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Vienna, December 5.

M. Fleischman is arrived here, but without any Sort of Overture from the Turks. On the 2d Instant M. Bentenrieder set out from hence for Hanover, with a private Commission from the Emperour to the King of Great-Britain. Since last Post we had the Particulars of the Surrender of Vipalanca, which was done in so unusual a Manner, that it is worth taking Notice of. As soon as General Mercy appeared before the Place, the Turks offered to surrender it to him upon his own Terms, telling him, that they could have retired before he came up, but that they staid on purpose to prevent the Rascians from setting Fire to the Town, as they had done to the Suburbs; and that they would deliver up to him two of their Chiefs who had formed that Design, that he might punish them according to their Deserts; adding, that they desired him only to give them a Receipt in Writing for the Place, in the Emperour's Name: Which he did, and then allowed the Garrison to go safe to Belgrade. The News of the Seraskier of Belgrade's having been put to Death by the Janisaries, is confirmed. By Letters from Buda of the 1st Instant we learn, that after the taking Possession of Vipalanca, General Mercy having advanced to Orlova, it was immediately surrendered to him; and by the next Advices we expect to hear that our Troops are possessed of the adjacent Island, which will be of very great Advantage to us.

Copenhagen, Dec. 5. The Squadron commanded by M. Tordenschild, with the Transports, designed for Norway, failed from hence on the 1st Instant, and the next Day got into the North Sea; but afterwards the Wind changing, they were obliged to come back into the Sound, where they still continue, as does also the Dutch Fleet, waiting for a fair Wind.

Berlin, Dec. 12. On the 8th in the Evening the Marriage between the Prince of Wirtemberg and the young Princess of Schwedt was celebrated at Court. All the Ministers and Persons of Quality of both Sexes were invited to assist at the Ceremony: The King and Royal Family Supped that Night alone, and the Ladies and Gentlemen had separate Tables provided for them; after which they danced till Midnight. The next Evening there was a great Table in the Fashion of the Prince and Princess's Cypher, for 50 Couple, and the King himself with the other Gentlemen drew

Lots for their Places and Partners, as they likewise did the third Evening, the Balls continuing both times till near One a-Clock. On the 14th the Margravin Philippe gives a great Entertainment to the King and the new married Pair; and on the 16th the Prince with his Lady set out for Stutgard. M. Schlippenbach waits on them first to the Frontiers, and then in a few Days will follow to the Court of Wirtemberg. The King has given the Princess 6000 Dollars to buy her Wedding-Cloaths, a very fine Coach of the late Queen's with six Horses, and 40000 Dollars for her Fortune. The Prince has received a Present of two Saddle-Horses with all their Furniture, is to have the first Regiment vacant, and, as 'tis said, will be made Stadt-holder of Cleves, as the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel was on his Marriage with the Daughter of the late King. On the 10th Instant Count Golofkin arrived here from Schwerrin. Letters from Warsaw of the 4th Instant say, that tho' most of the Senators and Deputies who are to form the Dyet, were arrived there, the Confederates, before they proceeded, had made some new Demands to the King, by the Cardinal Primate, the Chief whereof are, That the Saxon Troops should be immediately ordered to march to the Frontiers, and that the King should use his best Offices with the Czar for having the Muscovites withdrawn, or in case they failed, should join with the Republick to oblige them to it by all possible Means. Sir Richard Vernon, His Britannick Majesty's Envoy, sets out to Morrow for Dresden, either to wait there, or proceed to Poland, according to the Advices he shall receive of the King of Poland's Journey.

Brussels, Dec. 16. The Marquis de Prié having thought fit to take the Administration upon him, on Sunday the 29th of November his Excellency heard the first publick Mass at St. Gudule's Church, as the Governors of these Provinces usually do on the like Occasions. On the 30th he dispatched Circular Letters to the respective Provinces and Councils, to notify his Entrance on the Government, and sent Copies of his Patent to be registred by the Council of Finances, the Chamber of Accompts, and by the States and Council of Brabant; and on the 1st Instant he was complimented by them respectively: Some time before Count Kingsegg gave up the Administration, he desired the States of Flanders to advance 300000 Florins to subsist the Imperial Troops, on Account of the Subsidy for the ensuing Year: But they declined complying with his Demand,
