto in suppressing the Rebellion, and punishing those concerned in it, has been such as demonstrates, that I desire rather to lessen their Numbers by reclaiming them, than by making Examples; but I am sorry to find, that the numerous Instances of Mercy which I have shewn, have had no other Effect, than to encourage the Faction of the Pretender, to renew their Insults upon my Authority and the Laws of the Kingdom; and even to affect, with the greatest Insolence, to distinguish themselves from my good and faithful Subjects; acting with such Folly and Madness, as if they intended to convince the World, that they are not to be reduced to Quiet and Submission to my Government, by such gentle Methods as are most agreeable to my own Inclinations.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you, in particular, my Thanks for the Supplies you have given, which although they fall short of the Sums you found necessary, and have voted for the Service of the whole Year, yet by the Encouragement you have given to make them effectual, may, I hope, be so managed, as to carry on the Current Service till another Session of Parliament.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I am very sensible, there are Matters of great Consequence to be discussed before you, but as they have hitherto been postponed out of absolute necessity, by me resolving Affairs of a more pressing Nature, and of the most immediate Concern to the Peace and Safety of the Nation; I thought the Season of the Year required I should defer your further Proceedings till the next Session, rather than you should be detained out of your respective Duties longer than could be consistent with your private Concerns.

I cannot doubt, that during this Recess you will all use your best Endeavours to preserve the Peace of the Kingdom, and to discourage and suppress all manner of Disorders; since as the first Scene of the late Rebellion was opened and ushered in by Tumults and Riots, so you may be assured, upon what Pretence soever they are raised, they can have no other Tendency but to support the Spirit of a Faction, restless and unwearied in their Endeavours to renew the Rebellion, and to subvert the Religion, Laws and Liberties of their Country.

I design to make Use of the approaching Recess to visit my Dominions in Germany, and to provide for the Peace and Security of the Kingdom, during my Absence, by constituting my beloved Son, the Prince of Wales, Guardian of the Realm, and my Lieutenant within the same.

And afterwards, the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

It is His Majesty's Royal Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the 9th Day of August next; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to meet here, on Tuesday the 7th Day of August next.

Dublin, June 20. This Day the Parliament of this Kingdom was prorogued to the 25th of August next: After the Lords Justices had given the Royal Assent to several Bills, and made the following Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Session has by many unavoidable Accidents been protracted to an unusual Length, you cannot but think your Time well employed, having reaped the Advantage of the many good Laws His Majesty has been pleased to give you, in which Number the Act for Making the Militia more useful, is a singular Instance of the great Confidence His Majesty places in the Fidelity and Good Affection of his Loyal Subjects of Ireland, and will greatly contribute to the Security of the Protestant Interest of this Kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We are commanded by His Majesty, to return you Thanks for the Supplies you have so cheerfully granted for his Service, and your own Defence, which we assure you, will be apply'd with the utmost Frugality to the Purposes for which they were given.

We must likewise thankfully acknowledge the several Marks of Confidence you have plac'd in us, more particularly your reasonable and unprecedented Vote of Credit, which will remain a memorable Proof of your unbounded Zeal for His Majesty's Service, and an Obligation upon us to continue our best Endeavours for your Prosperity.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Season of the Year is now far advanced, and it is Time you should return to your several Countries, where you will take Care in your respective Stations, to see the Laws duly put in Execution for the Support of our excellent Constitution both in Church and State. We shall only recommend to you, the Continuance of that Unanimity and Resolution which have hitherto preserved you in perfect Tranquility, and will best enable you to defeat the future Designs of your open and secret Enemies.

It is a great Pleasure to us, to see this Session conclude as it began, with all possible Marks of Loyalty and Good Affection to His Majesty; and as we have constantly represented the Merit of so good a People in a just Light, to the Best of Princes, so we have His Majesty's Commands to assure you of his perfect Satisfaction in your Dutiful Behaviour.

The humble Address of the Archbishop, Dean and Chapter of the Metropolitan Church of Canterbury, and of the rest of the Clergy of that Diocese.

May it please your Majesty,

HAVING with Hearts full of Joy and Gratitude, returned our most humble and hearty Thanks to Almighty God for his Deliverance of your Sacred Majesty

Majesty and your Kingdoms from the great Peril of the late unnatural Rebellion; we do, in the next Place, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person with our most sincere and dutiful Congratulations of a Blessing in which we all of us so highly partake, and by which we hope your Majesty's Throne, and with that the future Peace of our Country, and the Security of our Religion and Liberties, are the more firmly established.

That those of the Church of Rome, who by Principle are Enemies to your Majesty's Government, and devoted to the Service of the Pretender to your Throne, should by all Means endeavour to Place him in it, is not be wondered: Their Interest, and their Religion, both require it of them.

That such, as being led away with mistaken Notions of our Constitution, think themselves obliged in Conscience to disclaim your Majesty's just and lawful Right to the Imperial Crown of this Realm, and to use their utmost Endeavours to place it upon the Head of your Enemy; though otherwise professing the same Religion with our selves, should enter into those Measures which their erroneous Conscience persuades them it is their Duty to pursue, is indeed a Matter of melancholly Consideration; but yet the Error they are under, and the Principles they act upon, do naturally account for it.

But that any of the Reformed Church of England who have acknowledged your Majesty's Right, and sworn Allegiance to your Royal Person, and obliged themselves to maintain the Succession in the Protestant Line of your Family, should nevertheless, in Contradiction to all these solemn Engagements, join with Papists and Nonjurors to subvert your Majesty's Government, and with that to overthrow all our sacred and Civil Rights and Liberties, is such a prodigious Instance of Folly and Impiety, that we may Words to express our Detestation of it.

Blessed be God, who has disappointed their wicked and traitorous Designs, and preserved your Sacred Person and Authority from the Destruction they had intended against both! May the same good Providence ever continue to watch over your Majesty, and to defend you against all their wicked Devices! Thus, as it is our Interest as well as Duty to pray for, so we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that it shall be the constant Subject of our Addresses to the Throne of Grace; and that we will all of us, in our several Places and Stations endeavour, both by our Doctrine and good Example, to convince those who are committed to our Charge, that as we may justly expect the greatest Blessings of Peace and Security under your Majesty's most auspicious Government; so should any such Change be ever accomplished (which God forbid) as your Enemies desire, nothing but utter Ruin and Desolation can follow to our Church, our Country, our selves, and our Posterity for ever.

From which sad Calamity that God may graciously preserve us, by supporting your Majesty and your Royal Family, in the perpetual Possession of that Crown which he has, in Mercy to these Nations, placed upon your Royal Head, is the hearty Prayer of,

May it please your Majesty,

And loyal and dutiful Subjects.

Ratisbon, June 25. On the 16th Instant the Emperour's Ratification of the Conclusion concerning Bon, Liege, &c. was communicated to the Dyet; wherein his Imperial Majesty acquainted them, that he had made the necessary Representations as they desired, both to the Elector of Cologne and the States General, for putting an End to those Disputes in an amicable Manner. On the 18th the Dyet agreed upon a Conclusion for an Aid against the Turks, in Consideration of the several dangerous Circumstances set forth by the Imperial Decree of the 19th of March, and of the vast Expence which would fall much too heavy to be furnished out of the Emperour's own private Revenues: They therefore resolve to assist him immediately with Men or Money, by way of a Free-Gift, from which no one should excuse himself, for the better opposing the common Hereditary Enemy of the Christian Name: But as to the Nature and Quantity of these Succours in particular, and where they are to be delivered, they promise to come to a further Resolution as soon as possible. They take this Occasion to make a Compliment to his Imperial Majesty, on his continual Care of the Publick Security. General Roth, Governour of Fort Kehl, has writtne a Letter to the Dyet, dated the 15th Instant, to acquaint them that the Waters of the Rhine being now extremely swelled by the melting of the Snow in the Mountains of Switzerland, had carried away the greatest Part of the Island which covered the Hornwork, and laid the main Sluice intirely under Water, from whence there was Reason to fear the Foundations would be quite torn up; and should the little Earth yet remaining of the Island be washed away, the Hornwork itself could not be saved: He therefore sollicitly again for Money for the Repairs before it be too late.

Vienna, June 25. Advices from the Frontiers and along the Save generally agree, that the War had been published in all the Towns and Villages by a Turkish Officer called Telar, and the People encouraged by the hopes of the Forces coming with the Sultan and the Grand Vizier; that however all, both Christians and Turks, had been ordered to take Arms, and three Men in five to be ready for the Field; the chief Merchants, and others, were to furnish ten or twelve Men each. The Camp which the Turks

were forming on the River Vervas, was not yet 10000 Men, under the Command of the Marokh Bassa; but the Bassa of Bosnia was expected at Baniahuka with a farther Reinforcement of Troops; those which had been lately assembled at Seraglio and Traunitz, were marched to the Frontiers towards Liono, on Notice that the Venetian Troops were drawing together in those Quarters, and committed great Disorders. The Turks unanimously confirm, that the greatest Part of their Forces were in Motion towards Belgrade, but do not mention a Word of the Siege of Zadar. They write from Peterwaradin, that according to the Advices from Belgrade, the Grand Vizier was marching thither with his Army; and that the Aga of the Janifaries was already at Nissa with about 30000 Men, where the Grand Vizier was expected, and the Army was to have their general Rendezvous.

Hague, July 3. On the 30th of last Month the Lord Polwarth set out from hence for Utrecht, whence he will proceed to Hanover, and 'tis said will shortly go from thence to Copenhagen and Berlin. The Princess Dowager of Friseland is arrived here with the young Prince her Son. On the 1st Instant the Deputies of the States General had a long Conference with Baron Heems, the Imperial Minister; Yesterday they had a Conference with the Marquis de Chateaufeuf, Ambassador of France, and another to Day with Mr. Horatio Walpole, his Britannick Majesty's Minister.

St. James's, June 29. His Majesty has been pleased to create His Royal Highness Ernest Augustus, Duke of Brunswick-Lunenburgh, and Bishop of Osnabrug, His Majesty's Brother, Duke of York and of Albany in Great Britain, and Earl of Ulster in Ireland.

On the 22d Instant His Majesty was pleased to invest the Right Honourable the Earl of Southerland and the Lord Cadogan, with the most antient and most noble Order of the Thistle, all the Knights Brethren of that Order, who were in Town, being present.

The Body of Dutch Forces, which came over in the Time of the late Rebellion, are all embarked at several Ports, in order to return to Holland.
