WHereas Our Parliament stands Prorogued to the Ninth Day of this Instant October, We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be surther Provingued, on the said Ninth Day of this Instant October, to Ilursday the One and twentieth Day of November next; and We have given Order to Our Chancelor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for Proroguing he same accordingly. And we do hereby surther declare Our Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said One and twentieth Day of November, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burges of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said One and twentieth Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at Hampton Court, the Eighth Day of October, 1717, in the Fourth Year of Our Reign. God fave the KING.

itant, Dr. Grigg, Vice-Chancellour, attended by many of the Heads and Doctors and Mafters of Arts of the University, waited upon His Majesty at New-Market, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and made a Speech to Congratulate His Majesty's happy Arrival in these Parts, and humbly to Request the Ho-nour of His Majesty's Royal Presence at the University. To which His Majesty was pleafed to return a most gracious Answer. After which they were all admitted to the Hoof kiffing his Majesty's Hand, and were splendidly entertained at Dinner by His Majesty's Command. His Majesty having graciously accepted the Invitation, was attended hither on Sunday the 6th by the Duke of Kingston Lord Privy Seal, the Duke of Kent Lord Steward of the King's Houshold, the Dukes of Montague, Roxburgh, and Portland, the Marquess of Harold, the Earls of Sunderland, Halifax and Thomond, the Lord Viscount Lonsdale, the Lord Viscount Hinchinbrooke, the Lord Bishop of Norwich, the Lord Harborough, and other Persons of Distinction. At some Distance from the Town His Majesty was met by the Mayor and Aldermen, and the rest of the Corporation on Horseback, in their Formalities; and the Recorder having made a Speech in the Name of the Corporation, the Mayor presented His Majesty with a Purse of Gold: After which they had all the Honour to kife Hie Majesty's Hand. From thence they conducted His Majesty through the Town to the Regent Walk, the Streets being all the Way lined with Scholars, who saluted His Majesty with loud Acclamations, Vivat Ren!
