**T**HE following Address to His Majesty having been transmitted from Ireland, has been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, one of the Lords Justices of that Kingdom.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Dublin, at a Quarter Sessions held at Killmainham for the said County, the 12th of July, 1716.

May it please your Majesty,

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Dublin, with Hearts truly sensible of the Dangers we escaped by your Majesty's happy and seasonable Accession to the Crowns of these Realms, and of the Blessings we have ever since enjoyed under your just and mild Administration, do humbly beg Leave to Congratulate your Majesty upon the Suppression of the unnatural Rebellion, begun and carried on in Great Britain by Papists and Persons who call themselves Protestants, yet endeavour to support the Cause of a Popish Pretender, in Violation of the most sacred Oaths and solemn Obligations.

Your Protestant Subjects in this County, who in the Time of Tryal distinguish'd their Zeal for the Succession of the Crown in Your Royal House, readily lay hold of the first Opportunity of their meeting together since the Reduction of the Rebels, to express, in the most publick manner, their sincere and unfeigned Satisfaction for the Success of Your Majesty's Counsels and Arms.

Our Abhorrence of the Practices and Designs of those Traitors, is not less than our Affection and Loyalty to Your Majesty; and we humbly beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, That we will, with the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, oppose the Enemies of Your Government; and, to the utmost of our Power, support Your most just and undoubted Title to the Crowns of these Realms.

Which Address His Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously.

*Genoa, July 28.* The Electoral Prince of Bavaria arrived here on the 16th Instant, and had four of our Nobility deputed on purpose to attend him during his Stay. The two first Nights he passed at a general Meeting of the Genouese Ladies, and the five last Nights at Balls, the last of which was on the Sea. For this Entertainment a kind of Theatre was erected on 8 great Lighters, and splendidly adorned; most of the Nobility were there; the Ball continued till Day, when the Prince coming ashore went away Post for Milan. On the 26th arrived here Sig. Mari with 6 Spanish Men of War, and to Morrow or next Day they are to proceed to joyn the Pope's Ships and Gallies, and act with the Venetian Fleet against the Turks.

*Venice, Aug. 1.* On the 26th of last Month we received by the way of Otranto, Letters from our Fleet dated the 16th, which advise, that since the Engagement on the 8th there had not been any Action, because of a Calm the next Day, after which the Wind turned contrary. The Turkish Fleet lay near Butrinto, repairing the Damage they suffered in the Fight on the 8th. In the mean time they had begun to land Troops on the Island of Corfu, and were continuing it, being observed at distance by our Fleet, which waited only for a fair Wind to bear down upon the Turks and attack them. Our Gallies and other light Vessels which had lain for some Days near the Island of Merlere expecting the Auxiliary Ships of War, are returned to Corfu with the Man of War called the Triumphant Lyon, and the Transports which went from hence under her Convoy, there to land the Troops and Provisions with which they were laden. General Schulenburg was making all necessary Dispositions for the Defence of the Town of Corfu. One of our Men of War, called the Holy League, with a good Number of Transports having on board Troops and Ammunition, sailed this Week for Corfu; being preceded by a light Vessel to get Intelligence of the Station in which the Enemy keep. In the Fight on the 8th our Loss was inconsiderable, no Person of Distinction being killed, except two Gentlemen of the Family of Cornaro.

*Vienna, Aug. 1.* Prince Emanuel of Portugal has passed thro' this City incognito, in the Way to Hungary, to make the Campaign with

with Prince Eugene, to whom the Emperor has dispatched an Express, with Orders to begin Hostilities against the Turks.

*Rarisban, Aug. 3.* The King of Great Britain has written a Letter to the Dyet, notifying that he has recalled from hence his Minister, Mr. Whitworth, who having received his Credentials and Instructions to go to the Court of Prussia, in the Quality of His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, will set out Post for Berlin on the 6th Instant. Advices from Peterwaradin of the 26th past say, the Turkish Army was fully assembled at Belgrade, and the Grand Vizier was expected there the same Day. After they had refreshed themselves a little, 'twas said they would pass the Save, and post themselves in the old Trenches at Semlin; in the mean Time the Imperial Army was very quiet, and Prince Eugene's Designs intirely a Secret.

*Hambourg, Aug. 11.* Letters from Copenhagen advise, that on the 3d Instant the Lord Polwarth, Envoy Extraordinary of His Britannick Majesty, had a private Audience of the King of Denmark. The Preparations for the Descent on Schonen were continued with the greatest Application; the Czar had been in one of his Frigates to view the Coast of that Province, and 'twas reckoned that by the 20th Instant the Troops would all be ready for that Expedition. The Danish and Russian Fleets were preparing to put to Sea, as were also the British and Dutch Squadrons to proceed with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy into the Baltick.

*Brussels, Aug. 12.* Monsieur Jaupain, Director General of the Posts, returned to this Town on Saturday Night last from Vienna. By the Account he gives, we expect that the Marquis de Prié is now on his Journey to the Hague. The Count de Helldem, President of the Council of Hainaut, is appointed one of the Commissioners for the Separation of Limits between the Austrian and the French Netherlands, in the room of M. Thisquens, who is to go to Vienna, in order to serve as a Councillor in the Council of Flanders, which the Emperor designs to establish in that Place, and to assist in forming the Plan for the future Government of these Provinces. This Day the Marquis de Westerloo's Regiment of Horse arrived here from Courtray, in the room of Devenish's Regiment of Foot, which is to continue in that Place, as being more proper for the Garrison-Duty. 'Tis said Count Kiniglegg has received Orders to prepare for his Embassy to Paris.
