#### Westminster, June 22.

IS Majefty came this Day to the Houfe of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes feated on the Throne, with the ufual Solemnity, Sir William Oldes, Gentleman Ufher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Meffage from His Majefty to the Houfe of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houfe of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majefty was plea fed to give the Royal Affent to the following Acts, viz.

An Aft for continuing the Duties on Malt, Mum, Cyder, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred Seventeen; and to Authorize Allowances to be made to certain Receivers; and to obviate a Doubt concerning Goods Imported from the Islands of Jetley, Guesnley, Sarke, and Aldetney; and to ascertain the Duties upon Sheep-skins and Lamb-skins; and to prevent Frands in the Duties upon Starch; and for making forth Duplicates of Exchequer Bills, Lottery Tickets, and Orders lost, burnt, or destroyed, and for enlarging the Time for adjusting Claims in several Lotteries; and for preventing Frauds in the Duties on Low Wines and Spirits carried Coastwise.

An Att for continuing the Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or One Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, on every Pint of Ale or Beer that shall be vended or fold within the City of Edinburgh and Privileges thereof, for the Benefit of the faid City; and for discontinuing the Payment of the Dues commonly called the Petty-Port Customs at Edinburgh during the Continuance of this Att.

An Att for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or One Sixth Part of & Penny Sterling, upon every Pint of Ale or Beer that shall be vended or fold within the Town of Dumfreis and Privileges thereof, for paying the Debts of the faid Town, and for building a Church, and making a Harbour there.

An All for the Prefervation and Improvement of the River Wear, and Port and Haven of Sunderland in the County of Durham.

An AH for Repairing the High-ways from feveral Places therein mentioned, leading towards Highgate Gate house and Hampstead in the County of Mid-

dlelex, and for Electing Trustees for keeping up a fufficient Number for the Repairing the High-ways upon the Roads from Highgate Gate-house to Barnet Block house; and also of the High-ways between Kilburn Bridge, and Sparrows Herne in the County of Hertford.

An Att to enable the Parishioners of the Parish of St. Mary Rotherhith in the County of Surrey (by certain Funeral Rates therein mentioned,) to finish the faid Parish Church.

And to eight private Acts.

#### God fave the King.

Venice, June 11. On the 31ft of laft Month arrived a French Ship from Mitylene in 38 Days. The Captain reported, that the Turkifh Fleet was not come out of the Dardanels, but had been careened; and that he met five Ships from Barbary going to join it. Having touched at Zant, he learnt that Sig. Flangini was in the Port of Climino, with the Fleet of Men of War of this Republick, taking in Wood and Water, and a great Quantity of Salt-Provisions, in order to proceed

ceed into the Archipelago. This Account has been confirmed by an English Ship that is come in from Zant, which has alfo brought Advice, that on the 13th of laft Month the Pope's Squadron arrived at Cor-fu, where the Venetian Galleys, and light Frigates continue. Leiters from Dalmatia tell us, that Sig. Sebastian Mocenigo having reviewed all the Troops and Garri fons, has given Orders for making Incurfi ons into the Enemy's Country. On the 7th Inftant arrived at Lido from Parma a Battallion of 350 Men, which is to be fent next Week to Dalmatia. We do not hear of any Motions made yet by the Turks on the Confines of the Morea. By Letters from Rome and Naples 'tis advised, that the Por tuguele Squadron of Auxiliaries is arrived on the Coast of Sicily; and we are ex pecting to hear by the next Letters, that this Squadron is failed to join the Fleet of the Republick in the Archipelago.

Madrid, June 14. On the 10th came an Order from the Escurial, for the three Infantes to be carried thither : Accordingly they let out from hence this Evening. Sig. Aldobrandi, the Pope's Nuncio, has paffed through Alcala to the Efcurial, without coming to this City. A new Ship of 80 Guns was launched at St. Feliu in Catalo-nia on the 23d of laft Month, and all Diligence is used to get her ready to fail to the Levant, with the Squadron of 12 Men of War which is fitting out at Cadiz. Two Days ago arrived an Express, dispatched by Two the Marquels de San Phelipe from Genoa, with an Account, that the Governour of Milan had fiezed and put into close Confinement Sig. Molines, Inquifitor-General of this Kingdom, who was paffing through that Country, in order to imbark at Genoa for Spain.

## Whitehall, June 24.

His Majefty has been pleafed to appoint Jofiah Willard, Efq; Secretary of the Province of the Maffachusette Bay, in New England in America, in the Room of Samuel who has refigned that Woodward, Elq; Office.

This Day at Noon arri-Vienna, June 19. ved here an Express from Prince Eugene with Advice, that on the 15th he país'd the Da-nube at Panzova with all his Infantry, and was in all haste making a Bridge over that River, which he reckon'd would be finish'd in fo little Time, that he hop'd the whole Army would pass by the next Day in the E. vening. The Turks expected that the Prince would have first laid a Bridge over the River, which they intended to interrupt him in ; but inftead of that, he drew together all the Boats he could get, and put on board them 7000 Grenadiers, who pals'd and landed without Opposition, and fecured the Paffage to the reft of the Army. The Turks were drawn up on the other fide of the River, but retired in great Confusion, upon the Approach of the Grenadiers,

We have Advice from Adrianople, that on the 1ft Inftant the Grand Army of the Turks was still incamped near that City, but was to begin its March towards Belgrade on the, 3d : It was reported to confift of 100000 Men, but the Afiatick Troops had not yet joyned it, and it was then uncertain when they would come.
