toman Army were encamped with the New Grand Vilier Mahomet Nillangi Basshaw near Nissa; but the greatest Part of that Army had disbanded and difgersed themselves different ways; and a good Number of Janifaries having taken their Route by Sophia, had plundered the Shops without any Regard to the Sultan's being in Perfon there: There were various Reports concerning the Old Grand Vizier, fome faid he was put to Death, others that he was banished to Theffalonica. The New Vizier proposed to break up from the Neighbourhood of Niffa about the End of last Month, and to march towards Adrianople. The Imperialists are repairing the Fortifications of Belgrade where they have been damaged, and are strenghning them by the Addition of new Works on this Side of the Save over-against the Town: Particularly a Fort is to be made on the Point of Land at the Mouth of the Save, from which Part the Imperialists did most Execution in the late Siege upon the lower Town and the Caffle; and a Branch of the Danube is to be brought round on this Side of that Fort into the Save, and also Sluyces are to be made for laying the adjacent Country under Water for its greater Security on Occasion. By the Repartition of the Aimy's Winter-Quarters, there are to be in Garrison in Belgrade and the other Places upon that Frontier, 26 Battallions, seven Regiments of Horfe, and fix of Huffars: The reft of the Army will be quartered in Tranfylvania and Upper Hungary.

They having then had the Honour to kils His Majesty's Hand, humbly defired His Majesty to honour them with His Prefence at Dinner, and His Majesty was gracioully pleafed to accept of their Invitation, and to appoint next Sunday for that Purpofe. They were, by Order from His Majesty, entertained at Dinner by the Officers of the Board of Green Cloth, and returned to the University extreamly pleafed with His Majefty's gracious Acceptance of their Duty.
