Copenhagen, July 20.

THE Squadron of British Men of War continues in the Bay of Kiog, except some detached Ships that are cruizing. Sir George Byng has ordered the Barfleur, Cumberland, and Shrewsbury, to sail for England; accordingly they came to Elsinore on the 18th Instant, and will proceed on their Voyage home with the first fair Wind.

Dresden, July 21. The Corpse of Madame Royale, the King of Poland's Mother, has been buried at Lichtenbourg, near that of her Sister the Electress-Dowager Palatine, without any Pomp, as she had desired. On the 3d the King arrived from Carelsbad at Teplitz, and on the 16th came hither. Letters from the Frontiers of Poland tell us, that Field-Marshal Czeremetoff had received Orders from the Czar, to cause his Troops to march out of that Kingdom; and that he had actually marked out a Camp for their Rendezvous at Lissa; but which Way they are designed to march is not yet known.

Hambourg, July 23. The King of Denmark having left Copenhagen on the 10th Instant, passed from Odensee in Fuhnen to Coldingen in Jutland, and is reviewing his Troops in that Country, after which his Majesty will go into Holstein. We have certain Advice from Mecklenbourg, that the Russian Troops which have for several Months been quartered in that Dutchy, (except some which are left for a Guard to the Dutche's) put themselves in Motion on the 20th Instant, Part by Sea the rest by Land, for Poland, whence they are to proceed to Muscovy. The Russian Gallies, with the Forces on Board them, have already passed by Stralsund, and 'tis reckoned are now as far as Colberg; the Troops which go by Land, are to march in two Columns, one by Gustraw and Plauen, the other by Malchin.

Paris, July 28. The Duke of Chartres having obtained of the King an Order for the setting at Liberty the six Persons who were lately committed Prisoners to the Bastile and at Vincennes, for giving in a Protestation to the Parliament of Paris, against any Decision of the late Dispute between the lawful and legitimated Princes otherwise than by an Assembly of the States of the Kingdom, they were released last Week. The Duke of Chatillon, the Count de Chiverny, and the Marquis of Beringhen, fetched them from the Prisons, and carried them to the Duke of Chartres, who introducing them to the Regent, they made an Apology in very submissive Terms for what they had done, and were dismissed with Expressions of Favour. Some Dispute having risen about the Honours to be allowed at Court to the Prince of Dombes and the Count d'Eu, since the registering the King's Edict in Parliament on the 6th Instant, the Regent has decided, that whereas by that Edict they are debarred from those Honours only which they held in the

Parliament, they shall keep Possession of all others. The Countess of Stairs arrived here on the 21st Instant. We have Advice, that on the 12th Instant the Pope held a Consistory, in which he made a Promotion of two Cardinals, one of which he declared to be the Abbot Alberoni, the Duke of Parma's Envoy at the Court of Spain; the Name of the other he reserves in Petto.

Captain William Douglass, to be Captain in Major General Wynne's Regiment of Dragoons of the Troop late Lord Leslie's.
