'Tis advised from Tripoli, that A. miral Baker with a Squadron of 5 British Men of war arrived there on the 13th of July, and had renewed the Peace in the Name of the King of Great-Britain, including His Majesly's Subjects on the Island of Minorea.

Stockholm, Aug. 7. By the Advices from Causticiona the Swedish Fleet is taking in 6 Weeks Experisions more; and 'ris said it will put to Sea again by the Middle of this Month; though its Strength is still only 16 Ships of the Line, and 4 Frigates.

Copenbagen, Ott. 3. The Preparations for the intended Descent on Schonen having been protracted several Weeks beyond the Time proposed when that Project was first formed and agreed on; by which Means not only the Season is too far advanted, but the Swedes have drawn together a confine of the project of the Posts of fiderable Army in Schonen, fecured all the Possis and removed all the Forrage and Provisions from the open Country into the strong Towns; and there not being sufficient Magazines provided here, for supplying such a Number of Forces in an Enemy's Country and in the Winter, as were designed, and necessarily must have been transferred from and necessarily must have been transported from hence; it has been resolved after mature Deliberation, to defer that Enterprize to a more proper Season.
