**A**N humble Address of the Artillery Regiment of the Town of Shrewsbury, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable Henry Lord Newport, Colonel of the said Regiment, accompanied by Sir Robert Corbet, Sir John Wolryche, Sir Charles Lloyd, William Kinaston, Esq; &c. introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Town-Clerk, Brethren and Capital Burgesses of the Borough of Derby in Common Council assembled, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord James Cavendish, and William Stanhope, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord High Steward of the Corporation.

*Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.*

*Vienna, Feb. 27.* Count Dietrichstein, a Commander of the Order of Malta, is made Maggior-Domo to the Archduchesses Daughters of the late Emperour Joseph, in the Room of Count Sinzendorf, who is appointed Governour of Brim. Cardinal Saxe-Zeyts has desired a Colleague to be joined with him at the Dyet at Ratisbon, and 'tis said he has proposed for that Employment Baron Kirchner, who was the Emperour's second Plenipotentiary at Utrecht. The Advices from Peterwaradin give the following Account of the Departure from thence of Mr. Wortley Mountague, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador to the Grand Signior. As soon as he arrived there, he dispatched a Courier to the Seraskier of Belgrade, to notify his coming; and to desire him to make the necessary Preparations for his Reception. At the same Time he would have had the commanding Officer at Peterwaradin send another Courier to the same Effect on his Part, it having been customary so to do: But he excused himself, upon his having Orders to furnish him with every Thing necessary, but not to send any Message to the Turks, lest they should interpret it as an Argument of the Emperour's Desire of Peace. The Turks seeing the Ambassadors's Courier come alone, contrary to the Practice in like Cases, suspected he might be a Spy sent under that Pretence, and thought fit to send him back with one of their Officers to see if the Ambassador was at Peterwaradin, and to settle the Number of Men who should convoy him, and the Place of their Meeting; which being done, the Ambassador set out on the 11th Instant from Peterwaradin, with a Guard of 150 Horse and as many Foot. On the 12th he was met about a League and half beyond the ancient Limits, by a Guard of Turks of the same Number, who at taking him under their Care, gave the Im-

perial Officer a Receipt. The Resident of Muscovy has declared to this Court, by Order of his Master, that the Russian Troops in the Dutchy of Mecklenbourg shall forthwith leave that Country. Letters from Buda of the 20th Instant relate, that the Day before passed through that Place on their Way hither, several Bojars from Walachia, being charged with some Commission from the principal Persons of that Country to his Imperial Majesty. Men are kept continually at Work in repairing the Roads and Bridges in Hungary, for the commodious March of the Imperial Troops when they take the Field. The military Laboratory which is at Pest, is ordered to be removed to Esseck, to be the nearer to the Army when the Operations of the Campaign begin.

*Bern, Feb. 27.* Monf. Lubiére, Governour of Neuchatel, has lately writ, by the King of Prussia's Order, a very obliging Letter to the two Cantons of Zurich and Bern, wherein he offers his Majesty's good Offices towards composing the Differences still subsisting between the two Cantons, and the Abbot of St. Gall. The Deputies which some Time ago went to Vyl on the Part of this State, in order to settle some Accompts between this Canton and that of Zurich, and to try to enter into a Negotiation with the Abbot of St. Gall, are returned hither; but it does not appear, that they have made the least Progress as to the latter Point of their Commission. This Canton having received Advice, that a great Reform was intended by the States General of their Troops in the Dutch Service, writ last Week in very earnest Terms to the Hague, to remonstrate against the said Reform. We have certain Advice here, that the Pretender has pass'd through Savoy and Piedmont in his Way to the Pope's Territories. Letters from thence say he will go first to Rome, and lodge there in Cardinal Gualtieri's Palace; but that after a short Stay he will remove to Pezaro in the Dutchy of Urbino, which the Pope has offered him for the Place of his Residence.

*Geneva, March 5.* The King of Sicily has sent hither a Pardon for the young Students, and other Persons of this City concerned in two Quarrels which happened lately between them and some of his Subjects in our Neighbourhood. 'Tis advised from Turin, that his Sicilian Majesty has made Count Provano Secretary at War, and the Marquis del Borgo, Secretary of the Order of Annonciada. Several Protestants who have been lately seized at religious Assemblies in Languedoc, are sent to the Gallies at Marseilles.

*Copenhagen, March 6.* The fitting out of our Fleet is continued with all possible Diligence. The Squadron designed to serve in the Baltick, under the Command of Vice-Admiral Gabel will be first ready, though the Ice in our Bason and Canal occasions some Delay.

**Robert Townsend, late Master of the Salisbury Prize, was convicted this last Sessions at Hicks's-hall of publishing a false Indanture, whereby to have received the Wages of William Sutherland in the same Ship, for which Offence he was fined the Sum of 100 l.**

**James Watson, and Elizabeth his Wife, were convicted this last Sessions at the Old Bailey, of publishing a forged Will, whereby to have received a Seaman's Wages; for which Offence they were fined 6 s. and 8 d. each, and to stand on the Pillory.**
