THEIR Majesties, the Prince, and Infantes, continue at the Escorial. Sig. Aldobrandi, the Pope's Nuncio, having had six Conferences with the Ministers, was at length admitted to an Audience of the King on the 18th Instant: This Evening the Nuncio came hither from the Escorial, and is lodged in the Imperial College of the Jesuites. The Flota for New Spain, will be ready to sail next Month. The Squadron designed to serve in the Levant against the Turks is in such Readiness, that by the next Advices from Cadiz we expect to hear it is sailed.

Vienna, June 19. On the 17th Instant the Regiment of Hesse Cassel, consisting of 2300 Men, arrived here, and is commanded by Prince Maximilian, the Landgrave's third Son; Yesterday it was reviewed by the Emperour, and to Day is gone down the Danube to join the Army. The Emperour having spent six Weeks at Laxembourg, his Hunting Seat, left that Place Yesterday, and intends to pass the rest of the Summer at his Palace called Favorita in the Suburbs of this City. This Day the Empress Consort appeared in Publick the first Time since her lying in, upon which Occasion there were Rejoycings at Court, and all the Nobility appeared there in great Splendor.

Brussels, July 2. The Marquis de Prié, who proposed to go to meet the Czar at Namur, altered his Mind upon Notice sent him by the Count de Lanoy that his Majesty arrived there on the 25th past before Noon, and designed to proceed on his Journey the same Day. His Czarish Majesty immediately after his Arrival mounted on Horseback, and viewed the Fortifications of Fort Orange and the Castle, being accompanied by General Hompesch the Governour of the Place, who having perswaded His Majesty to defer his Departure till the next Day, he supped with the said General, and was afterwards at a Ball at Count Lanoy's. On the 26th in the Morning his Czarish Majesty set out from Namur, and passing through Liege arrived at Spa on the 28th. M. Viereck, who has been at the Court of France in the Quality of Envoy from the King of Prussia, is arrived here on his Way to Holland. Letters

from Vienna of the 19th past give an Account of the Imperial Army's passing the Danube at Panzova, below Belgrade, the 15th. The first Body that passed was commanded by General Mercy, and consisted of 15 Battalions and as many Companies of Grenadiers, which filled the Transports that had been provided for this Enterprize, and had two Ships of War to cover them; but they met with no Opposition. As soon as they were landed, General Mercy sent back the Transports; and in the second Imbarkation (which was of four Troops of Horse-Grenadiers and some Carabineers, besides Foot) Field-Marshal Heister, the Princes of Bavaria, and all the Volunteers of Distinction passed over. The Bridge, which was to be formed of 180 Boats, was to be finished in the Night between the 15th and 16th, and then the rest of the Army was to pass over. The Turks had a considerable Body of Horse encamped near the Place where the Imperialists passed in open Day, but the latter made so formidable an Appearance, that the Infidels, not daring to dispute their Passage, fled with great Precipitation towards Belgrade.

Hague, July 2. On the 29th past Mr. Whitworth, the British Minister, had a Conference with the States General, about the Detention of Baron Gortz; and on the 30th they communicated what had passed in the same to the French Ambassadour by a Deputation, desiring him to continue his good Offices for putting an End to this Affair. M. Preis, the Swedish Secretary, has received an Express from M. Poniatowski at Francfort, to let him know that Part of the King of Sweden's Affairs on this Side of the Baltick have been intrusted to his Charge, though he has brought no Letters, having been so narrowly pursued by a Danish Frigate, that he was obliged to throw his Packets over board, and to run the Vessel ashore to save himself. On the 28th past Count Reventlau, the Duke Administrator of Holstein's Envoy here, went to Aix la Chapelle. A Storch Vessel having some Time ago been brought by a Muscovite Man of War into the Texel as Prize, the Czar, on Complaints made, has ordered the Captain to carry her and the lading to England, that the Business may be examined and decided there according to Justice.
