Letters from Hermanstad in Transylvania of the 17th past relate, that on the 18th a Party of Turks, consisting of 400 Foot, and a like Number of Horse, having advanced towards Krejova, took and carried off Prisoners what People they found in that Neighbourhood, together with a good Number of Cattle: But Lieutenant Colonel Dettine, with only three Troops of Imperialists and some Militia, going in Pursuit of them, overtook them as they were about to pass the Danube near Orsova, and after a very sharp Action, in which all the Turkish Foot except 40 Men, and about 100 of their Horse were killed, recovered all the Prisoners and Booty: On this Occasion the Imperialists are said to have lost only a Captain, a Lieutenant, and about 30 Men. The necessary Preparations are continued in Hungary, for all the Imperial Regiments to be in a Readiness to march by the End of this Month, upon the first Orders they shall receive.

Berne, March 6. The Deputies of this State who returned lately from Vyl, have made their Report to the Sovereign Council; by which it appears, that they have not been able to obtain the Abbot of St. Gall's Consent to the renewing the Negotiations, or any other Answer from him, than that having referred his Interests to the Emperour, he lay under an Engagement not to treat with the two Cantons but by his Imperial Majesty's Intervention.

Berlin, March 9. This Morning the King of Prussia went for Wutterhausen, and will stay there some Time. Yesterday M. Meyer communicated to his Majesty the Copy of a Letter from the King of Denmark to the King of Poland, dated the 2d Instant, in answer to his Polish Majesty's Notification of the Peace, and his Intention to send Part of his Troops to Pomerania: The King of Denmark assures him, there was no Occasion for any more Forces there, his own being sufficient

to defend his Possession of that Province against any Attempts of the Swedes, nor could he apprehend any Danger, since he was secured by the Guaranty of his Majesty and the King of Prussia; and therefore he hoped the King of Poland would not persist in that Design. The rest of the 12 Battalions of Russians are now past the Oder, and will be in Poland by the End of this Week.

Dresden, March 10. Letters from Warsaw of the 3d Instant relate, that the King's Equipage had Orders to leave that Place on the 15th, to come hither, by the Way of Posen; and that his Majesty will follow in a very few Days after. The same Advices tell us, that Colonel Oberbeek who commanded the Queen's Regiment of Horse, which was surprized by the Confederates near Craucow in the Beginning of the late Troubles, and most of the Men cut to Pieces, had been sentenced by a Court Martial, to lose his Head; which Sentence it was thought would be put in Execution on the 6th, the King not seeming at all disposed to pardon him. These Accounts add, that the Body of Muscovites which were under the Command of General Renne, were actually on their March in three Columns, in order to go out of Poland; but it does not yet appear that the Troops under General Bauer, nor those expected from Mecklenbourg, have the like Orders. Last Week Count Wackerbaert came hither from Warsaw; as did the Prince of Weissenfelds and General Bauditz.

Copenhagen, March 9. Yesterday arrived a Maily from Norway, which brought Advice, that the Swedes having lately attempted to convey a small Train of Artillery over the Weener-Lake, which was then frozen, the Ice broke, and some Men with two Pieces of Cannon were lost. The Swedes have been some Time fitting out their Men of War at Carlscrona, but are in great Want of Mariners.

Paris, March 13. The Instrument of Appeal of the four Bishops of Mirepoix, Senez, Montpellier, and Bologne, to the first General Council that shall be freely and lawfully
