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Falmouth, Feb. 27.

THe *Angel Gabriel* of Bristol, who some time since put into this Port to repair the damage she had suffered at sea in bad weather, is almost fitted out again, and may in few days be ready to put to sea. The 24th instant sailed out of this Port, the *Hinde* of London for *Jamaica*, with a fair wind.

Lyme, March 1. Yesterday arrived here the *Amity* of this place in Twenty days from *Croissy* in France, the Master speaks of several ships of great force that are there fitted out to sea, some of which he saw riding under *Belle-Isle*, carrying 80 Guns apiece.

Rome, Feb. 21. The 18th instant Signior *Francisco di Tugaros*, and Signior *Francisco Garua*, Ambassadors Extraordinary of Obedience from the City of *Avignon*, had publick Audience of the Pope, whither they were accompanied with several persons of Quality; being introduced, they presented with the usual Ceremonies, certain Donatives to his Holiness, according to the antient custome, as an acknowledgement of their Allegiance and Subjection to the Apostolicke See.

The differences which happened here this Carnival, between *Don Domingo de Guzman*, and *Don Philippo Rasponi* continue still, without any likelihood of an accommodation, the first standing upon his terms, insomuch, that he sent a Challenge to *Don Augustino Chigi*, for having given reception to him that had affronted him; to which that Prince returned answer, that he could not accept of it, till he was satisfied wherein he had injured him, and as being a thing in which he should incurre his Holiness highest displeasure, so that it is not yet known, where this matter may end.

The 16th instant *Don Pedro d' Arragon* was conducted by the Princes *Don Gasparo*, and *Don Angelo Altieri*, in a very rich Coach of the Cardinal *Altieri*, to the Popes Palace at *Monte Cavallo*, having been followed by the Swisse Guards, and a large Train of Coaches with Six Horses apiece, in which were several persons of the greatest Quality, who accompanied his Excellency thither, where for Three days together he was Treated according to what hath been practised in former times to the Vice-Roys of *Naples* at their being here, with all the pomp and magnificence imaginable, at the Popes expence; the next day he dined with his Holiness, that is, in the same room, though at a distinct Table; and on Wednesday was Treated in a very extraordinary manner, by the Cardinal *Altieri*; after all, his Excellency having tak'n leave of the Pope, who dismissed him with great expressions of kindness and affection, departed the next morning on his way towards *Marino*, intending from thence for *Naples*, with all the haste he may; at *Acqua Santa*, a place distant some miles from hence, his Excellency was met by the Constable *Colonna*, who had with him about 200 Gentlemen on horseback, all extream rich in their habits, and bravely mounted; the Cardinal Patron doth likewise accompany his Excellen-

cy through all the Ecclesiastical Territories, to which end he hath caused an extream rich Coach to be made here. It is said that *Don Pedro d' Arragon*, seeing that neither he nor his Brother the Cardinal *d' Arragon* have any issue of their own to keep up their Family, hath settled his affections upon the second Son of the Constable *Colonna*, whom he hath adopted for his Son, meaning to make him sole Heir of the House of *Arragon*, upon which he is gone with his Excellency for *Naples*, to be there brought up after the manner and education of *Spain*.

It is reported that Monseignor *Nerli*, at present Nuncio in *Poland*, is to be sent Envoye Extraordinary to the Emperor, and other the Princes and States of the Empire, for the framing a defensive League against the Ottoman Port, whose Armes, though at present they seem to be laid aside, still threaten the Empire and the neighboring kingdoms.

Paris, March 7. Our last Letters from *Bayonne* tell us, that the disorders formerly said to have been amongst the Seamen there, occasioned by the Commissioners going about to press them for the Kings service, continue still, notwithstanding the persuasions and endeavors of the Count *de Guiche*, to bring them to some better temper; to which end he had twice assembled the Deputies of the respective Parishes, where he told them, how unbecoming this their behavior was, and how dangerous to themselves, in case they did persevere therein, the King being resolved, unless he suddenly was informed of their due submission to his authority, to take a speedy course for their exemplary punishment, which at their first meeting, seemed to have wholly pacified them, so that the Count *de Guiche* parted from them with much satisfaction; but the next day being assembled again, they relapsed into their former obstinacy, absolutely protesting that they would not upon any score goe into the Kings service; that they would rather set all the ships on fire and retire into *Spain*.

The 24th of the last month died here *Françoise de Savoy*, Daughter to the Count *de Soissons*, of about Two years of age, to the great grief of that Family; her Heart having been interred with all the pompe and magnificence due to her Birth and Quality. On the 3 instant the Marquis *de Chasteauneuf*, Secretary of State, whom the King hath been lately pleased in consideration of his worth and merits to make Commander and Secretary of the Order of the *S. Esprit*, took accordingly the Oath usual on that occasion.

The Magistrates of several Cities in *Lorraine*, have of late, as an acknowledgement of his most Christian Majesties authority in those Countreys, sent the keys of their Gates, together with the Canon that was remaining in those places to the Marechal *de Crequi*, his Majesties General in those parts, to be disposed of according to the Kings Order; the Canon is since brought hither and put into the Arsenal, to continue there till further directions. It is said that the King hath Commanded Two Cittadels to be built, one at *Nancy*, and the other at *Longhuy*, for the better securing those Countreys under his Obedience.

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The King hath lately nominated the Archbishop of *Paris*, together with Two other Bishops, as likewise five *Conseillers d'Etat*, to be his Commissioners for the examining the Bull, lately issued by the Pope, in favour of the Nunneries of this Kingdom.

Two days since returned thither from *Chantilly*, the Prince de *Conde*, much eased of his Gout, which hath for some time extremly afflicted him.

The Duke de *Ventadour* is perfectly recovered of his late sickness, and is now in a condition to consummate his Marriage with the Daughter of the *Mareschalle de la Motte*, notwithstanding, as it is said, their Relations have upon some reasons thought fit to deferre it till some short time after *Easter*. The King hath been pleased to appoint Monsieur de *la Chambré*, to be Physician in Ordinary to the Dauphin, who hath been accordingly sworn into that place. On Monday next the Court returns from *Versailles* to *S. Germain*, all things being in the mean time preparing for the Kings journey to *Flun-ders*, whither he will march at the head of 25000 Foot, besides the Troops of his Household: yesterday the King caused a general Muster to be made of all his forces, which in a spacious Plain were drawn up in most excellent Order within half a mile of *S. Germain*, his Majesty having been pleased to be present there, together with the whole Court.

Vienna, Feb. 22. From *Offen* we have advice, that there is arrived a Chiaus from the Grand Signior with very rich Presents to the Emperor; it is said, his errand is, to assure his Imperial Majesty of the constant friendship of the Port; in the mean time the Emperor hath nominated Monsieur *Peris* to goe to *Constantinople* in Quality of Envoye Extraordinary upon the same account.

From *Cassovie* in *Upper Hungary* we are told, that the Hussars have lately made an incursion into the Turkish Dominions, doing very considerable damage, and returning laden with rich spoils and plunder.

The Count de *Rothal*, one of his Imperial Majesties Commissioners at *Presbourg* is preparing himself for his journey thither, where they are to meet the Toth of the next month, though we still hear, that several of those that have been summoned to appear before them, refuse to come, still alleading the illegality of that Commission.

The Emperor hath lately bestowed the Government of *Hagbeling*, heretofore possessed by the Count *Serini*, notwithstanding the solicitations of the Duke of *Sevenbergue* and other persons of Quality on his behalf, upon a Gentleman of *Croatia*.

Hambrough, March 3. From *Stockholm* of the 11 February we are told, that the King and Queen were returned from *Jacobsdale*, together with several of the Senators, who, as is said, are to meet the next week, and that then the King will make his first appearance in the Senate, where he will have as yet no Vote, but onely be present at the debate of business, for his better information in the affaires of the kingdom; That much reflection is made, at least in the common discourse of the Town, at the King of *Denmark*s having refused of late, the Arms of the Provinces of *Schoonen*, *Haland*, and *Bleking*, and united them to the Arms of that Crown, being Countreys yielded by the late Treaties to the Crown of *Sweden*.

Hague, March 6. The Elector of *Cologne* hath by his Minister here, made of late frequent instances to the States General, for the restitution of *Rynbergh*, a place at present in the possession of this State, by an old Title, seconded with many other pretences, and to which it seems that Elector now prosecutes his right. The Deputies of the Admiralty have presented a Memorial to the States General, acquaint-

ing them that they find it very necessary that the Seamen wages be for the future encreased from 15 to 18 Gilders a month, for the encouraging them to come into their service, especially at this time when the *East-India* and *Greenland* Companies are sending out their ships, that otherwise they shall scarce be able to compleat their number of men for the ships they are at present fitting out.

By Letters from Monsieur *Cuneus*, Minister from this State at *Munster*, we are told, that things remain in the same posture there; that the preparations for war are carried on with all diligence, without the least appearance as yet of a peace; that in the mean time hat Bishop on all occasions assures him of a most sincere and perfect friendship he will ever maintain with the States his Masters, who he said, he hopes will in the present conjuncture, be ready to assist him against the Princes of *Lunenbourg* and *Brunswick*, seeing they refuse to accept the propositions for peace which he hath made them, but would first oblige him to grant a general pardon for all that is past to the Inhabitants of *Hoxter*, which he thinks so unreasonable a thing, that it ought not once to be insisted upon by them; to which, as is said, that Minister had made answer, That the States his Masters would not be wanting on any occasion to employ their forces against that side which should refuse the peace; but this hath been wholly disapproved by the States here, with a Declaration, that they will never go about to compel the Dukes of *Lunenbourg* to any thing against their Interest and Honor. The States-General have appointed a publick Fast to be kept throughout all their Dominions on the 11th instant.

Ditto, 10. The States of *Zealand* having finally given their consent to the new Levies, the Commissions are accordingly distributed to the respective Officers, who are very well satisfied that they have at last their expectations answered.

To morrow Monsieur *Riperda* and Monsieur *Ameronghen* depart from hence towards *Westphalia*, to endeavor an accommodation of the differences depending between the Princes of *Lunenbourg* and the Bishop of *Munster*, from whence we hear, that that Bishop hath of late given out, that this State hath desired to enter into some nearer Alliance with him for their mutual defence, which seems to be grounded on Monsieur *Bentwike*s Negotiation, his late Envoye here, who some time since made an offer to the States on the behalf of his Master, of some stricter League with them, provided he had the same Subsidies they had formerly given to the said Duke of *Lunenbourg*: It is said he had for answer, that they were not in a posture to accept of that proposition.

From *Cologne* we have advice, that the fears and apprehensions of those people encrease daily, and that they have sent their Deputies to most of the Princes and States of the Empire, to desire their protection in a time which so much seems to threaten them.

From *Brussels* they write, that those persons which were lately apprehended there by the Governors Order, remain still close prisoners, but that the particular reasons are not yet perfectly known: and that on the 4th instant died Don *Antonio Pimentel*, to the great grief of his Excellency the Count de *Monterey*, and the people there.
