Venice, Nov. 14. On the 10th Instant the Great Council met, and chose Sig. Vicenzo Gradinigo Procurator of St. Mark, on his advancing the usual Sum of 25000 Crowns to be employed in the War against the Turks. A Convoy, with Stores of Provisions, is getting ready to be sent speedily to Corfu. By a Ship from Spalato we learn, that Sig. Angelo Emo, Proveditore of Dalmatia, is at Cattaro; and that our Morlacks make frequent Incurfions into the Country belonging to the Turks, and bring off great Booty. This Week arrived an English Ship from the Levant, by which we have an Account that the Fleet of Men of War of this Republick is in the Archipelago, and the Gallies at St. Mauro. Letters from Rome, of the 7th Instant relate, that the Spanish Bishop of Oviedo, who has been some Time a Prisoner in the Castle of St. Angelo, having upon Examination professed the Opinions of Molinos the Quietist, and persisting obstinately therein, is condemned to forfeit all his Estate and Effects, and to be imprisoned during his Life in the Gaol of the Inquisition. The Prince of Rossano had resolved to raise a Regiment at his own Expence, to give the Command of it to his Eldest Son, and to send him with it into the Emperour's Service. By this means he proposes to obtain his Imperial Majesty's Favour, and to be restored to his Estates of Sulmona and Rossano in the Kingdom of Naples. Two of the youngest Sons of the Elector of Bavaria, are shortly expected at Rome, in order to be educated like Ecclesiasticks, the better to qualify them for Preferments and Dignities in the Church; one of them is already Bishop of Ratisbone. The Abbot Scarlati, Agent of the House of Bavaria, had given Direction for the Palace to be fitted up for them, which their Brother the Electoral Prince lived in during his Stay at Rome.

Vienna, Nov. 14. Orders have been sent from this Court to the Regency at Milan, to supply with Money, and give Passports to all the Spanish Officers there, who are willing to come and serve in Hungary, and to assure them that they shall be provided for suitably to their former Services and Stations. Prince Eugene of Savoy arriving at Raab in his Way hither from Temeswaer, was complimented there, in the Pope's Name, by the Abbot Rasponi, who delivered to him, with the Ceremony used on such an Occasion, the Presents sent him by the Pope. On the 11th his Highness arrived here, was received with the greatest Marks of Favour by His Imperial Majesty, and has since been complimented by all Persons of Distinction at this

Court, on his Return from so glorious a Campaign. Councils of War have been held with him, as well at the Imperial Palace, as at his Highness's own House, in order to the taking effectual Measures for opening the Campaign early the next Spring, by some Enterprize of Importance: In the mean Time the new Levies already begun in this City and Neighbourhood, for recruiting the Imperial Troops, are carried on with extraordinary Success; and Stores of Provisions and Ammunition are providing with the utmost Diligence, that nothing may be wanting when the Season comes for Action. The Princess of Wallachia, Widow of Stephen Cantacuzeno, who was put to Death at Constantinople, is arrived here with her two Sons, Rudolphus and Constantine. The Prince Don Emanuel of Portugal, who in his Return from Temeswaer stopt to view the Towns of Presbourg and Buda, is daily expected here. The Cardinal of Saxe-Zeitz is preparing to set out for Ratisbone, there to reside in the Quality of his Imperial Majesty's first Commissioner with the Dyet.

Berlin, Nov. 21. On the 16th Instant the King of Prussia arrived here from Wusterhausen; on the 18th his Majesty received Advice, that the Czar will not arrive at Havelberg till to Morrow, and has therefore put off his Journey thither to the same Time. But two of his Majesty's Ministers, Count Denhof and M. Printz, were gone before this News came. M. Kniphausen, who is come from Copenhagen to give the King an Account of what lately passed there, and Major-General Meyer, the Danish Envoy, who is also newly come from Copenhagen, are to follow his Majesty to Havelberg, as are also the Russian and Polish Envoys. On the 17th arrived here M. Schunck, who negotiated the Marriage between the Hereditary Prince of Wirtemberg and the Princess of Schwedt: This Evening that Prince arrived here, and was received with a triple Discharge of the Cannon on the Walls. Letters from Warsaw of the 13th Instant say, the Treaty of Accommodation had at last been fully agreed and signed on the 8th, and sent to the Marshals of the Confederacy by the Starosts of Belsk and Wlodomirs, who though they were returned without the Ratification in Form, had given Assurances that it would certainly follow in two or three Days; and the General Marshal Leduchowski himself was expected at Warsaw by the 17th. As the Confederates insisted on the intire Evacuation of the Saxon and Muscovite Troops, the King's Plenipotentiaries engaged for the first, and to use effectual Endeavours with the others, who were advanced under General Ronne as far as Dubno, as General Bauer was on the other side to Mezeritz.
