*Berne, Sept. 18.* The Commissioners on the Part of the Bishop of Porentru, and of this Canton, did, in their late Conference at Buren, agree upon a Project for an intire Accommodation of the Differences between them, on the Account of the Town of Neuveville, but referring their Agreement to the Approbation and Ratification of their respective Principals; which having been given by both Parties, there is a final and absolute Pacification of that Matter. The Tenour of this Project was, that the Canton of Berne should write first to the Bishop, to acquaint him with their Desire of seeing all Differences ended between them, and his Subjects of Neuveville restored to his Favour and their ancient Privileges, under a Promise on his Part not to suffer any of them to be infringed for the future; to which the Bishop was to return a positive and full Answer, importing his Promise and Consent to what they desired. This has been done accordingly on both Sides to their mutual Content, and to the general Satisfaction of the Inhabitants of Neuveville. This Canton has lately written a Letter to his Imperial Majesty, to congratulate him upon the great Victory of Prince Eugene over the Turks before Belgrade, and upon the Surrender of that Place; to which they add their Request for paying the Arrears due to their Troops, which have been in Garrison at Fribourg in Germany, and which his Imperial Majesty dismissed from his Service the beginning of this Month. They have likewise written to Prince Eugene upon the same Subject. The Troops of this State, which have been lately disbanded in Holland, arrived here some Days ago; but as they did not make above 200 Men, with their Officers, it is judged that the rest of the eight Companies which have been broken, have taken Service elsewhere. They were received here with the usual Formality, a Speech being made to them by a Counsellor appointed for that Purpose by the State, who thanked them for their good Service in the late Wars, and the Honour they had done their Country, and then discharged them from their military Oaths.

*Vienna, Sept. 15.* Our last Letters from the Army say, that Prince Eugene was going to view Semendria, in order to settle the Winter-Quarters; and when that was done the Army would break up, and the Prince come away; so that he does not seem to have any Thoughts at present of penetrating so far into Bosnia as was at first intended; or at least what may be attempted of that Kind towards enlarging the Quarters, will be done by separate Detachments. *Brussels, Sept. 20.* The Marquess de Prié has received Advice from Flanders, that the States of that Province are not only preparing for the Emperour's Inauguration, as Sovereign of the Austrian Netherlands; but for a Proof of their Zeal and Loyalty, have, on this Occasion, voted by a great Majority, a Subsidy of two Millions of Florins, and have appointed a Deputation of some of the chief Persons among them, to wait on his Excellency with the Act of Consent to this Subsidy, before that Ceremony is performed in their Province. His Excellency is extremely pleased with this Instance of that Province's Duty and Affection to their Sovereign, and 'tis hoped the Example will have a good Influence on the Province of Brabant, by disposing the Nations or Communities of this City to agree likewise upon a considerable Subsidy, though hitherto those Communities continue refractory. The Marquess de Prié gave Audience Yesterday to Deputies from the States of Brabant, who represented to him, that the Time appointed for the Ceremony of the Inauguration, which was fixed to the 27th of this Month, is too short; for, notwithstanding an extraordinary Number of Workmen are employed, they cannot be ready so soon with the requisite Preparations, and therefore they desired his Excellency to defer it a few Days; accordingly he has put it off to the first of next Month.

*Hague, Sept. 28.* Yesterday the Deputies of the States General, in a Conference with Baron Heems, the Imperial Minister, delivered to him the Resolutions which their High Mightinesses had taken, on the Points which still retard the Execution of the Barrier-Treaty; and they afterwards communicated the same to the Lord Cadogan and Mr. Whitworth, in another Conference. M. Pestiers, Minister of the States General, is immediately to return to Brussels to renew the Negotiations on the said Treaty with the Marquess de Prié. M. de Chareaneuf, the French Minister, has received Letters from the Count de la Marque, with Advice that Mr. Jackson has been set at Liberty, on Count Gyllenborg's Arrival at Gottenbourg; but having desired to stay some Time at Stockholm to settle his private Affairs, it has been granted him.
