St. James's, June 21.

AN humble Address from the Shire of Caithness, has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Breadalbane, Heritable Sheriff and Justiciar of the said Shire.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Berne, June 19. On the 15th Instant arrived here a Deputy from Geneva, who is to concert Measures with this Canton for accommodating the Differences still subsisting between the King of Sicily and that Republick. This Canton has received Advice of a considerable Reform of their Troops in the Dutch Service, according to a Resolution of the States General of the 20th of last Month, wherein they urge a Necessity for so doing, as being obliged to reduce even a good Number of their own National Troops: This News has been received here with a general Dissatisfaction, because the said Reform is said to be contrary to a Capitulation made some Years ago between their High Mightinesses and this State, wherein it was stipulated, that the whole Body of our Troops should be kept on Foot even in Time of Peace. Letters from Milan of the 8th Instant say, the Governour of that Dutchy was gone to view Lodi, Cremona, and several other Places of that State; and that Sig. Molines, Great Inquisitor of Spain, who was lately seized there, was kept up so close, that he was not suffered to receive any Visits, nor had his Servants the Liberty of going out of the Castle to buy Necessaries without Guards. The Deputies of this State that returned hither lately from St. Gall, have made their Report to the Council of Two Hundred of what they did there, pursuant to their Commission; and it appears by the Information they took at the Convent, with relation to the Disorders that had been complained of, that what had been laid to the Charge of the Under-Bailiff's Son, who is a Citizen of this Place, was rather an Act of Indiscretion proceeding from too much Curiosity, than a premeditated Design of robbing the Chapel of some Relicks, as the Papists gave

out at first; and that the Bailiff himself, who is of Zurich, and who had the Keys of the Chapel and Choir where the Relicks were kept, was rather to blame, and ought to answer for what is missing, by Vertue of his Charge; the two Cantons aforesaid having had no Hand in the Disorders complained of. This Report has been referred to a Committee of Council, who are to draw up Minutes of what this Canton, in Conjunction with that of Zurich, intend to write to the Emperor, the Abbot of St. Gall, and others, for their Information, and in Justification of the two Cantons.

Cassel, June 21. On the 17th General Poniatowski arrived here from Sweden: Being chased by a Danish Frigate, he obliged the Master of the Vessel he was in, to run her aground near Dantzick: He was seized at his Landing by a Party of Dragoons, and carried to a Town in the Neighbourhood of Dantzick, where some Muscovites were quartered: An Officer of the King of Poland's being there, said he knew him, and propos'd to send him directly to the King in Saxony; but upon the Assurances he gave that he was a Frenchman, and had never seen the Bailiff, the Muscovite Officer who commanded in the Place, convey'd him safely out of the Town, because he produced the Czar's Passport. On the 20th he set out for Deuxponts, the Residence of Stanislaus.

Copenhagen, June 22. On the 13th Instant the British Merchant Ships with their Convoy proceeded up the Baltick from hence; and the Severn, a British Man of War, sailed to cruise in the Cattagat. On the 17th the King of Denmark returned hither from a Seat of his on the Coast near the Point of Steffens, and to Day he is gone to Fredericksburg. Some Days ago his Majesty was pleased to make four Knights of the Order of Danebrog, viz. Count Guldenstein, Lieutenant-General Sponeck, Lieutenant-General Boiffet, and M Gabel Secretary at War. Yesterday came in Letters from Sir George Byng, who lies off the Island Hapoe; he has detached some Men of War to cruise along the Coast of Sweden.

Vienna, June 16. The last Letters from Hungary say, Prince Eugene marched with his Army the 9th Instant from the Camp at Futack

Futack towards Titul; and that Count Mercy's Body of Troops marched from Denta on the 3d, and was advanced the 6th as far as Boccova near Titul, in order to join him; that the Prince's Design was to dislodge a Detachment of Turks that lay near Vivalanca, and afterwards to pass the Danube between that Place and Panzova, he having left a strong Garrison in Peterwaradin, and posted three Regiments along the Save. His Army is said to consist of about 60000 Foot, and 30000 Horse; besides 35000 Men more, which he leaves in Hungary, Transylvania and Walachia for the defence of the Frontiers. They have no News yet of the Turkish Army, and hope to obtain some considerable Advantage before it be drawn together. This Day the Admiral of the Fleet was sent from hence with two Men of War more newly built, and Yesterday 750000 Florins were sent to the Army. On the 14th Instant Count Sinzendorf set out from hence for Inspruck, and will be back again in 12 Days; and Count Schonborn, Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, having Leave to go to Schlanguebad, will set out towards the latter End of this Month.

Brussels, June 26. The Czar arrived Yesterday Morning at 10 a Clock at Namur, and continued his Journey at five in the Afternoon by Water to Liege, from whence 'tis said he designs to go to Spa.
