THIS Day Charles Greenwood, Esq; one of His Majesty's Commissioners of the Wine Licence, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn Clerk Extraordinary of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

Madrid, Oct. 11. Collonel Stanhope, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain, arrived here on the 7th Instant at Night. Yesterday he notified his Arrival to Cardinal Alberoni in Form, and desired to have an Audience of the King; who with the Queen and the Princes continues at the Escorial. We have no fresh Advices from Sardinia; an Express from Barcelona arrived last Week at the Escorial, but the News he brought is not made publick.

Genoa, Oct. 12. We have an Account from Sardinia, that on the 28th of last Month the Spaniards had not yet begun to attack Cagliari in Form: It is thought they either expected a Reinforcement of Troops, or Orders to retire. The Marquess de Malespina, who commands the Imperial Regiment of Hamilton, which lately sailed from hence, staid at Calvi in the Island of Corsica, till the 7th Instant, and then sailed for Sardinia. This Morning came in a Bark from Naples, with Advice, that on the 5th of this Month Count Daun, Viceroy of that Kingdom, sent off four Gallies with 700 Men to the Relief of Cag-

liari. This Republick has conferred the Dignity of Doge on the Marquess Benedetto Viale, formerly Envoy at the Court of Great Britain.

Vienn, Oct. 13. Prince Frederick of Wirtemberg, the Generals Count Wallis and Harrach, Prince of Bevern, and several the Officers are arrived from the Army. Prince Eugene having broke up the Camp, and sent all the Troops to their respective Quarters, left Semlin on the 6th Instant, and is coming hither; but as he designs to stop in his Way, 'tis thought he will not be here before the 20th Instant. Before his Highness dismissed the Army he received Advice, that a Body of 15000 Türks had fallen upon the Detachment of 3000 Imperialists which lay before Zwornick, and forced them to raise the Siege with the Loss of a good Number of Men and their Baggage. This Body of Türks is the same that a few Days before defeated 5000 Men of the Militia of Croatia drawn together by the Generals Hannibal Heister and Drackowitz. The Court is very much dissatisfied with those two Generals in this whole Affair, and the Council of War has sent for them hither to answer it. A Courier from Rome has brought Advice, that in a Consistory held on the 1st Instant the Pope promoted M. Csaki, Archbishop of Colocza in Hungary, to the Dignity of Cardinal, declaring he was the Person whom he had reserved in Petto at Cardinal Alberoni's Promotion. The Electoral Prince of Saxony has at last declared himself

A Roman-Catholick, the Pope's Nuncio having said publick Mass at his House two Days ago with great Solemnity; and now it is owned that he made his Abjuration three Years ago at Bologna to Father Salerno, a Jesuite. The Turks have sent an Aga to Prince Eugene, with Proposals of Peace: It is said they offer to yield up Temeswaer, and to give an Equivalent for Belgrade; but that is only a Report of some Officers lately come from the Army.

Berne, Oct. 16. M. D'Ayrolles, who has been some Time at Geneva, as His Britannick Majesty's Resident, arrived here on Thursday last, and set out this Morning for Basil, to imbark there upon the Rhine for Holland, being to reside at the Hague in the same Quality.

Dresden, Oct. 20. 'Tis advised, that the Czar has not only sent positive Orders to his Troops to retire out of Poland, but that they are actually on the March, Part by the Way of Lithuania, and Part by the Ukraine. On the 6th Instant the Czar set out from Coningsberg for Petersbourg.

Hague, Oct. 26. M. Bentenrieder, the Emperour's Minister, arrived here three Days ago; and having had several Conferences with the chief Persons of this State, set out for Rotterdam this Evening; in order to imbark for England. Count Reventlau, Minister of the Duke Administrator of Holstein Gottorp, arrived here last Night, and talks of going forward to Vienna in a few Days.
