To the King's Most Excellent Majesty. The humble Address of the University of Dublin in Congregation assembled, at their

Commencement held July 10, 1716.

WE your Majefty's moft dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Vice-Chancellor, Provoft, Doctors, Fellows and Mafters of your Majefty's University and College of the holy and undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth near Dublin, moft humbly crave Leave to approach your Royal Prefence with all that Submisfion and hearty Profession of unfeigned Allegiance, which we chearfully acknowledge to be due to the beft of Princes, and our Rightful and Lawful Sovereign: Nor can we fufficiently adore the Goodnel's of God, who by a most particular Providence has brought your Majesty to fit upon the Throne of your Ancestors, and defeated all the Defigns of your Enemies, who by fecret Treachery or open Rebellion have endeavoured to hinder or deprive you of it.

It is with all Thankfulnels to God, Gratitude to your Majefty, and the utmoft Satisfaction to our felves, that we confider and reflect upon your Majefty's great Clemency, as well as Juftice, in the Administration of your Government; and, what is yet of greater Concern, your Piety and Affection to the Truth and Purity of Religion, as it is profeffed and by Law effablished, in that Church of which we are fo happy as to be Members. May your Majefty long continue in the fame Manner with Peace and Happinels to fway the Scepter of these your Dominions, and to protect and encourage that Church to which God, in his Mercy to us, has raifed you up as a nursing Father.

But befides the juft Senfe of the many Benefits, which as Chriftians and Subjects we reap from your Majefty's most auspicious Reign over us, we have yet a more peculiar Acknowledgment to make, as we are a Society dedicated to Learning. It is not without your Majefty's gracious Confent and Approbation, that your Royal Son and the Heir apparent, the Hope and future Expectation of all your Dominions, has condescended, at our humble Request, to become our Head and particular Patron, thereby conferring the greatest Honour upon us that ever has been done to this Society.

In a due Senfe of all thefe Benefits which we have already received, and through God's good Providence yet farther promife our felves from your Majefty's Favour and Good. nefs, we most humbly take Leave to affure your Majefty, that our Care and Zeal shall

conftantly be employed in promoting and encouraging, to the beft of our Power, not only the Knowledge of Arts, Sciences and good Literature; but in a more efpecial Manner, the Principles of true Piety towards God, Loyalty and Fidelity to your Majefty and your Royal Pofterity, and Peace and Unanimity amongft your Subjects of all Ranks and Degrees whatlover. Nor fhall our moft ardent Prayers be ever wanting, that God would always be pleafed to blefs your Marjefty with Victory over all your Enemies, and with the united Hearts and Affections of all your Subjects; and that after a long Enjoyment of all the Happinefs of t s 1.1fe, your Crown may for ever peaceably defcend to your Royal Pofterity.

Vienna, Aug. 8. On the 6th Inftant arrived a Courier from Prince Eugene, with the fol-lowing Account of a Skirmish between a Deachmei t of Imperial Horfe, and a confiderable Body of the Turkish Cavalry on the 2d Inftant. His Highnels having In-telligence that the Turks had paffed the Save, ordered out J Horfe and 500 Huffars to view them, and Count Palfi defired to be favoured wich the Command of this Detachment. Be-ing advanced near to the Defilés of Carlowitz, the Count perceived fome Turkish Horse-on the Hills, and fent to the Prince for a Reinforcement of Two Regiments. The Dragoons of Bareuth, and the Cuiraffiers of Gondrecourt were immediately ordered to joyn him; and then he fent again to the Prince, to ask whether he should engage the Turks; but before he could have an Answer, he was furrounded by 40000 Horfe : This obliged him to make his Retreat fighting, which he did in good Order, notwithstanding the great Superiority of the Enemy, who left him after a Skirmish of 4 Hours, in which the Imperialists lost about 400 Men.

At Two this Afternoon arrived Count Kevenhuller, Collonel of the Regiment of Vifconti, a Volunteer attending Prince Eugene, with the News of a compleat Victory obtain'd over the Enemy's Army, viz. On the 3d the Imperial Army pass'd the Danube, and on the 4th in the Afternoon Prince Eugene marched with a Defign to attack the Turks before they had Time to intrench themselves: But he met them between Peterwaradin and Carlowitz, coming to feek for the Imperialits, and offer them Battle. The Prince feeing them advance towards him, drew up in order of Battle and intrenched: The Turks did the like within zo Paces of him. Both Atmies continued in this Pofture till the 5th about Six in the Morning, when Prince Eugene attack'd the Turks in Front with his Infantry, while he made his Cavalry file off and attack them in both Flanks. They were foon broken and put to the Rout : They took shelter behind their Waggons, from which they were likewife driven ; and about 2 in the Afternoon they betook themfelves to flight; abandoning their Camp with all their Tents, Artillery, Provisions, and Baggage. Prince Eugene was in the Grand Vizier's Tent, when he difpatched Count Kevenhuller at Midnight. His Highness had not then determined which way to move to make the beft Improvement of his Victory; however, it is not doubted, that if the Bridges over the Save were (as is reported) broken by the Enemy, after they had paffed that River, he will give a good Account of the Remains of their Army. As for the Particulars of what has already paffed, we neither know exactly the Number of the Turkish Army, nor of the Lois on both fides. In general it is computed, that of the Imperialists 5 or 6000 Men were killed, and of the Turks not less than 30000 on the Field of Battle General Breiner was found at the Entrance of the Grand Vizier's Tent in Chains, his Body yet warm, and it appeared by the Bruiles on it he had been barbaroufly drubbed to Death. The young Count Palfi, Son of the General, is one of the most confider-able Officers on our Side that was killed in the Battle.

Copenhagen, Aug. 11. The Danish and Ruf-fian Men of War will be ready to put to Sea the beginning of next Week. The Czar in Perfon will command the Fleet. The Bri-tish and Dutch Squadrons and Merchant-Ships will fail in Company with this Fleet up the Baltick.

Berlin, Aug. 15. Mr. Whitworth, Luvoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Britannick Majefty to this Court, arrived here Day Count on the 12th Inftant. The fame Day Count Virmont had a Private Audience of Leave of the King and Queen of Pruffia at Wufterhausen, and defigns to set out to Morrow for Poland, whither he goes with the Cha-racter of Ambaffadour, to interpole the Emperour's good Offices for appealing the Troubles in that Kingdom. The Danish Envoy Major General Meyer, is now at Stetin, to haften the 70 Transports which the King of Pruffia has agreed to furnish towards the Descent in Schonen. These Veffels being flat built, and proper to carry Horfe, will be of great Use in the Expedition; and affoon as they can be ready, will go to transport fuch of the Mulcovite Forces as remain in Mecklenbourg.
