Tetuan, March 31.

AN Embassy is going from hence for Spain, the chief Person is the Prior of the Convent here, whose Instructions are to treat of the Redemption of the Spanish Captives, who are the most numerous, and of a Cessation of Hostilities between Ceuta and this Country.

Cadiz, April 5. Yesterday failed from this Bay for Buenos Ayres two Spanish Ships laden with Goods, convoyed by two Dutch Men of War which lately came from Holland, and which are to see them 50 Leagues beyond Cape St. Vincent. Don Joseph Patinno, who is Superintendent here, uses all imaginable Diligence in fitting out eight Spanish Men of War, a Fireship, and an Hospital-Ship, for the Service against the Turks, and they will be ready to put to Sea about the Middle of next Month. Four Men of War are expected from Biscay, to join those which are fitting out here; so that the Squadron destined for the Assistance of the Venetians, will consist of 12 Men of War. The Marquess de Ceva Grimaldi sets out to Morrow for Badajox, to command in chief in that Province.

Corunna, April 24. Three of the four Spanish Men of War from Port Passage are arrived here, under the Command of Admiral Castanneta, the fourth was put back to St. Antonio. They will soon proceed for Cadiz; each of them carries 60 Guns.

Vienna, April 21. On the 19th Instant the Marquess of Rubi, Viceroy and Captain General of Sardinia, set out from hence for that Kingdom; and Count Mollart set out for Ratifbon, to meet the Dutchess of Wolfenbuttel-Blanckenberg,

the Empress's Mother, and attend her hither. A new Ship of War carrying 34 Guns, was launched here two Days ago, and is shortly to go down the Danube to Hungary, with three other like Ships which were built last Year. Yesterday the Emperour was present at a Council, where the Plenipotentiaries of the Elector of Cologn received, in his Name, the Investiture of his Dominions and Dignities. The Investiture of Bavaria is to be performed to Morrow.

Berne, April 24. On the 20th the French Ambassadour, the Marquess d'Avarey, made his Publick Entry at Soleurre with the usual Solemnity. This Canton has named two Deputies to assist at the Diet called by the French Ambassador for receiving his Credentials, and the same is to meet at Soleurre on the 26th Instant. Upon the Letter which this Canton received lately from the States General, concerning a Reform intended by them of the Swiss Troops in their Service, and for which they alledge an urgent Necessity, this Canton has taken a Resolution to insist upon the Execution of a Capitulation made some Years ago with their High Mightinesses, wherein it is stipulated, that the whole Body of those Troops was to be kept on Foot in Time of Peace.

Venice, April 23. Last Week the Ambassadors of the Montegrins were introduced to the Senate, and made their Submission in the Name of that People. We have received Advice from Zara, that 5000 Turks attempting to enter Montenegro, were repulsed with the Loss of 400 Men killed or taken Prisoners, and with little Loss on our Side. By an English Ship which is arrived from Corfu we have an Account, that Santa Maura is put

put into a good State of Defence by the Care of Sig. Loredano, and that our Fleet was in a Readiness to fail to cover that Place, if the Turks should attack it as they threaten to do. 'Tis also advised, that the Command of the Turkish Fleet is given to an English Renegade.

Hague, May 7. M. Heems has received Orders from the Emperour, of the 15th past, to make pressing Instances to the Czar, for the Removal of his Troops out of Mecklenburg, for the Liberty of the Lubeck Ships to Trade freely, counterband Goods excepted; and for the Payment of such Arrears as are due for the Vessels that Town was obliged to furnish the Muscovites last Year towards the Descent in Schonen. General Weyde has published strict Orders in Mecklenburg on the 16th past, forbidding the Inhabitants to retire, or send their Corn, Cattle, or other Subsistence out of the Country. On the 3d Instant the Duke of Queensborough arrived here from Flanders, and designs to stay some Days. The Deputies of Utrecht and Groningen have communicated to the States the Resolution of their Principals for continuing the Military Establishment of last Year, for a long Month, or 42 Days more, to begin the 7th Instant; and 'tis believed the Consent will be general. The States of Holland have agreed to contribute to the Repairs of the Frontier Places, especially Zutphen and Nimeguen in Guelderland, which will be an Example for the rest of the Provinces. The Receivers of the Admiralty of Holland have been ordered to continue the Levy of the hundredth, and the two hundredth Penny, on all the Obligations owing by them, as far as they belong to the Inhabitants of this Province. M. Meyndershagen has again, by Memorial, demanded Satisfaction for the Ship taken under the King of Prussia's Colours, and some mention is there made of using Reprisals, in case Satisfaction be delayed. Yesterday Mr. Leathes set out from hence on his Return to his Residence at Brussels.
