ON the 3d Instant the King went from hence to Fredericksburg, and is thence gone to pass some Days at Walloe, seven Leagues from this Place. 'Tis said his Majesty will shortly go to Hambourg, in order to proceed from thence to have an Interview with the King of Great Britain. The British Squadron and Danish Fleet are now at Bornholm: The British and Dutch Merchant-Men are daily expected here, we having had Advice of their being come to Dantzick. A Battalion of the Regiment of Witfelt, which came hither from Norway some Time ago, is ordered to be sent back thither; and a Train of Artillery is getting ready, to be sent, with other Troops, to that Kingdom, as soon as our Fleet returns to this Port. In the mean Time Order is already sent to the Squadron of three Men of War, 2 Prahmes, 4 Frigates, and some Gallies, which have their Station on that Coast, to keep a good Guard before Schwinfund.

Berlin, Nov. 7. Count Golofkin, the Czar's Minister at this Court, has received Letters from his Czarish Majesty dated the 31st past from the Little Belt, whence his Majesty designed to proceed to Lubeck, and stay there two or three Days. He was not arrived there on the 3d Instant, when the last Letters came away; but was suddenly expected, the Gunners having been ordered to be ready on the Walls to fire the Cannon at his Entrance. The Czar has declined coming to Oranienburg for the Interview with the King of Prussia, and desires some other Place may be proposed nearer the Elbe, and not so far out of his Road to Holland, where he designs to pass some Part of the Winter, to inform himself about Gardening and Architecture, in which he begins to take very great Pleasure. Letters from Warsaw of the 30th of last Month, say the Debates the Day before between the King's Plenipotentiaries and the Deputies of the Confederates, were carried so high, that both Parties retired in a seeming Despair of the Negotiation; but came to a better Agree-

ment in the Meeting on the 30th, and the Appearance of an intire Accommodation increased. Here are also Letters of the 2d Instant from Warsaw, which tell us the whole Treaty was concluded, and was to be published on the 7th; of which we wait the Confirmation. It is believed that General Bauer, with his Horse, is already past the Frontiers of Mecklenburg in his way to Poland, the Muscovite and Prussian Commissaries having met at Schwedt on the 2d Instant to regulate their March; and we are assured they will shortly be followed by the greatest Part of the Foot.

Hague, Nov. 13. The 10th Instant being the Birth-day of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, it was celebrated by the Lord Cadogan, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador and Plenipotentiary to this State, with extraordinary Magnificence. His Lordship had, on this Occasion, the Use of Prince Maurice's House belonging to the States, where he gave a Supper, and a Ball, to which the Deputies of the States, all the foreign Ministers, and Persons of Distinction here as well Foreigners as Natives, were invited; and above 700 Persons were at this Entertainment. Baron Heems has delivered to the States a Letter from His Imperial Majesty, notifying to them the taking of Temeswaer. On the 11th the Marquess de Prié having dispatched a Courier to Vienna, set out from hence in the Evening for Rotterdam, in order to embark there for Moredyke, thence to proceed to Brussels.

Brussels, Nov. 14. Yesterday the General of the Order of the Capuchins arrived here from Mons; the Secretary le Roy met him at the Hall Gate, and conducted him in one of Count Kinigsegg's Coaches with six Horses to the Court, where he was received by the Imperial Minister, with the usual Ceremonies. This General, who is 80 Years of Age, made a short Speech in Latin; to which his Excellency returned an Answer in the same Language. He was afterwards conducted to the
