

# The London Gazette.

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Falmouth, Feb. 1.

**T**His morning sailed out of this Port, the *Sampson*, the *Humphrey* and *Elizabeth*, the *East-India Merchant*, the *European*, and *Bombay Merchant*, all Five bound for the *East Indies*, the *Richard* and *John* of *London* for the *Barbadoes*, and several others bound for *Ireland* and *France*: The Five Dutch *East-India Merchant-men*, who have been some time here in Port, expecting further Orders from *Holland* and not receiving any by the Post of this day, this afternoon put to sea to pursue their intended voyage; at the same time went hence the *Hercules* of *Amsterdam* for the *West-Indies*, as is said, upon some new discovery.

The last week about 3000 Barrels of Pilchards were taken near *Fowey* in this County, a thing altogether extraordinary at this time of the year.

*Hambourgh*, Jan. 26. From *Copenhagen* they write, that there having been of late erected in that Countrey, an *East-India Company*, the King, Queen, and several persons of Quality have subscribed towards the raising a stock for the carrying on of the Trade, and that the subscriptions at present amount to One hundred and fifty thousand Rixdollers, that they have already sent out a very rich ship, and that they intend to send out Two more this Summer, hoping in a short time to bring that Trade to a very considerable perfection, and that Monsieur *Ransquou* is to go suddainly upon some weighty affairs to *France*, where he will remain as Envoye Extraordinary from this Crown in the room of Monsieur *Gabel*, lately returned from thence.

Our Letters out of *Pomerania* advise us, that several vessels were lately sailed from *Wisnar* for *Sweden*, in order to transport some Troops that Crown intends to keep this Summer in those parts, as likewise in the Dutchy of *Bremen*, to be ready on all occasions, for the defence and security of their territories in the Empire.

*Lisbonne*, Jan. 9. Yesterday the *S. George*, and the *Ferusalem*, Two very stout ships sailed out of this Port in company of the *Paradise*, a Genoese, for *Cadix*, intending from thence for the *Straits*. The Conde de *Villafior*, who was recalled from the Government of *O Porto*, to which the Conde de *Miranda* is to be restored, lies very dangerously sick, insomuch that most despair of his recovery. It is said that the Prince Regent hath offered the place of Vice-Roy of the *Algarves*, being a Government of great dignity, to the Conde de *Ericera*, but that he for some particular reasons, hath refused to accept it.

*Vienna*, Jan. 27. The 22 instant the great Chancellor of *Hungary* departed from hence on his way to *Presbourg*, where by the Emperors Order he is to assist at the Assembly to be held there for the Trial of such persons of Quality as were engaged in the late Rebellion in *Hungary*.

The 25th instant the Prince *Lobkowitz*, chief Minister of State in that Court, was suddainly taken with a Fit of an Apoplexy, which was so violent, that it is feared it may endanger his life. Some few days agoe returned hither General *Heister*, having reduced all the *Strong places* of *Hungary* under the obedience of

his Imperial Majesty; he likewise brought with him the *Horses*, *Plate*, and other moveables of the Count de *Tekeley*, which were all in their kind extream rich and magnificent, insomuch that the Emperor had the curiosity to goe and see them, especially the *Horses* which were very rare and beautiful.

Here is returned a Courier, after having been long expected from *Constantinople*, with advice, that the Grand Signior had declared that he would not in any manner countenance the Rebels of *Hungary*, or give them the least protection, notwithstanding which, they continue the recruits here for the old Regiments, as not much relying upon their outward Declarations, while they see how vigorously they proceed in their preparations in all parts of the Turkish Dominions against the Spring.

*Paris*, Feb. 14. The report we had here of the tumult at *Bayonne* begins at present quite to vanish. Our last Letters from thence give us this account of what happened there, That some Seamen having by the Kings Commissioners sent down thither to that purpose, been taken out of the Merchants ships to be employed in his Majesties service on board the men of war, that are there making ready, they begun to mutiny, and so put the Town into an uproar, but that the Count de *Guiche* coming thither, what with promises, and what with threats, insomuch they persisted in that insolent carriage towards the Kings Authority so ar prevailed upon them, that they immediately retired to their several houses without further noise or disturbance.

Monsieur *Windischgratz*, his Imperial Majesties Envoye Extraordinary in this Court, continues still here, without any great likelihood of success in his Negotiation: It is said, he hath lately by an Express from *Vienna*, received further instructions how to proceed therein.

The Treaty that was here said to have been concluded between the Princes of *Lunenburgh* and the Bishop of *Munster*, is now reported to be broken off again, the Bishop insisting to have the Garrison, which the Duke of *Wolfenbuttel* hath lately put into *Haxter*, first drawn out of that place, and those Princes refusing to do it till after the Signing of the Treaty; but it is hoped they will suddainly agree likewise on that point and so accommodate the whole matter.

The King hath been pleased to bestow the charge of Introducer of Ambassadors, vacant by the death of Monsieur de *Berlize*, on the eldest Son of the President *Tambonneau*, who in a day or two will accordingly take possession of it.

Here is lately dead Monsieur d'Estampes, Counsellor of State; as likewise Monsieur *Premont*, Lieutenant of the Kings Guard of 100 Swisses, this latter was the 10th instant interred at the *Jacobins* with great solemnity. It is said that Monsieur *Verjus*, formerly designed towards the North, to establish there the French Commerce, is now going in Quality of the Kings Envoye to the Elector of *Cologne*, to offer his Majesties Mediation for the composing the differences which are at present between that Elector and the City of *Cologne*; it is said that the Magistrates of that place fearing an attacke from the said Elector, have taken into the Town 2000 men for the strengthening their Garrison,

Paris, February 14. The first instant, the Princess *Marie Angelique Henriette de Lorraine*, daughter to the Count d' *Harcourt*, was contracted to the Duke of *Cadaval* of the House of *Bragance* in *Portugal*, who to that end had appointed Monsieur de *Lyonne* his Proxy, which was done in the presence of their Majesties and the whole Court at the *Thuilleries*, whether she had been conducted by *Madam de Guise*, accompanied by all the Princes and Princesses of the house of *Lorraine*, that are at present here; The Lady was in an extreme glorious dress, and rich beyond what is usual in Jewels.

The 7th instant she was with the same Ceremony conducted to the Chappel of the *Hôtel de Guise*, where Monsieur de *Lyonne* in the name of the said Duke of *Cadaval* married her, in the presence of *Madam de Guise*, and other persons of the greatest quality about the Town of both sexes; after the Ceremony was ended, they were entertained with a very splendid and Magnificent dinner.

The next day their Majesties were pleased to honour *Madam de Guise* with their presence at supper, which was prepared for them in an extraordinary manner, the whole was concluded with a great Ball, where they continued dancing all morning to the great satisfaction of all that were present.

The 8th was held a solemn Assembly in the great Hall of the *Sorbone*, in the presence of the Rector of the University, the Archdeacon, the Chancellor of *Paris*, and several other of the principal persons of that faculty, where one of the Doctors in a very Learned and Eloquent Speech, declared the Election they had made of *Francois de Harlay de Chanvalon*, late Archbishop of *Rouen*, and now named Archbishop of *Paris*, to the place of Provisor of the said House of *Sorbone*, vacant by the death of *Hardouin de Peresix* his Predecessor, which was followed by a general applause of all that were there present, thereby expressing the satisfaction they had in so worthy a choice.

*Venice, Jan. 31.* By Letters from *Legorn* we are told, That a Vessel lately arriving there from *Alexandria*, the Seamen reported, that the Turks would not permit them to take in their lading there, till they had transported divers Goods and Materials to *Candia*, but that at their return they were paid very doly their freight; they further say, That at their being at *Candia*, there arrived a Chiquis from the Grand Visier, but that the occasion of his coming was not known. This week few vessels arrived here, one from *Corfu*, and another from *Spalatro*, both laden with rich Commodities; the Master of the first says, that General *Bernardo* continues still at *Corfu*, very intent upon raising and perfecting some new Fortifications, to finish which, he was levelling a very high Hill, called *Monte d' Abraham*; the Master of the other reports, that at *Spalatro* the Lazarettos were not big enough to receive the great quantities of Commodities which were daily brought thither from *Turky*, so that the Proveditor had assigned another large Magazine for that purpose.

We have advice here, that at *Alexandria* the Trade increases so fast, that the Magazines are quite filled with Commodities of all sorts, for the account of the Merchants of this place, so that several Vessels are making ready here, which may fail very suddenly for the transporting those Goods hither.

From *Tripoli* they write, that those Corsairs are at present wholly employed about setting out what force of ships they can make, which they intend shall be ready to put to sea by the beginning of *March*: That there hath been lately in those parts a great Earthquake, which hath done very considerable damage to the parts adjacent,

From *Zant* our Letters tell us, That the exchange of prisoners hath been there made with the Turks; that there lately sailed from thence, Two Vessels, laden with all kinds of Ammunition for the Fortresses of *Suda* and *Spina-Longa*, and the other places we hold in *Candia*, and the neighboring places. General *Barbaro* remains still at *Zara*, but we have no further advice how he hath of late advanced in the matter of regulating the limits with the *Bassa* of *Bosnia*. It is here said, that this Senate hath resolved, at the desire of General *Bernardo*, their Ambassador to the Grand Signior, to call him home, but who will be nominated to succeed him in his employment there, is not yet known.

From *Constantinople* we have not any further news, but that the Grand Visier is still laboring how to destroy the Faction of the Sultanel, and in the mean time makes several offers of an Accommodation; what will be the conclusion, a short time may now discover.

A Vessel lately arriving here, the Seamen tell us, That the *Bassa* of *Candia* having been informed of a certain Maltese Pirate, which had of late much infested the sea of *Ostia*, immediately dispatched a Squadron of Gallies in search of her, by which means it is hoped, those Seas may be more securely passed for the future.

They further say, That Three Vessels passing along the *Archipelago* towards *Canta* with Goods, Passengers, and Materials for that place, were in bad weather cast away, the men having been likewise all drowned.

*Legorn, Jan. 30.* The *Trinisia* belonging to several English Merchants, coming from *Constantinople*, and *Messina*, richly laden, was unfortunately cast away near *Civita Vecchia*. We have here a report that the *Orange-tree*, an English Fireship, is foundered in the *Gulf of Lyons*; the Captain & all the men having perished in her; but we hope it may not prove true.

*Madrid, Feb. 4.* The young King of *Spain* hath been these 5 or 6 days ill of the Measles, which hath much troubled this Court, but at present his distemper is much abated, and he in a very probable way of a speedy recovery.

From *Lisbonne* of the 20th instant they write, that the ships in that harbor bound for *London*, and other Ports of *England* and *Ireland*, sailed from thence that day, under the Convoy of a Hollands man of war. That Captain *Trelamny* in the *George*, and Captain *Willshire* in the *Jerusalem* of *London*, departed from thence the Eighteenth instant, the first bound for *Venice*, the other to *Legorn*, and both intending to stop at *Cadix*. That the 17th imported there a small Vessel from *Cork*, which came in company of Captain *Langston* and Captain *Herbert*, who were past by for *Cadix*, with 16 ships more, bound for that place, *Legorn*, *Genoua*, and *Alicant*.

*Genoua, Feb. 4.* Here is lately arrived the *Edgar* and *Genoua Merchant*, with Herrings, under the Convoy of the *Centurion* from *Cadix*, who is since arrived at *Legorn*, with the rest of the Herring-Fleet; it is here said, that the States of *Holland*, seem not much to disapprove the proceedings of this Senate, in forcing their man of war to leave this Port upon his refusal to salute the Castle.

*Whitehall, Feb. 12.* Thursday the 9th instant about Six a clock in the evening, her Royal Highness was happily delivered of a Daughter, to the great joy of their Majesties and the whole Court, especially, considering the great weakness her long indisposition of health had of late brought her Highness to.
