Letters from the Camp before Temeswaer of the 25th of September give an Account, that on the 23d three Bridges were carried on over the Ditch of the Palank. The same Day Count Palfi gave Notice, that as well by some Horles sent out for Intelligence, as by a Party of Husfars who had been driven into the Camp; he was assured that a Body of the Enemy was advancing to attack his Quarter: Hereupon Prince Eugene of Savoy went immediately thither, leaving Order for the Brigade of Maximilian Staremberg, consisting of 11 Battalions, which lay nearest, and were out of Sight of the Besieged, to follow him, together with 20 Field-Piecs. The Enemy approaching between 12 and 1, made a fierce Attack on that Part of the Camp where Count Palfi has his Station; but tho' they returned thrice to the Charge, they were repulsed by our Cavalry posted in the Lines of Circumvallation, with the Loss of a good Number of the Turks, several of them Officers, and with very inconsiderable Loss on our Side. In the Evening the Garrison of the Place made a Sally with Foot and Horse; but some Squadrons moving up against them, they retired. On the 24th Prince Eugene sent out a Detachment of Horse, who returning reported, that they had been four Leagues from the Camp without meeting one Enemy: And by their Account, as well as by the Examination of the Prisoners taken the Day before, it appeared that the Number of the Enemy who attacked Count Palfi's Quarter, was 20000 Spahis, 500 Janisaries, and 7 or 8000 Tartars, who had been encouraged by Money distributed among them to make that Attempt. The Heads of the Bridges, or Galleries, over the Ditch of the Palank, had been damaged by the Enemy's Fire, but were repairing and perfecting in Order to an Assault. The 1st In-

stant being the Emperour's Birth-day, on which he entred into the 31st Year of his Age, was celebrated at Court with all Magnificence. On the 2d arrived here from the Army Count Tierheim, Commissary General of War, to confer with the Council about the Reparation of Winter Quarters for the Imperial Troops.

Copenhagen, Oct. 10. On the 8th Instant the King of Denmark took a Review of his whole Army, which still continues encamped near this City; but in all Appearance they will very shortly go into Winter Quarters, the Russian Troops having been all embarked some Days, and lying in our Road for a fair Wind: They are to be convoyed by the Danish Fleet to Rostock. The Czar and his Consort continue here, but 'tis said they will shortly go to Swerin; where leaving his Consort (who is near her Time of lying in) his Czarish Majesty will take a Journey to Holland.

Hambourg, Oct. 13. M. Pouffin, the Envoy of France residing here, has newly acquainted the Resident of Denmark, that the most Christian King will keep an exact Neutrality, with respect to the Troubles of the North; and that he the said Envoy was ordered to observe such Measures as should give the Danes no Cause of Complaint. Yesterday at the Request of the Muscovite Resident, the Officers of this City siezed Count Wonniosofski, Nephew of Mazepa late General of the Cossacks, who together with his Uncle deserted the Czar's Service and followed the King of Sweden to Bender. The said Count having a Commission from the King of Sweden, has been reclaimed by the Swedish Minister. Baron Kurfzoc, the Imperial Minister here, received Advice Yesterday by an Express from Vienna, that the Palank of Temeswaer was carried by Assault on the 1st Instant being the Emperour's Birth day, the Turks who defended it being put to the Sword.
