**T**He 10th instant put into this Port a Vessel from *Huere de Grace in France*, the Master says, that he came out thence in company of 40 sail, all bound for *Brest* to lade Salt, but at meeting with foul weather, in which his ship received great damage, he was forced to come for shelter hither.

The 11th came in the *Angel Gabriel of Bristol*, of about 500 Tun, bound for *Faial*, the Seamen say, that in their passage they were overtaken with such violent storms, that they spent their Masts and most of their Rigging and Sails, so that they were obliged to put into this Port to refit their ship for sea again.
