An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and Deputy Lieutenants of the County of Devon, at the Assizes held at the Castle of Exon the 29th of March, 1717, has been presented to His Majesty, by Sir Edmond Prideaux, Bart. introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Carteret, one of His Majesty's Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber, and Lord Lieutenant of the County of Devon.

All which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Madrid, April 13. The Marquess Ceva-Grimaldi, late Governour of Cadiz, is made Captain General of Estremadura, and the Government of Cadiz is given to Don Thomas de Ydiaques late Governour of the Castle of Pampelona. The Queen being recovered of her Lying-in, appeared in publick on the 10th Instant, and heard Mass in the Royal Chappel; and in the Evening the Ladies of the Court were admitted to kiss her Hand and make their Compliments. The King designs to set out on the 2d of next Month, with the Queen and the Prince of Asturias, for Segovia, where the necessary Preparations are making for their Reception. 'Tis advised from Port-Passage, that on the 7th Instant, four new Men of War, the Building and Arming of which was committed to the Direction of Don Antonio Galtanneta, sailed from thence for Cadiz.

Venice, April 16. The Czar having sent hither 27 Muscovite Gentlemen, and his Resident having, in his Name, desired Leave of the Senate for their serving this Summer on board the Fleet of this Republick, the Senate has consented to it. Our Preparations against the Turks are continued with the greatest Diligence, and six new Men of War of the second Rate are on the Stocks in our Arsenal. Sig. Mocenigo, having embarked with his Retinue on a Galley, is gone for Dalmatia, to take Possession of that Government; he carries with him a considerable Sum of Money for providing what is necessary for the military Service in those Parts the ensuing Campaign, and he is to be convoyed to Zara by a Galley, commanded by Sig. Vetturri, Captain of the Gulph, and two Gallions. To Day came Advice from Otranto, that the Ships are arrived there which are appointed to convoy General Schulenburg to Corfu; we have also Advice, that a few Days ago that General went Post from Naples for Otranto. A great Number of Troops, part being drawn out of our Garrisons in the Terra Firma, and the others new Levies, are arrived here, and Transports with a Convoy are getting ready for their Imbarkation. 'Tis advised from Rome, that the Pope has ordered a Colonel with 100 Men to march to Pefaro, to serve for a Guard to the Pretender.

Leipsick, April 24. Letters from Warsaw advise, that the Body of Muscovites commanded by General Renne were actually marched out of Poland, but the others which come from Mecklenberg, did not seem disposed to leave the Kingdom yet, but made frequent Marches and Countermarches in the Country to supply them-

themselves with Provisions and Forage, and 'twas feared that if they continued some Time longer there, it might occasion new Troubles in Poland. On the 16th Sir Richard Vernon, Envoy Extraordinary of His Britannick Majesty, had an Audience of the King of Poland at Dresden, and is since come hither. On the 17th his Polish Majesty left Dresden, and went to Torgaw to see the Queen, and thence to Lichtenberg to visit Madame Royale, and on the 22d he arrived here, attended by the Counts Flemming, Werthern, Legnusco, and most of the other Saxon Ministers, who since his Majesty's Arrival have held several Conferences in his Presence, in Relation to the Army and other Affairs of this Country. Several Persons of Distinction are come hither to the Fair, among others the Duke of Saxe Weissenfelds and his Brother, the Prince of Barbi and his Son, the Pope's Nuncio, the Chancellour of Poland, and some Ladies from Warsaw. Here is also arrived the Duke of Saxe-Zeyts, who has made open Profession of the Popish Religion, by which Change he has forfeited the Bishoprick of Nauenbourg, the most considerable Part of his Revenues; which Bishoprick 'tis said devolves on the Electoral Prince.

Copenhagen, April 24. The Swedish Squadron from Carlscrona, consisting of five Men of War and three Frigates, continuing in the Kioger-Bocht, off Stevens-Point the 19th Instant, a Council was held here, and pursuant to the Resolutions taken in it, Vice-Admiral Gabel with a Squadron of eight Men of War and three Frigates, sailed from our Road on the 20th with a fair Wind, but on his Approach the Swedes retired towards Carlscrona, and the Danish Squadron is now lying off Stevens-Point. On the 22d Sir George Byng, with the Squadron of British Men of War under his Command, arrived here. The same Evening the King of Denmark returned hither from Laland, where he had taken a Review of his Troops; and Yesterday Sir George Byng had Audience of his Majesty. This Morning the Lord Polwarth and Sir George Byng, were in Conference with the Council, and another Conference is appointed to be held on the 26th. The whole British Squadron having come directly hither, Sir George Byng has resolved to send back five Ships of the Line and two Frigates to cruize in the Categat off Gottenbourg. The King of Denmark has granted the Passes desired by Count la Marcq, the French Envoy, for his going safe to the King of Sweden, with Leave to send his Letters over the Sound by Helsingborg and Elsinore; and to Night the said Passes will be dispatched to that Count at Hambourg.

Paris, May 1. On the 24th of last Month, Count Kiniglegg, the Emperour's Ambassador, had a private Audience of the Duke of Orleans, Regent of this Kingdom. Some Days ago, the Regent gave Direction to the Principal of the King's Council in the Law, certain Counsellors of the Parliament, and other able and trusty Persons, to the Number of about Twenty, to meet and consider of the most proper Means for terminating absolutely the Affair of the Pope's Constitution or Bull Uni-

genitus, and to make their Report to him with all convenient Speed, which 'tis expected they will do this Week.
