Genoa, December 15.

Esterday being appointed for the publick Audience of Mr. Davenant, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great Britain, he was attended from his House by the British Consul, with several Gentlemen Merchants and others of that Nation here, as also by a good Number of Germans, Spaniards, and French, and in general by all the Consuls settled here and the Merchants of their respective Nations, being conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies, and accompanied by four Noblemen deputed by this Republick. In the Streets that lead to the Palace, he was joined by a greater Concourse of our Nobility than has been seen on the like Occasions. There being at this Time about 30 British Ships in the Port, they fired all their Guns at his entring the Palace. Being introduced with the usual Ceremonics, he made a Speech in Latin to the Doge and Senate, which was answered by the Doge in the Genoese Dialect. After which he was re conducted to his House. The Fox, a British Man of War, continues here.

Warsaw, Dec. 5. Since the Treaty of Pacification was concluded and ratified, new Differences have risen. The principal is this, The Confederates pretend that the Officers which they had in their Troops, should have the same Posts in the Army that is to be formed; but it being the King's Prerogative to nominate the Military Officers, His Majesty has chosen such as were firm to his Party during the Troubles. The greatest Part of the present Army is to be disbanded at the Opening of the Diet, which was to have begun on the 29th past; but upon the fore mentioned Pretension of the Confederates, it is put off. In the mean Time the Marshals of the Confederates, who some Days ago came to Praag, on the other Side of the Vistula over against this City, hold frequent Conferences with the Chiefs of the Nobility, and resule to come over the Vistula till they have such Security from the King for their Persons as they require.

Copenhagen, Dec. 12. On the 9th the King went from hence to Fredericksbourg, accompanied by the Counts of Holft and Reventlau; and after some Days Stay there, His Majesty designs to go to Stevens, to view the Dispositions newly made for Quartering theresbours 5 Regiments of Horse constantly for the future. We are in great Concern for the Ships of War and Transports which sailed from hence the Beginning of this Month for Norway, under the Command of Commadore Tordenschild, having on Board between 4 and 5000 Land-Forces; because they were disperfed by a violent Storm the Night between the 4th and 5th in the Categat: Several of the Trans-

ports are returned into the Sound, much shattered, but we have no Account yet of the rest of them, not of their Convoy, which consisted of 2 Men of War and a Frigate.

Berlin, Dec. 19. On the 17th Instant the King of Prussia went to hunt the wild Boar at Schonbecke, and is expected back on the 22d or 23d. M. Kniphaulen, Son in Law to M. Ilgen, who has been employed for some Years in France and Denmark, is named to wait on His Britannick Majesty at Hanover; and his Instructions being already drawn, he will set out in two or three Days. The Czarin, who had been left at the Court of Mecklenbourg to lie in there, intends now to follow the Czar to Holland, where 'tis said he proposes to stay two Months. M. Heusch, H's Britannick Majesty's Resident here, sets out on the 21st for Hanover. M. Wallenroden is gone with the Prince of Wirtemberg to Stutgard, in the Commission for which M. Schlippenbach had at first been named. Letters from Thorn of the 7th Instant, say the Russian General Bauer had his Head Quarters then at Gniesen, and was preparing to quarter his Troops, to the Number of 4000 Men, in the Districts of Neuburg, Dirschau, and Dantzick.

These are to give Notice, that the several reduced Officers upon Half Pay, lately belonging to the following Regiments, and now in Great Britain, who have or shall not appear on the respective Days mentioned for their Appearance, as was Published in the Gazette of Tuesday she 27th of November last, are hereby required to appear in Person, before the said Board, in the Great Room at the Horse-Guards, upon the respective Days sollowing appointed for the Recall, at Ten of the Clock in the Morning, at which Time the List will be closed, and they are to bring with them their Commissions, or authentick Certificates of them, in order to their Examination: And Such of them as do not appear, will be struck off the Half Pay.
