Copenhagen, December 1.

ON the 22d of last Month, the Nettelblat, a Man of War of 50 Guns, arrived here from Norway, where all was quiet at her Departure. On the 27th, five Battallions embarked here for Norway, in the King's Presence; and the Squadron ordered thither with them under Commadore Tordenschild will sail, as soon as the Stores of Meal and other Provisions and Ammunition are all on Board. His Majesty has appointed Count Wedel the Younger, to command in Chief in Norway.

Berlin, Dec. 1. On the 22d of last Month the King of Prussia set out for Havelberg, on Notice that the Czar would be there the same Evening. They staid together there till the 28th, when the Czar set out for Altena by Water, and the King returned that Evening to Potsdam. On the 29th his Prussian Majesty came to this Place, as all the Ministers who assisted at the Interview have done since: And great Preparations are making for the Prince of Wirtemberg's Wedding, which will be kept next Week. His Majesty has made a Present to the Czar of a fine Yacht, which cost the late King his Father a very considerable Sum in Holland; and of a magnificent Set of Wainscot Pannels of Amber, instead of Wood, for a Room, extremely well wrought; a Curiosity not to be found in all Europe besides, nor can such another be collected in some Years. It is not yet known when the Russian Troops will leave the Country of Mecklenbourg, which 'tis said will, in a great Measure, depend on the Negotiations still on foot with Denmark for Part of those Forces. 'Tis advised from Warsaw, that on the 12th the Starost of Belsk, who returned that Day from the Marshals of the Confederacy, had a long Conference with the Plenipotentiaries on both Sides, concerning the Departure of the Russian Troops out of the Kingdom. On the 13th the Deputies of the Polish and Lithuanian Armies arrived there, to make Instances on the same Subject. On the 18th the Ratification of the Treaty of Pacification was signed, but not exchanged, the King delaying it on a Pretension of the Confederates to have the Subsistance for the fu-

ture Army of the Crown regulated and raised by the Provincial Dyets, which he positively refused to allow. Leduchowski, the Marshal of the Confederacy, arrived in Praag that Evening, and a great many of the Nobility were come to Warsaw to assist at the future Dyet, but no Time is yet settled for the opening it. On the 20th, the Ratifications were at last exchanged, and M. Manteuffel, the Polish Envoy here, has this Day presented Requisitorial Letters in Form, for the Passage of the Saxon Troops through the King of Prussia's Dominions. The Saxon Troops under Lieutenant General Milkaw, were (according to the last Advices) advanced to Lissa in the Palatinate of Posen; those under Major-General Arnsted to Schmiegel; the Body with General Bauditz to the Neighbourhood of Kalisch; and that with the Prince of Weissenfels to Gnielen. The Russians under General Ronne were advanced within 15 German Miles of Lemberg. On the 25th past, the Marquis of Harold, Son to the Duke of Kent, arrived here; and on the 29th set out to return to Hanover.

Hambourg, Dec. 4. On the 1st Instant, about eight in the Morning, the Czar passed down the Elbe by this City to Altena, being saluted by the Cannon of our Ramparts, and by the Guns of the Shipping in the River and Harbour. His Czarish Majesty chose to lodge at Altena in a private House. That Afternoon he came hither unexpected, in his Resident's Coach, attended by a Guard of 12 Danish Dragoons; and having viewed the Duke of Mecklenbourg's House, went to a private Merchant's, where he staid till the Evening, and then went back to Altena, the Cannon firing at his Departure. On the 2d a Deputation from the Magistrates of this City, waited on the Czar at Altena, to Compliment him on his Arrival. This Evening he came to the Opera here. To Morrow his Czarish Majesty sets out for Holland, and 'tis said will take his Way by Staden and Lingen.

Hanover, Dec. 1. Last Night His Majesty arrived here from Gohr. Orders are dispatched to England, for the Yachts with a Convoy of Men of War to come to Holland, there to wait for His Majesty.

Hague, Dec. 8. On the 29th past the Assembly of the Extraordinary Deputies of the Seven Provinces was held for the first Time, the Baron de Rechteren, Deputy of Overissel, sitting as President. They have since continued to sit daily; but 'tis not yet known what Progress they have made, in concerting the properest Means for redressing the Disorders and Grievances referred to their Consideration. It having been notified to the States of the Province of Holland, that the Czar intends to come hither in a little Time, they have nominated the Earl of Albemarle on the Part of the Nobles, and M. Repelaer, Burgomaster of Dort, M. Hoofd, Burgomaster of Amsterdam, and M. Kinschot, Burgomaster of Alkmaer, on the Part of the Towns, to receive that Prince at his entering into the Province, and to accompany him during his Stay here. Horatio Walpole, Esq; His Britannick Majesty's Minister, arrived here last Night from Hanover. On the 5th Instant the Lord Cadogan had a Conference with the Abbot du Bois, and the Marquess de Chateaucuf, Ambassadors of France, as he had also the next Day with the Great Pensionary. The States of the Province of Holland having assembled Yesterday Morning, passed a Resolution to enter into the Alliance with France, upon the Terms which had been communicated to them by the Lord Cadogan, on the Part of His Britannick Majesty.
