Hampton-Court, August 10. THE following Address to His Majesty having been transmitted from Ireland, has been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, one of the Lords Justices of that Kingdom.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty. The humbleAddress of the High-Sheriff, Governour, Grand Jury, Deputy Governours, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, and Gentlemen Freeholders of the County of Cavan, assembled at a General Assizes held for the said County at Cavan the Fourteenth Day of July, 1716.

May it please your Majesty,

W E your Majesty's truly dutiful and loyal Subjects, beholding and adoring the glorious Declarations of the divine Providence, in Favour of your Majesty's Title to the Throne of your Ancestors, beg Leave to express our Joy, not only for the Safety of your most sacred Person, but for the great Deliverance of our Religion, Laws and Liberties, from the open Violence of Rebels, made desperate by their own Guilt, and the se-cret Villany of disguised and disappointed

We your Maj sty's Subjects in this Kingdom have long felt and struggled with the Virulence and Hatred which Papists have shewn to your Person and Government; but that Protestants and Englishmen should joyn with them in the Ruin of the Protestant Interest of Europe, the Destruction of our holy Church, and the Subversion of our Laws; that Britons professing the reformed Faith, Men born free and happy, should joyn with Rome in the Cause of Slavery and Oppresfion, is so wonderful, so unexampled a Pro digy, that it can only proceed from the Infatuations of the Devil, and shews us evidently, that Rebellion is as the Sin of Witch-

As for us, tho' the least and meanest of your Majesty's Subjects, it has ever been our Glory to have stood in the Gap against Popery and Tyranny; and as there are few among us who have not seen either the Blood of our Parents and Friends, or the Loss and Forfeiture of our Liberties and Estates sacrificed to the implacable Violence of a Popish Government; so we beg your Majesty to believe, that we will rather dye bravely in the Field, with our Swords in our Hands, defending all that is dear to Britons and Protestants, than submit to the Government, or own the Title of a Creature who has joyned to the religious Hatred of a bigotted Papist, the Revenge and Cruelty of an Outlaw.

To conclude all, may the good and just God crown all your Majesty's great Designs, and send you back to your British Subjects

loaden with Honour and Success; may he continue to bless protect and prosper your most sacred Person, and that happy Consti-tution and Faith of which your Majesty 18, and ever has been, the Ornan ent and Bulwark against the Malice of it and y ur Enemiest and the Engines of Rome; may his most excellent Royal Highness and hopeful Issue, (that gives us so indearing a Prospect of Peace and Happinels) succeed, and, if possible, excel your Majesty in all the great and glorious Vertues that adorn your Person and Reign; may your Ministry go on in raising their Country to the same glorique Heights of Honour and Power from which it was once to poorly fallen; may Religion no longer be turned into Rebellion, and Faith into Faction; may your Majesty's most gracious Mercy be no more abused by ungrateful Rebels and perjured Traitors; and may your Majesty's Sweetness and Clemency seek in vain for new Offenders to pardon; may the Eyes of your deluded People be open to behold their true Interest; and lastly, may no false or mistaken Son of our Church be found on one Side, whilst the Providence of the Almighty is every Day prospering the Counsels and Arms of the other. Vienna, Aug. 8. On Thursday the 6th Instant arrived a Courier from the Army, with an Account, that on the 2d Prince Eugene fent a Detachment of about 700 Horse, with some Hussars, to take a View of the Enemy; but lest they should be surprized and over-power'd, 2 Regiments of Horle were added to that Detachment, and the Command of it was given to General Palfi, with Order not to attempt any thing, but to retire affoon as he should see the Enemy advance against him. General marched directly towards Peterwardin, but at passing out of a Desilé, he was surprized to see all the Enemy's Horse drawn up in Battalia: They immediately charged him with Vigour, so that about 3000 Horse were obliged to defend themselves for 4 Hours against the greatest part of the Turkish Cavalry. Night coming on, General Palsi retired, with the Lois of near 400 Men; having had his Horse shot under him, and his Aide de Camp, his Page, and Two Grooms, killed by his fide. The Loss of the Turks was not known; but Major General Count Preiner was missing, and is supposed to have been ta-ken Prisoner in the Action. We learn by the same Courier, that the whole Turkish Army was in Motion, to hinder the Imperialists from passing the Danube; so that we hourly expest
