I am confident, my Condust hisherto in suppresfing the Rebellion, and punishing those concerned in it, has been such as demonstrates, that I desire rather to leffen their Numbers by reclaiming them, than by making Examples; but I am forry to find, that the numerous Instances of Mercy which I have shewn, have had no other Essets, than to encourage the Fastion of the Pretender, to renew their Insults upon my Authority and the Laws of the Kingdom; and even to affect, with the greatest Infolence, to distinguish themselves from my good lind faithful Subjects; afting with such Folly and Madness, as if they intended to convince the World, that they are not to be reduced to Quiet and Submission to my Government, by such gentle Methods as are most agreeable to my own Inclinations.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you, in particular, my Thanks for the Supplies you have given, which although they fall short of the Sums you found necessity, and have voted for the Service of the whole Year, yet by the Encouragement you have given to make them effestual, may, I hope, be so managed, as to car y on the Current Service till another Session of Par liament.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I am very schistibe, thirt are Marters of great Consequence still depe ding before y u, but it they have hube to been jost, oned our of absolute sec f sity, by introcuing Affairs of a more pessity Na ture, and of the most im nediate Concern to the Peace and Safety of the Wa ion; I thought the Sesson of the Year required I should defer your further Proce dings til the next Session, rather than you should be d. ained out of your respective ountries longer thin could be confishent with your private Cincenns.

I cannot doubt, that during this Recess you will all use your bist Endeavours to preserve the Peuce of the Kingd m, and to discourage and suppress all manner of Disorders; since as the first Scene of the late Rebillion was opened and usbered in by Tumules and Riots, so you may be ussured, apon what Pretence soever they are raised, they can have no other Tendercy but to support the Spirit of a Padion, restless and unwearied in their Endeavours to renew the Rebellion, and to subvert the Religion, Laws and Liberties of their Country.

I design to make Use of the approaching Recess to visit my Dominions in Germany, and to provide for the Peace and Security of the Kingdom, during my Absence, by constituting my beloved Son, the Prince of Walca, Guardian of the

Realm, and my Lieutenant within the fame.

And afterwards, the Lord Chancelios, by His Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords and Gentlemen.

It is His Mayesty's Royal Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogned to Tuefday the 9th Day of August next; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to meet here, on Tuesday the 7th Day of August next.

Dublin, June 20. This Day the Parliament of this Kingdom was prorogued to the 25th of August next: After the Lords Justices had given the Royal Affent to several Bills, and made the following Speech to both Houses.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

"HO' the Session has by many unavoidable Accidents been protracted to an unusual Length, you cannot but think your Time well imployed, having reaped-the Advantage of the many good Laws his Majesty has been pleased to give you, in which Number the Act for Making the Militia more useful, is a singular Instance of the great Confidence His Majesty places in the Fidelity and Good Affection of his Loyal Subjects of Treland, and will greatly contribute to the Security of the Protestant Interest of this Kinggous:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We are commanded by His Majesty, to reduch you Thanks for the Supplies you have to chearfully granted for his Service, and your own Defence, which we affure you, will be apply'd with the utmost Frugality to the Purpoles for which they were given.

We must likewise thankfully acknowledge the feveral Milks of Confidence you have placed in us, more particularly your sealonwill remain a memorable Proof of your unbounded Zeal for His Majesty's Service, and an Obligation alpon us to continue our best

Endeavours for your Prosperity.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Scason of the Year is now far facvanced, and it is Time you should return zoo your several Countries, where you will take Care in your respective Stations, to see the Livis duly put in Execution for the Support of our excellent Constitution both in Church and State. We shall only recommend to you, the Continuance of that Unanimity and Relolution which have hitherto preferved you in persect Tranquility, and will best enable you to defeat the future Designs of your open and secret Enemies.

It is a great Pleasure to us, to see this Selfion conclude as it began, with all possible Marks of Loyalty and Good Affection to His Majesty; and as we have constantly reprefented the Merit of so good a People in a just Light, to the Best of Princes, so we have His Majesty's Commands to assure you of his perfect Satisfaction in your Dutiful Behaviour.
