Vienna, Nov. 28. On the 19th Instant an Exprese from General Mercy brought an Account, that on the 10th he took Possession of Banzova, the Turkish Garrison not making any Resistance, but surrendring at Discretion. On the 11th he sent a Guard to conduct the said Garrison to Belgrade; and having put 400 Foot into the Place, advanced on the 15th to Vipalanca, which, on his Summons, was surrendring likewise on the same Terms, and he ordered the Garrison to be conducted to the Castle of Ram on the other side of the Danube. The Suburbs of Vipalanca had been burnt some Days before; but the Turks af-

firmed the Rasicians had done it without their Consent. General Mercy having caused two Companies of Grenadiers to take Possession of the Place, and ordered the two Battallions of Neibergh to take Quarters in the neighbouring District, under the Command of Collonel Baron Neibergh, intended to march towards Orsova on the 17th. The Prince Don Emanuel of Portugal is arrived here, was received by the Emperour with all Marks of Esteem and Affection, and is lodged in the Imperial Palace. M. Bentenrieder is preparing to set out from hence within 3 or 4 Days, to wait on the King of Great Britain at Hanover. On the 24th M. Wortley Mountague, Ambassadour Extraordinary from His Britannick Majesty to the Ottoman Port, set out from hence for Hanover, designing to return in a short Time. To Day arrived here M. Stanyan, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Emperour.

Hambourg, Dec. 8. We have an Account from Copenhagen, that on the 29th of last Month Commadore Tordenschild put to Sea from thence, with the Transports having on board the Reinforcements of Land-Forces and Stores for Norway, under the Convoy of two Ships of War of 50 Guns each, one of 46 Guns, two of 30, with three lesser Frigates and two large Prahmes. The 30th being the Birth-Day of the Prince-Royal of Denmark, who then entred into his 18th Year, was celebrated at Copenhagen: On which Occasion the Duke of Glucksbourg and the young Count Rantzau, had the Order of Knighthood of the Elephaat conferred on them. Yesterday about Noon the Czar left Altena, and crossing the Elbe arrived this Morning at Stade, whence he will proceed by Land to Holland.

Hague, Dec. 11. The States General having Notice that the Czar will be here in a few Days, have caused Guards to be placed ready at several Stages on the Road to attend him.
