THE Electoral Prince of Saxony has not yet been at Court by Reason of his Indisposition, which still continues upon him. In the mean while it is thought he uses his Endeavours to get the Ceremonial or some other Point he may have in View settled to his Satisfaction: As to his Marriage with one of the Arch-Dutcheffes, though it be generally talked of; not the least Step has yet been publickly made towards it at Court. The Prince of Portugal, after having lived out of Town ever since his Return from the Campaign, went to Court two Days ago to Compliment the Emperour on St. Charles's Day, and is to be lodged there again, as he was last Winter. We have no News from Hungary, but are expecting to hear what Enterprize the Detachment lately sent from Belgrade is gone upon. The Aga is not yet returned with the Resolution of the Turkish Court.

Copenhagen, Nov. 17. Yesterday in the Afternoon, Sir George Byng, with the Squadron of British Men of War, sailed from hence with a fair Wind for England. Three Frigates are left behind in the Baltick, to take under their Convoy some Merchant Ships which are still expected from the Ports there; and three Men of War are to continue some time longer on the Coast of Norway.

Madrid, Nov. 1. On Tuesday the 26th past in the Night, the King was suddenly taken dangerously ill at the Escorial. On his reviving a little from the Fit that had siezed him, he was desired

by the Queen to consent to his being removed hither; accordingly an Order came on the 27th for the Royal Coaches and Litters to be sent to the Escorial, and on the 29th, between Eight and Nine a Clock at Night, their Majesties came to the Palace here. Immediately all the Grandees in Town repaired thither, to pay their Duty to his Majesty, whom they found in a very weak Condition. Since that Time no Person has been admitted to see his Majesty, the Queen her self, with only an Italian Servant, the Cardinal and a Physician, attending and looking to him. The Duke of Escalona, Majordomo Mayor (or Chamberlain) having given some Offence since the King has been ill, has been commanded to depart the Court and retire to a Seat he has in Castile. An Order is published, for all Military Officers who are here, to repair to their respective Regiments within three Days, on Pain of his Majesty's highest Displeasure. On the 27th past Colonel Solis, Son of the Duke of Montellano, arrived in nine Days from Sardinia, with Advice of the taking of 400 Imperialists who had been sent to the Assistance of the Marquess de Rubi. Don Joseph de Amezaga, Major-General, is appointed Governour of Cagliari. Orders were lately sent for the building of eight Men of War in the Ports of Biscay, and six at San Felice in Catalonia.

Whitehall, Nov. 11. Repeated Informations upon Oath having been given to several of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, of an illegal Conventicle held at Dr. Welton's House in Goodman's Fields, as likewise that Arms had been seen carried into the said House, Yesterday be-
tween

between the Hours of Eleven and Twelve in the Morning, two Justices of the Peace, attended by some Constables and two Files of Musqueteers, went to the said House and demanded Entrance: Which being refused, the Door was immediately broke open, before the People who were above Stairs in the Conventicle could have Time to come down, or to make any Opposition. The Door was fastened with a Lock, Bolts, and an Iron Chain. In a little Time some Justices of the Neighbourhood came to give their Assistance. The Congregation consisted of about Two Hundred and Fifty Persons, who being required did all give in their Names and Places of Abode; but refused (excepting about Forty) to take the Oaths. The Doctor was examined first; who confessed that he did not pray in his Congregation for the King, and the Royal Family, as the Law requires, and refused to take the Oaths. After the Congregation was dismissed, a Search was made for Arms; but none were found. The Doctor and those of the Congregation who refused to take the Oaths, will be proceeded against according to Law.

Whitehall, Nov. 12. The Convocation of the Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, which stood Prorog'd to Friday last, was on that Day by His Majesty's Royal Writ further Prorogued to the 14th of February next.
