AN humble Address to His Majesty from the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, and Gentlemen, met at the Assizes held at Bodmyn for the County of Cornwall, the 31st of July, 1716, has been presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, by the Right Honourable the Earl of Radnor, Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

Venice, Aug. 14. By Letters from Corfu of the 27th of July we learn, that 30000 Turks were landed on that Island, where they ravage the open Country, and destroy the Olive-Trees: That they had begun to raise Batteries against the Town of Corfu; and that they are supplied with Ammunition and Provisions from Bucintoro, where the Turks have built Store-houses and Ovens. 'Tis believed the Town of Corfu can make but little Defence, but the two Fortresses may hold out a long Time. Our Senate is well satisfied with General Schulenburg's Conduct: He has about 7000 Men in Corfu, of which 2500 are Militia; but several Transports from hence having on board 2000 Men, were seen on the 3d Instant sailing with a fair Wind to Corfu.

Vienna, Aug. 19. Our Advices from the Imperial Army tell us, among other Particulars, that in the Battle on the 5th Instant, the Janisaries finding themselves very much galled by the Artillery of the Imperialists, fell with great Fury on one of the Wings of our Infantry, and made them give Ground twice; which obliged Prince Eugene, for encouraging his Soldiers, to charge the Janisaries in Person at the Head of a Troop of Dragoons: That all his Adjutants lost him in the Heat of the Action, and did not find him till he was in the Vizier's Tent: And that Prince Emanuel of Portugal distinguished himself very eminently on this great Occasion. Our Army, which lay in the Turkish Camp the Night af-

ter the Action, returned on the 6th to their Camp at Futack, on the Left of the Danube, where they had left all their Baggage. On the 9th, Field-Marshal Count Palfi was ordered with a Detachment of Cavalry, and Prince Alexander of Wirtemberg with some Battalions to march to invest Temiswarer. Prince Eugene is to follow with the whole Army, and will command that Siege in Person, hoping to reduce the Place within 4 Weeks at furthest. This Siege could not have been undertaken this Year for want of Carriage for the necessary Stores and Provisions, had not so great a Number of Buffaloes and Camels been taken from the Turks. The Marquis de Pr e is created a Grandee of Spain, and sets out from hence on the 22d for the Austrian Netherlands. We have confirmed Accounts from divers Places, of the Death of the Grand Vizier; and the Particulars they agree in are, that seeing his Men broken and beginning to betake themselves to Flight, he charged desperately where the Battle was hottest, and received two Wounds, the last of which being a Shot through the Head laid him dead on the Ground; his Body being carried off in a Waggon to Belgrade, was buried there. The Aga of the Janisaries was likewise killed, with the greatest Part of the Janisaries.

Copenhagen, Aug. 25. On the 16th Instant Sir John Norris, with the Squadron of British Men of War under his Command, and the Dutch Squadron commanded by M. Grave, with the Merchant-Ships under their Convoys, sailed from hence to the Bay of Kiog; whither they were followed on the 18th by the Danish and Russian Men of War, under the Command of the Czar, with a Number of Transports. On the 20th the whole Fleet proceeded towards the Island of Bornholm, whence Sir John Norris designed to detach 5 British Men of War, which, with the Dutch Squadron, are to convoy the Merchant-Ships to the several Ports whither they are bound. Yesterday came in a small Galliot with Advice, that the Fleet was arrived at Bornholm, and that on their Approach the Swedish Fleet retired, part to Carlscrona and the rest to Carlshaven: So that the Merchant-Ships may now pursue their respective Voyages with all Safety. On the 20th a Danish Man of War sailed from hence for Norway, having on board Colonel Messing with a good Sum of Money for paying our Troops
