The King hath lately nominated the Archbishop of Park, together with Two other Bishops, as likewise five Conseillers d'Estat, to be his Commissioners for the examining the Bull, lately issued by the Pope, in favour of the Numeries of this Kingdom.

Two days fince returned hither from Chantilly, the Princede Conde, much eased of his Gout, which hath for some time extreamly afflicted him.

The Duke de Ventadour is perfectly recovered of his late fickness, and is now in a condition to confummate his Marriage with the Daughter of the Mareshalle de la Motte, notwithstanding, as it is said, their Relations have upon some reasons thought sit to deferre it till some short time after Easter. The King hath been pleased to appoint Monsieur de la Chambre, to be Physitian in Ordinary to the Dauphin, who hath been accordingly sworn into that place. On Monday next the Court returns from Versailles to S. Germains, all things being in the mean time preparing for the Kings journey to Flanders, whither he will march at the head of 25000 Foot, besides the Troops of his Houshold: yesterday the King caused a general Muster to be made of all his forces, which in a spacious Plain were drawn up in most excellent Order within half a mile of S. Germains, his Majesty having been pleafed to be present there, together with the whole Court.

Vienna, Feb. 22. From Offen we have advice, that there is arrived a Chiaus from the Grand Signior with very rich Presents to the Emperor; it is said, his errand is, to assure his Imperial Majesty of the constant friendship of the Port; in the mean time the Emperor hath nominated Monsieur Peris to goe to Constantinople in Quality of Envoye Extraordinary upon the same account.

From Cassovie in Upper Hungary we are told, that the Hussars have lately made an incursion into the Turkish Dominious, doing very considerable damage, and returning laden with rich spoils and plunder.

The Count de Rothal, one of his Imperial Majeflies Commissioners at Presbourg is preparing himself for his journey thither, where they are to meet the toth of the next month, though we still hear, that several of those that have been summoned to appear before them, resule to come, still alleadging the illegality of that Commission.

The Emperor hath lately bestowed the Government of Hagheling, heretofore possessed by the Count Serini, notwithstanding the solicitations of the Duke of Sevenbergue and other persons of Quality on his behalf, upon a Gentleman of Croatia.

Hambrough, March 3. From Stockholm of the 11 February we are told, that the King and Queen were returned from facobsdale, together with several of the Senators, who, as is said, are to meet the next week, and that then the King will make his first appearance in the Senate, where he will have as yet no Vote, but onely be present at the debate of business, for his better information in the assaires of the kingdome; That much reslection is made, at least in the common discourse of the Town, at the King of Denmarks having resumed of late, the Arms of the Provinces of Schoonen, Haland, and Bleking, and united them to the Arms of that Crown, being Countreys yielded by the late Treaties to the Crown of Smeden.

Hazue, March 6. The Elector of Cologne hath by his Minister here, made of late frequent instances to the States General, for the restitution of Rynbergh, a place at present in the possession of this State, by an old Title, seconded with many other pretences, and to which it seems that Elector now prosecutes his right. The Deputies of the Admiralty have presented a Memorial to the States General, acquaint-

ing them that they find it very necessary that the Seamens wages be for the future encreased from 15 to 18 Gilders 2 month, for the encouraging them to come into their service, especially at this time when the East-India and Greenland Companies are sending out their ships, that otherwise they shall scarce be able to compleat their number of men for the ships they are at present sitting out.

By Letters from Monsieur Cuneus, Minister from this State at Munster, we are told, that things remain in the same posture there; that the preparations for war are carried on with all diligence, without the least appearance as yet of a peace; that in the mean time hat Bishop on all occasions assures him of a most fincere and perfect friendship he w Il ever maintain with the States his Masters, who he said, he hopes will in the present conjuncture, be ready to assist him against the Princes of Lunenburg and Brunfwick, seeing they refu e to accept the propositions for peace which he hath made them, but would first oblige him to grant a general pardon for all that is past to the Inhabitants of Hoxter, which he thinks so unreasonable a thing, that it ought not once to be infilted upon by them; to which, as is faid, that Minister had made answer, That the States his Masters would not be wanting on any occasion to employ their forces against that side which should refuse the peace; but this hath been wholly disapproved by the States here, with a Declaration, that they will never go about to compel the Dukes of Lunenbourg to any thing against their Interest and Honor. The States-General have appointed a publick Fast to be kept throughout all their Dominions on the 11th instant.

Ditto, to. The States of Zealand having finally given their confent to the new Levies, the Commissions are accordingly distributed to the respective Officers, who are very well satisfied that they have at last their expectations answered.

To morrow Monsieur Riperda and Monsieur Ameronghen depart from hence towards Westphalia, to endeavor an accommodation of the differences depending between the Princes of Lunenburg and the Bishop of Munster, from whence we hear, that that Bishop hath of late given out, that this State hath desired to enter into some nearer Alliance with him for their mutual defence, which seems to be grounded on Monsicur Bentwike's Negotiation, his late Envoye here, who some time since made an offer to the States on the behalf of his Master, of some stricter League with them, provided he had the same Subsidies they had formerly given to the said Duke's of Lunenburg: It is said he had for answer, that they were not in a posture to accept of that proposition.

From Cologne we have advice, that the fears and apprehensions of those people encrease daily, and that they have sent their Deputies to most of the Princes and States of the Empire, to desire their protection in a time which so much seems to threaten them.

From Brussels they write, that those persons which were lately apprehended there by the Governors Order, remain still close prisoners, but that the particular reasons are not yet perfectly known and that on the 4th instant died Don Aztonio Pimentel, to the great grief of his Excellency the Count de Monterey, and the people there.
