**A**N humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, Freeholders, and others, at the Assizes held at the Castle of York for that County, the 16th of March last, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Holderness, Lord Lieutenant of the North-Riding of the said County of York.

*Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.*

*Vienna, May 15.* On the 13th Instant about three in the Morning the Empress fell into Labour, and between six and seven was brought to Bed of an Arch-Duchess. About half an Hour after the Emperour arrived from Luxembourgh, whither a Courier had been immediately dispatched to give him Notice of the Empress's being in Labour. The People did not give any publick Demonstrations of Joy upon this Occasion, nor were any Illuminations made, as at the Birth of the Arch-Duke. Three Days were appointed for the Appearance of the Nobility at Court in splendid Habits, which is all the Notice that was taken of this Princess's Birth. In the Evening of the 13th she was christen'd with the usual Solemnity by the Names of Maria, Teresa, Valburga, Amalia, Christina; the Empress Mother being God-Mother, and the Pope God Father, represented by his Nuncio. Last Night the Duchess of Blanckenbourg the Empress's Mother arrived here; she supped with the Empress Amalia, and this Morning received the Compliments of the whole Court. On the 13th in the Evening Prince Eugene set out from hence for the Army in Hungary, and proposes to be at Peterwaradin by the 21st Instant. The Letters from thence of the 8th say, that a great Number of Turkish Vessels and Boats with about 4000 Men on board, assisted by above 2000 Soldiers on shore, attacked on the 3d Instant four of the Emperour's great Ships lying near Salankement, but were repulsed with the Loss of eight Vessels, and of a good Number of Men on board and on shore. On the 13th two Men of War, one of 56, and the other of 52 Guns, went down the Danube to join the rest of the Fleet; and Yesterday the Regiment of Holstein-Beck arrived here from the Low-Countries, and will immediately proceed down the River to join the Army. The same Day the Empress Amalia laid, with great Ceremony, the first Stone of a Monastery she is about to build at her own Expence, not far from this City, for Nuns of the Order of St. Francis de Sales. The Investiture which was to have been given Yesterday to the Elector of Bavaria's Ministers, is, upon the Birth of the Arch-Duchess, put off to the 19th Instant. The Emperour has named five Velt-Marshals, viz. Prince Alexander of Wirtemberg, Count Tierheim the Commissary General, Count Rappach Deputy Governour of Vienna, the Count de Neubourg, and the Count de Vehlen.

*Paris, May 29.* Yesterday the Parliament of Paris took into Examination an Appeal of several Canons of the Cathedral of Rheims, and of some Parish Priests of that Diocese, whom their Archbishop has excommunicated for opposing him in the Affair of the Pope's Constitution *Unigenitus*, which he formerly accepted and still adheres to. And after M. de Lamoignon, the King's Advocate-General, had given his Opinion for the Appellants, the Parliament passed an Arrêt or Decree, by which the Proceedings of the Archbishop of Rheims are declared illegal and null; and he is sentenced to pay for Costs and Damages 100 Crowns to each Canon, and 400 Livres to each Parish-Priest: The Arrêt orders likewise, that an Entry made in the Register of the Faculty of Theology of Rheims, as if the Majority had agreed to accept the Pope's said Constitution, shall be cancelled; and that this Sentence of the Parliament shall be inserted in the Registers of the Officiality of Rheims, over against the Archbishop's Sentence of Excommunication of his said Clergy. The Princes of the Blood are very urgent that their Dispute with the legitimated Princes may be brought to a speedy Decision; and the King's Council of State having made an Arrêt, by which both the Parties are ordered to give in their several Pleas to the King's Council, by the last Day of this Month, this Affair is in a Way to be forthwith determined.

*Hague, May 28.* The States have now accommodated their long Dispute with the Elector of Cologne, who is to write them a Letter of Complement and Excuse, for what pass with their Garrison when it was obliged to retire out of Bonn. That Place is to be left almost in the Condition it is in at present; but the Fortress of Huy is to be demolished, and the Citadel of Liege, all but the Works next the Town, as they were before the last War. The Manner of paying the Subsidy to the States by the Austrian Netherlands, is almost adjusted, but the great Difficulty remaining is the Term from whence the Payment is to begin: The States would have it reckoned from the Day of the signing the Treaty of Barrier, and the Marquis de Prié only from the Time that the Emperour was put in Possession. The Difference is said to be between two and three hundred thousand Dollars. Letters from Wesel of the 25th Instant say, the King of Prussia was expected there the next Day, or the 27th, and would be at Guelders on the 29th; from whence he would immediately return to Cleves without going any farther: The Prince of Anhalt has waited on him in this Journey. The States of Holland will separate to Morrow.

*Vienna, May 19.* This Day the Bavarian Ministers received the Investiture of their Master's Dominions, so that the Electoral Prince and his Brother who have stopped upon the Road till they hear it is granted, are expected here very shortly: The former will be lodged at Court, and
