THE following Address having been transmitted from Antigua, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable Joseph Addison, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the chief Governour of his Majesty's Leeward Charibbee Islands, the Lieutenant Governour, Council and Assembly of the Island of Antigua, met at the Town of St. John's on the 29th Day of March, 1717.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Adrianople, March 26. The Marquês de Bonnac, Ambassadour of France, arrived here from Constantinople about the Middle of January, and kept incognito some Days before he made his publick Entry. On the Day appointed for that Entry, he went to a Fountain half a League from hence, where two of the chief Officers of the Court attended with some of the Grand Seignior's Horses. The Ambassadour mounted on one very richly accoutred, and his Retinue were furnished with others. He marched between the Chaouz Bashaw and the Selihtar Aga, preceded by a Company of Janifaries led by their Officers; another Company of Janifaries, with several Agas, marched on each Side of him, and his Led Horses and Equipage followed. A few Days after, he had Audience of the Grand Vizier, being received with the usual Ceremonies; and is shortly to have Audience of the Grand Signior. The Captain Bashaw, or Admiral, Janum Codja, has been put to Death, being charged with not doing his Duty in the Attack of Corfu last Summer. Troops are drawing hither from all Parts, and are to proceed to Hungary as soon as the Marching Orders are signified by the setting up the Horse-Tails.

Venice, May 21. Letters from Rome of the 15th Instant advise, that Don Carlo Albani being returned from Pesaro, Cardinal Gualtieri was ordered by the Pope to go thi-

ther. That on the 8th Instant died the Prince of Borghese in the 80th Year of his Age; and a few Days after his Son caused the Arms of France to be taken down from over his Gate, and those of the Emperour to be put up. Several Persons of Quality are gone from hence to partake of the Diversions of the Fair of Reggio. Last Week a Convoy with Recruits sailed from the Lido, and another is to put to Sea within two Days, for Corfu; from whence we have an Account, that the Fleet of Men of War of this Republick is sailed towards the Archipelago, under the Command of Sig Flangini; but the Captain-General with the Gallies remained at Corfu.

Vienna, May 26. The Letters from Peterwaradin of the 18th Instant say, that most of the General Officers were actually arrived at the Camp near Futack, and that Prince Eugene was expected there every Day, so that it is probable we shall soon hear of the Imperial Army's being in Motion. They write from Transilvania, that the Bulk of the Turkish Army is still near Adrianople, where they wait for their Artillery and Troops out of Asia before they will come forwards. The Princes of Bavaria had their Audiences of the Imperial Family on the 22d Instant; that of the Electoral Prince Charles was a publick one, but Prince Ferdinand's private. The Emperour received the former at his Closet Door, and made him sit down, as did likewise the Empreſſes and Archdutchesses. He is served and treated by his Imperial Majesty's Officers. The Troops they brought with them consist of three Regiments of Foot, and one of Dragoons, and make 6000 Men; they are paid by the Elector, and commanded by Count Maffé, one of his Lieutenant Generals, an Italian by Birth. On the 22d the Prince of Portugal set out for the Army, and was followed the 23d by the Duke of Aremberg, and the Prince of Dombes.

Lisbon, May 28. Yesterday was the great Procession of Corpus Christi from the Patriarchal Palace to the Cathedral: What appeared most remarkable in it was, that the Canons

Canons of this new Cathedral had all the Habits of Bishops, had a green Hat carried before each of them, wore a Mitre, and had their Trains born up by Priests; and the King with his Brothers Don Francisco, and Don Antonio, and about 600 other Knights of the Order of Christ, assisted at this Procession in their Robes, which is a White Crape Mantle with a Red Cross on the Left Arm.

Berne, May 29. The two Cantons of Zurich and Berne have lately received several new Propositions relating to an Accommodation with the Abbot of St. Gall, under the Mediation of his Imperial Majesty; but they persist in their Resolution of not accepting of the same, but to treat with the Abbot according to the usual Helvetick Method, without the Concurrence of any foreign Power, otherwise than by good Offices. It is reported, that the General Diet of the 13 Cantons which meets every Year about Midsummer, and has been held at Frauenfeld ever since the last War, is likely to assemble this Year again at Baden, the ancient Meeting Place of the Helvetick Body.

Dresden, June 2. On the 31st of last Month the King of Poland took a Review of his Horse Guards: This Morning his Majesty set out from hence for Carelsbad, attended by 24 of his said Guards; and he is expected back here about the Beginning of next Month. This Morning Prince William of Hesse-Cassel took Leave of his Majesty, and is preparing to return to Cassel.

Hague, June 8. The States having agreed upon an Answer to the King of Sweden, for the Justification of their Conduct in putting Baron Gortz under Arrest, it was carried by a Deputation to the Marquis de Chateaufeuf, the French Ambassador, on the 4th Instant in the Evening, and he has been desired to forward it to the Count de la Marcq, to be made use of at the Court of Sweden. On the 5th Mr. Whitworth, His Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary, had a Conference with the States, wherein they imparted to him the aforesaid Resolution, and conferred further on what related to Baron Gortz. Yesterday M. Preuss, the Swedish Secretary, was likewise called to a Conference with the States, to acquaint him with their Reasons for their not returning him an Answer in form to his Memorials, and for their giving that Commission to the Count de la Marcq. On the 3d Instant in the Afternoon, the King of Prussia set out from Wesel, on his Return to Berlin. On the 5th Instant a Valet de Chambre of the Empress's arrived here from Vienna in his Way to Portugal, with Letters of Notification of the Birth of the Arch-Dutchess.
