

Fuhnen, that of Laland, and the Battalion of Norwegians, are appointed to be forthwith transported to Norway; as is also the Regiment of Horse of Lestzau, but their Horses are to be left behind here, and they are to be provided in that Country with Horses more fit for the Service there. Major-General Mesting is to have the Command of this Reinforcement, which will amount to between 4 and 5000 Men; and the Transports which carry them are to have for their Convoy two Men of War commanded by Commodore Tordenhild. The said Regiments are new clothed, and a considerable Quantity of Powder, with 1000 Saddles, and several Thousand Muskets, Carbines and Pistols, will be sent with them. Orders are sent for putting strong Garrisons into Frederickshall and Frederickstadt, it being expected the Swedes will make some Attempt on that Side this Winter, unless they are prevented by great Rains, or deep Snows. For the Security of the Commerce between this City and Lubeck, three Men of War are appointed to cruise near Meun, under the Command of Commodore Shindel. 95 Ships newly arrived from Petersbourg, with Stores of all Kinds for the Czar's Service, are, by his Order, unloading, and their Cargoes are to be laid up in the Magazines which his Czarish Majesty has caused to be erected here. On the 15th Instant Sir John Norris, with the British Trade under his Convoy, sailed from hence with a very fair Wind.

*Admiralty-Office, Nov. 19.* By Letters from Rear-Admiral Cornwall, dated at Gibraltar the 20th of last Month, we have Advice, That our Cruizers had met with, and forced ashore near Marmora, a Ship from Newfoundland which had been taken by one of the Rovers of Salley; where she was lost with most of the Moors, who were in her.

*Whereas y<sup>e</sup> several Statutes made in the Reign of the late King William and Queen Anne, to prevent clandestine Marriages, there are the following Penalties, viz. 100l. on every Clergyman who shall marry without publishing the Banns of Matrimony, or a Licence first obtained, 10l. on every Man so married, and 5l. on every Clerk or Sexton assisting at such Marriage; and whereas four Clergymen have, contrary to the said Statutes, married several Persons about the Prison of the Fleet, two of which have absconded from Justice, and the other two are now under Prosecution for their said Offences: These are to caution all Clergymen, Clerks, and Sextons to avoid the said Penalties, the said Statutes being intended to be put into Execution in the strictest Manner for the Time to come.*
