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Madrid, October 26.

THE King has given the Command of the Regiment of Walloon Guards, vacant by the Death of the Prince de Robeck, to the Marquess de Risbourg Viceroy of Galicia; and Lieutenant-General Don Antonio del Valle, is made Governour of Galicia in his Room. 'Tis advised from Cadiz, that four Ships of War are fitting out for the South-Sea, to clear it of all clandestine Traders; which will be of great Benefit to Commerce.

Vienna, Oct. 28. By Letters of the 20th Instant from the Camp before Temeswaer, we have an Account, That the Capitulation made with the Turks had been justly and honourably performed; as many of the said Inhabitants as chose to go out with the Garrison, being allowed so to do, with their Families, and to sell or take with them their Effects. They began to march out on the 17th, to be conducted by a Guard of 500 Horse, the shortest Way to Belgrade in eight Days. On the 18th Prince Eugene, being accompanied by all the General Officers, caused Te Deum to be sung in his Tent, in Thanksgiving for the taking of this important Place; on which Occasion a Discharge was made of 140 Pieces of Cannon. In the Place were found large Stores of Powder and other Ammunition, and of Corn, as also 136 Pieces of Cannon and 10 Mortars. The Jews and Ruffians who were settled in the Town, chose to remain there. Count Wallis is made Governour of Temeswaer, and a Garrison of six Battalions, with a Number of Horse, is put into it. Letters from Buda of the 24th ad-

vise, that the Count de Regal, Governour of that Place, was come thither from Temeswaer, as was also Count Heister; that a Convoy of Provisions sent to the Camp from Buda, had received Counter-Orders on the Way from Prince Eugene, and was returning thither; and that a Bridge was making over the Danube near Fedvar, which would be ready in a few Days.

Copenhagen, Oct. 31. The King of Denmark, who had been indisposed several Days, is recovered, and appeared in publick on the 29th Instant. The Czar, at his Departure from hence, left Directions with the Undertakers of Provisions for the Russian Troops to fill the Magazines for the ensuing Campaign; and 'tis expected his Czarish Majesty will return hither in May next, with his Troops. On the 28th and 29th several Transport Ships came back from Mecklenbourg, where they landed the Russian Troops: The Czar's Gallies had been separated in bad Weather, Part of them being driven towards Dantzick, and the rest towards Lubeck. On the 29th the Squadron of British Men of War lay near Stevens, and the Danish Fleet near Dornbusch, to secure the Trade in their Return from Dantzick. The Troops which were encamped in the Neighbourhood of this City, are almost all marched to their several Winter Quarters.

Berlin, Nov. 3. Letters from Warsaw of the 27th of last Month relate, that the Amnesty on both sides, after very warm Debates about the Satisfaction mutually pretended for their Grievances, was agreed on that Day, and would be signed in Form on the 29th. Six Regiments of Muscovite Dragoons are on their March towards Poland, but they first demanded

demand a Week's Subsistence from the Country of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and as much Forrage and Provisions as will serve them through the King of Prussia's Dominions: As to their Infantry, nothing will be determined before the Czar arrives at Schwerin. The King of Prussia is still at Potsdam, and the Time of his Return hither uncertain. Letters from Dantzick of the 31st past, say the British and Dutch Fleet of Merchant-Men, were fully assembled in that Road; and, Weather permitting, designed to sail for the Sound on the 2d Instant.

Paris, Nov. 10. All the Irish Troops in the Service of this Crown, are ordered to be broken, and incorporated into French Regiments. Orders are also given for a Reform of 17 Battalions, and five Men of every Troop of Horse. The Regent has appointed the Abbot Fleury to be the King's Counsellor. The Dutchess of Bourbon is fallen ill of the Small Pox.

Brussels, Nov. 11. Sunday last being a Day of Thanksgiving for the taking of Temeswaer, and the other Successes of the Imperial Arms against the Turks during this Campaign, the Te Deum was solemnly sung in the Cathedral Church of this Town, under a triple Discharge of the Cannon, and of the small Arms of the Garrison. Count Kinigsfegg, the Imperial Minister, being indisposed, did not assist at the Ceremony. The Cannon were again fired in the Evening, and the Night ended with Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and other Demonstrations of Joy. The Bishop of Antwerp and M. Van den Broeck, Grefier of the States of Brabant, who were deputed by that Province to represent their pretended Grievances to the Marquess de Prië, are returned from the Hague: They report that at their Departure from thence, the Difficulties concerning the Execution of some Articles of the Barrier-Treaty, were in a good Way of being accommodated to the Satisfaction of both Parties.
