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Falmouth, Manch 8.

Ere is at present in Port the Bonadventure of London, bound with Pilchards for the Canaries; the Olive-branch and Success of Plymouth, bound for Newfoundland. Two days fince arrived here the Falmouth Merchant laden with Oyl from Portugal, with another in her company, from the same place, both bound

Waymouth, March 11. A French vessel lately arrived in this Port from Charante, the Master tells us, that there were making ready about 20 sail of men of war, who it was faid, were fuddenly to goe to Brest, to joyn with those that are there fitting out, which with about 25 fail more, expected from Thoulon, may make up a Fleet of 60 flout men of war 5 he further fays, that the Fleet of Merchant men lavely returned from the East Indies, were riding under Belle-I/le, not having performed their voyage with that advantage to their Principals, as was expetted at their fetting out, which we have confirmed by another veilel come in here from Cherbourg; the Seamen moreover adding that several Barques and other small vessels are daily sent from those parts with Corn, Oats, and other Grain for Funders, for the subsistance of the French forces

Rome, Feb. 22. Several persons of Quality, who by the Popes appointment accompanied Don Pedro Arragon to the Frontiers of the Ecclesiastical Dominions, are come back again; and have given his Holiness an account that they left his Excellency in very good health, fo far advanced on his way towards Naptes, where it is faid he will not flay above three or four months in Quality of Vice-Roy, and then return to Madrid to be Governor to the King : It is reported that the Marquis d' Astorgas, ordinary Ambassador in this Court from the Crown of Spain, may succeed his Excellency in that Government, though some seem much to doubt it.

The Pope having some time since bestowed the Government of this City, upon Signior Bevilaqua; he hath accordingly taken possession of it, having been this day to attend the Pope for the first time, since

his admission into the said charge.

From Bologne we have advice, that there hath lately happened some distubance amongst the people, occasioned by the Cardinal Pulavicino, Legate of that Countrey, going about to encrease the Rates of Bread, infomuch that the said Cardinal had been forced to retire himself for some time, but that all things were at length well quieted again.

Vienna, Feb. 28. The 24th instant the Count de Rothal, together with several others of the Commisfioners, appointed by the Emperor for the trial of fuch of the Hungarian Nobility as were parties in the late rebellion, departed from hence on their way towards Presbourg, where they are to meet the

soth of the next month for that purpofe.

. His Imperial Majesty hath been pleased to grant a free pardon to the Prince Ragotski for all that is passed, provided he immediately pay 200 thousand Crowns to be employed for his Imperial Majesties fervice in Upper Hungary; that he fend the like fum hither, and that he quit all his right and pretension to the Fortress of Frenschin.

Here is lately returned Count Mansfield from Florence, where he hath been in quality of Envoye Extraordinary from the Emperor, extreamly fatisfied with his reception and entertainment in that Court.

In few days may depart from hence Monsieur Peris, designed Envoy from his Imperial Majesty to the Grand Signior; the Presents and other his necellary dispatches, being all ready to be put into his hands.

The Rebels in Hungary have made new applications to the Emperor for the obtaining their general pardon, which makes men judge, that they find their hopes of succor from the Port quite frustrated. We are told that the Emprels is with Child again, to

the great joy of this Court, and the people here.

Genoua, March 4. The 26th past arrived here the Ferusalem, Captain Wilshire, from Alicant, Cadiz, and Lisbonne, having been separated about 16 days fince in the Gulph of Lyons, by a violent storm from the Newcastle and Dragon, English Fregats, the for-mer spent her Main Mass, and as is thought, put into Port Mahon, and the other, as we hear, is fince arri-

Legorn, March 2. The Fersey Fregat, Captain Poot, is arrived in this Port from Zant, with 6 Merchant men under his Convoy, the Dragon Fregat lately put in here, may in few days fail again from hence for Argiers, where Sir Edward Spragg intends to be

likewise very suddenly.

Paris, March 18. The 14th instant the Marriage between the Duke de Ventadour, and Madamoiselle d' Haudancourt, second Daughter to the Mareshalle de la Motte, was celebrated at S. Germains by the Archbishop of Auche, Uncleto the young Lady, in the presence of the Duke d' Enguyen, the Duke and Dutchess de Longueville, and several other persons of the chiefest Quality, who assisted at that Ceremony, with much Splendor and Gallantry; which being ended, they were all entertained at Dinner by the said Mareshalle de la Motte, with all imaginable Magnificence. The Count d' Estree is some days fince arrived here from Rochelle to receive his Majesties directions for the disposing of those ships which were abroad with him, and which are at present in

Monsieur Friquignoni, late Envoye in this Court from the Duke of Savoy, is departed from hence on his way to Turin; the Abbot Digni succeeding him

in his employment here.

The 16th instant the new invented Bridge, made here by the Kings Order, to be taken in pices, and fet together again on the place, as occasion requires, and so become portable to follow the Army for their passing any River in their march, was shown to the King, who feemed very well pleafed with it, and hath ordered it to be laid up is the Arsenal, till the Troops begin their march.

It is here said, that Monsieur d' Almeras hath received directions to goe to sea with a squadron of 15 men of war, at present fitting out at Thoulon, to be employed against the Corsairs of Barbary; for the bringing those Pirats to a peace with this Crown, to

which they as yet have shown no great inclination. We are told that the Elector of Cologne hath lately fent to desire this Kings assistance and protection a-gainst those that would go about to keep him from the due possession of his right; but what answer he hath received in that particular, is not yet known.

Venice, March 7. This Senate is dispatching from hence a Felucca, with a confiderable fum of Money to the Proveditor General Barbaro in Dalmatia, to be employed for their service in those parts. Popes Nuncio here hath lately acquainted this State, with his Holinesles endeavors for the framing a defensive League between the Princes of Christendom against the Turkish power, to which the Pope declares his readiness to contribute what he may on his part, defiring this Republick to do the like, for the perfecting athing which so much tends to the quiet

and security of all Europe.

From Zant we are certainly informed, that Teveral Greeks having been lately apprehended in Maltha, upon suspicion of being spies; and being examined thereupon, they confelled they were hired by the Grand Visier, to pals in disguise through the Dominions of that State, to observe the fortifications of the feveral places, and where, and in what, they were defective, and at their return to report the same to him; which hath somewhat alarmed that Government, who easily discern some designe the Port hath, whenever a fit occasion offers to fall upon that Island. Our Letters from Constantinople of the 3 January tell us, that at present there seems to be less hopes then ever of quieting the disorders amongst the Janisaries, who still firmly adhere to the Sultanesses party, with so much violence, as almost to threaten the Grand Signiors death: They further add, That the Grand Visier had by several means endeavoured to perswade the Sultaness to meet him at a certain place without that City, in order, as he said, to an accommodation, but with intentions to have furprized her there, with those that accompanied her; but that the having had notice of the deceit, refused to come; since which she seems more averse then beforce to any propositions that are made her, seeing their only designe is, sinisterly to ensuare her and her sons. By freih Letters from Adrianople we are affured, that the Grand Signior intends very suddainly to pass into Asia, as well to avoid the Plague, which rages daily more violently in all those parts where he is, as to ease the Countrey where he hath continued fo long, and withal, to put those his Dominious in a fit posture to resist the Persians, in case they should attempt any thing upon them this Summer, as it is thought they may

From Chavenna on the borders of the Valtoline, we are informed, That the Swiffes have appointed a Diet to commence very speedily, to consider of several propositions lately presented to them by Monfieur de Molier, the French Resident there; who amongst other things, demands he may have leave to make some Levies for the service of his most Christian Majesty, seeing they allow the like liberty to

the King of Spain.

Hague, March 20. The States of Holland are at present assembled, and have amongst other things before them, the matter of the new Impolitions upon Corn when carried to the Mill, which they are now setling. The respective Officers are all gone from hence, in Order to the making their several Levies; some have already almost compleated their Companies; so that it is thought, a short time may fet a confiderable Army on Foot in these Provinces.

The preparations for the Fleet are carried on with all imaginable diligence, to the end they may be ready to put to Sea, by the time appointed by the States General. We know not here what to think

of the affairs of Westphalia, no likelihood as yet appearing of peace: From Lunenburgh they write, that Monsieur Verjus was arrived there, to endeavor on the behalf of his Most Christian Majesty, an accommodation between them and the Bishop of Munster, who we are informed is very much put to it, to provide Victuals and other Provisions for his Army, the Country being unable to quarter them any longer.

The Envoye from the Elector of Colugne to this State, is lately gone hence for Liege, to give his Electoral Highness, who is at present there, a more particular account of what hath passed in his Negotiation here about the restitution of Rynbergh, and to receive his further instructions how to proceed in that matter; we are told that the faid Elector having affembled the States of his Countreys, demanded of them a supply of Moneys for the carrying on his defignes against the City of Cologne, but that they seemed not much inclined thereunto; desiring rather that things might be fairly accommodated with that City.

From Vienna our last Letters tell us, That the Emperor had fent to assure the City of Cologne of his protection in this present conjuncture, and had at the same time likewise written to that Elector, desiring him not to attempt any thing upon that City by force of Arms, which would necessar ly disturb the present peace and quiet of the Empire, but tather proceed by the ordinary way of justice; what effect

this may have, we expect suddenly to hear.

The Duke of Lorrain as we are told, refides still at Cologne with his Family; the Count de Vaudemont is lately gone from thence towards Muniter, to conferre with that/Bishop, though upon what score is not known.

From Ratisbonne they write, that several propositions have been there made for the raising a considerable sum of Money for the providing for the security of the Empire; but that the Envoyes from the Electors of Brandenburgh and of Baviere, had made some difficulty in that matter, so that it was feared they might at last part without concluding on any

thing for the publick fafety.

Plymouth, March 12. This day arrived here three Vessels from the Streights, from whence they came under the Convoy of Sir John Harman, whom they left off of the Rock of Lisbonne, with the Fleet of Merchant men under his Guard; so that we daily expect to hear of his arrival upon these coasts.

Whitehal, March 14. On Sunday the 12th instant, the new Churchat Shadwel, formerly in the Parish of Stepney, and now made Parochial by Act of Parliament, and plentifully endowed by the Dean of S. Pauls, and Neal, Esq, was with the usual solemnity, consecrated by the Right Reverend Father in God, John Lord Bishop of Rochester, having been Commissionated thereunto by the Right Reverend Father in God, Humphrey Lord Bishop of London, as being in his Diocess, most of the Gentry of those Quarters assisting at the Ceremony; which being ended, the said Bishop of Rochester made an excellent and most learned Sermon upon that occasion, to the great satisfaction and applause of all that were there present.
