Workmen and fufficient Materials being wanting; whereupon a Refolution is taken to buy in Holland, or in other Parts, a certain Number of Ships, carrying from 50 to 70 Guns. The Prefident of the Cruzada is ordered to draw up a perfect Account of the intire Produce of the Cruzada, as well in Spain as in the Indies, and of all the Penfions and Incumbrances that are upon it; the King having determined to apply that whole Revenue folely to the naval Service. On the 13th Inftant the Lord Tinmouth took Poffeffion of the Hondur of a Grandee of Spain, with the Title of Duke of Liria, by covering himfelf in the King's Prefence, being introduced by the Duke of Arcos; to which Ceremony all the Grandees were invited. The chief Officers of the Squadron which his Catholick Majesty sent this Summer to the Affistance of the Venetians, have transmitted hither the Minutes of the Council of War that was held after that Squadron and other Auxiliaties had joined the Fleet of the Republick; by which it appears that our Officers voted at that Time for attacking the Turkish Fleet, and protefted in Form against the different Opinion of the Venetian Commanders. This Day the King figned in Council all the Com-missions of the British Confuls at the several Ports of Spain.

Hambourg, Oft. 23. By Letters from Mecklenbourg we learn, that Part of the Ruffian Troops Thefe are arrived there from Denmark : Letters do not give an exact Account of their Number, but fay they confift of feveral Thoufand Horfe, and fome Foot; and that General Bauer is now marching through the Dutchy of Strelitz to Brandenbourg Pruffia, in his Way to Poland, with those Horse; the Infantry still continuing in Mecklen. bourg.

Paris, Off. 31. By Letters from Vienna we have an Account, that on the 12th of this Month the Turkifh Garrison in Temeswaer hung out a White Flag, and offered to capitulate. Prince Eugene confenting to treat with them, they fent out two Officers, and Count Wallis with another Imperial Officer went in-to the Town: The fame Evening the two latter returned to the Camp, accompanied by a Turkish Officer named Ibrahim Selm. On the 13th in the Morning the Capitulation was concluded and figned. The fame Day all the Outworks, and one of the Gates, were put The into the Poffession of the Imperialist. Turks were to march out within three Days after, with their Arms and Baggage; but with-out Cannon, and were to be allowed 1000 Waggons. On the 13th, at Ten a Clock at Night, Prince Eugene dispatched Count Weermbrand to carry this News to the Emperour; and he arrived at Vienna on the 16th in the The Turks took Temeswaer in Afternoon 1552. and in Violation of the Capitulation then granted to the Christians, put them all to the Sword : 'Tis faid the Garrison have therefore now flipulated, that Reprifale shall not be uled.
