To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the University of Dublin in Congregation assembled, at their Commencement held July 10, 1716.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Vice-Chancellor, Provost, Doctors, Fellows and Masters of your Majesty's University and College of the holy and undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth near Dublin, most humbly crave Leave to approach your Royal Presence with all that Submission and hearty Profession of unfeigned Allegiance, which we chearfully acknowledge to be due to the best of Princes, and our Rightful and Lawful Sovereign: Nor can we sufficiently adore the Goodness of God, who by a most particular Providence has brought your Majesty to sit upon the Throne of your Ancestors, and defeated all the Designs of your Enemies, who by secret Treachery or open Rebellion have endeavoured to hinder or deprive you of it.

It is with all Thankfulness to God, Gratitude to your Majesty, and the utmost Satisfaction to our selves, that we consider and reflect upon your Majesty's great Clemency, as well as Justice, in the Administration of your Government; and, what is yet of greater Concern, your Piety and Affection to the Truth and Purity of Religion, as it is professed and by Law established, in that Church of which we are so happy as to be Members. May your Majesty long continue in the same Manner with Peace and Happiness to sway the Scepter of these your Dominions, and to protect and encourage that Church to which God, in his Mercy to us, has raised you up as a nursing Father.

But besides the just Sense of the many Benefits, which as Christians and Subjects we reap from your Majesty's most auspicious Reign over us, we have yet a more peculiar Acknowledgment to make, as we are a Society dedicated to Learning. It is not without your Majesty's gracious Consent and Approbation, that your Royal Son and the Heir apparent, the Hope and future Expectation of all your Dominions, has condescended, at our humble Request, to become our Head and particular Patron, thereby conferring the greatest Honour upon us that ever has been done to this Society.

In a due Sense of all these Benefits which we have already received, and through God's good Providence yet farther promise our selves from your Majesty's Favour and Goodness, we most humbly take Leave to assure your Majesty, that our Care and Zeal shall

constantly be employed in promoting and encouraging, to the best of our Power, not only the Knowledge of Arts, Sciences and good Literature; but in a more especial Manner, the Principles of true Piety towards God, Loyalty and Fidelity to your Majesty and your Royal Posterity, and Peace and Unanimity amongst your Subjects of all Ranks and Degrees whatsoever. Nor shall our most ardent Prayers be ever wanting, that God would always be pleased to bless your Majesty with Victory over all your Enemies, and with the united Hearts and Affections of all your Subjects; and that after a long Enjoyment of all the Happiness of this Life, your Crown may for ever peaceably descend to your Royal Posterity.

Vienna, Aug. 8. On the 6th Instant arrived a Courier from Prince Eugene, with the following Account of a Skirmish between a Detachment of Imperial Horse, and a considerable Body of the Turkish Cavalry and on the 2d Instant. His Highness having Intelligence that the Turks had passed the Save, ordered out 1000 Horse and 500 Hussars to view them, and Count Palfi desired to be favoured with the Command of this Detachment. Being advanced near to the Desfilés of Carlowitz, the Count perceived some Turkish Horse on the Hills, and sent to the Prince for a Reinforcement of Two Regiments. The Dragoons of Bareuth, and the Cuirassiers of Gondrecourt were immediately ordered to join him; and then he sent again to the Prince, to ask whether he should engage the Turks; but before he could have an Answer, he was surrounded by 40000 Horse: This obliged him to make his Retreat fighting, which he did in good Order, notwithstanding the great Superiority of the Enemy, who left him after a Skirmish of 4 Hours, in which the Imperialists lost about 400 Men.

At Two this Afternoon arrived Count Kevenhuller, Collonel of the Regiment of Visconti, a Volunteer attending Prince Eugene, with the News of a complete Victory obtain'd over the Enemy's Army, viz. On the 3d the Imperial Army pass'd the Danube, and on the 4th in the Afternoon Prince Eugene marched with a Design to attack the Turks before they had Time to intrench themselves: But he met them between Peterwaradin and Carlowitz, coming to seek for the Imperialists, and offer them Battle. The Prince seeing them advance towards him, drew up in order of Battle and intrenched: The Turks did the like within 20 Paces of him. Both Armies continued in this Posture till the 5th about Six in the Morning.

ing, when Prince Eugene attack'd the Turks in Front with his Infantry, while he made his Cavalry file off and attack them in both Flanks. They were soon broken and put to the Rout; They took shelter behind their Waggon, from which they were likewise driven; and about 2 in the Afternoon they betook themselves to flight; abandoning their Camp with all their Tents, Artillery, Provisions, and Baggage. Prince Eugene was in the Grand Vizier's Tent, when he dispatched Count Kevenhuller at Midnight. His Highness had not then determined which way to move to make the best Improvement of his Victory; however, it is not doubted, that if the Bridges over the Save were (as is reported) broken by the Enemy, after they had passed that River, he will give a good Account of the Remains of their Army. As for the Particulars of what has already passed, we neither know exactly the Number of the Turkish Army, nor of the Loss on both sides. In general it is computed, that of the Imperialists 5 or 6000 Men were killed, and of the Turks not less than 30000 on the Field of Battle. General Breiner was found at the Entrance of the Grand Vizier's Tent in Chains, his Body yet warm, and it appeared by the Bruises on it he had been barbarously drubbed to Death. The young Count Palfi, Son of the General, is one of the most considerable Officers on our Side that was killed in the Battle.

Copenhagen, Aug. 11. The Danish and Russian Men of War will be ready to put to Sea the beginning of next Week. The Czar in Person will command the Fleet. The British and Dutch Squadrons and Merchant-Ships will sail in Company with this Fleet up the Baltick.

Berlin, Aug. 15. Mr. Whitworth, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Britannick Majesty to this Court, arrived here on the 12th Instant. The same Day Count Virmont had a Private Audience of Leave of the King and Queen of Prussia at Wusterhausen, and designs to set out to Morrow for Poland, whither he goes with the Character of Ambassador, to interpose the Emperor's good Offices for appeasing the Troubles in that Kingdom. The Danish Envoy Major General Meyer, is now at Stetin, to hasten the 70 Transports which the King of Prussia has agreed to furnish towards the Descent in Schonen. These Vessels being flat built, and proper to carry Horse, will be of great Use in the Expedition; and as soon as they can be ready, will go to transport such of the Muscovite Forces as remain in Mecklenbourg.

Hanover, Aug. 18. His Majesty arrived at Herrenhausen from Pymont this Afternoon, in perfect Health, God be thanked, the Waters having agreed very well with him.
