ON the 22d Instant two Spanish Gallies came into this Port from Sardinia, having on board the Marquess of San Felipe, and on the 24th they sailed with him for Genoa, where he is to reside as formerly in the Quality of Envoy of the King of Spain. The Marquess de Rubi and the Archbishop of Cagliari, passed by this Place incognito on the 20th for Milan. Mr. Davenant, the British Minister, is come hither from Florence, and next Week will imbark for Genoa.

Madrid, Nov. 22. Admiral Castanhera, who was reported to be sent lately from hence to hasten the finishing of several Men of War which are building in the Ports of Catalonia and Biscay, is now said to be gone to Holland, to view some Men of War which are building there on the King's Account, and which are to be brought to Cadiz. Don Francisco Zapata, Alcalde of the Court, who has been employed some Time in Valencia to dispose of the forfeited Estates in that Kingdom, is recalled from thence, and ordered to repair to a small Town 10 Leagues distant from this City, there to reside till further Order; the Reason of his Disgrace is not made publick. The Collegidor of this City is ordered to give Direction for the providing of Quarters for the Horse which are sent for hither. Sig. Mocenigo, the Venetian Minister, who has resided here for some Time, set out last Week for the Court of Portugal: 'Tis said he is commissioned by that Republick, to give his Portuguese Majesty Satisfaction, upon the Differences which happened this last Summer between the Commandore of the Portuguese Squadron and the Commander in chief of the Venetian Fleet. At the repeated Instances of the Marquess de Valdecannas, late Captain-General of Valencia, the King has nominated a Junta, chosen out of the several Councils of Castile, of War, and of the Indies, to examine into his whole Conduct while he had that Employment. Since the Arrival of Sig. Patino from Barcelona, Don Rodrigo Cavallero has been appointed Intendant of Catalonia, in the Room of Don Joseph Pedrajas. By the last Letters from the Havana, we have received a Confirmation of the Death of the Duke de Linares, Viceroy of Mexico.

Cadiz, Nov. 8. Admiral Cornwall is now in the Bay of Gibraltar. On the 20th past the Speedwell, a British Man of War, brought hither the Emperour of Morocco's Letters of Safe-Conduct for such Person as should repair to Mequinez with his Britannick Majesty's Commission to treat of Peace; which having been dispatched to the said Admiral by an Express, Captain Norbury is preparing to go to Mequinez. So that there is a Prospect of that Affairs being soon brought to a good Conclusion.

Lisbon, Nov. 30. On the 15th of this Month arrived here the Deal-Castle, a British Man of War, Captain Willis Commander, from Newfoundland; as did also on the 20th the Bridgewater, a British Man of War, Captain Fletcher Commander, from Cadiz. Sig. Mocenigo, a Procurator of St. Mark, came hither on the 27th Instant from Madrid, and 'tis supposed is to pass the Winter at this Court; but has not yet taken on him a publick Character. On the 28th the King and Court returned from Pedroços, to reside here. The Court of Spain has prohibited the Importation of Sugars, Sweet-Meats, and Cacao, from this Kingdom, on Pretence of their Wings and Brandies being prohibited here.

Berne, Dec. 1. The last Letters from Turin, say all was quiet there, and that there was no Appearance of any Preparations made to attack, or of Apprehensions of being attacked: That there are but 12 Battallions in Piemont and Savoy, 3 of which are in Valentia, 5 in Alexandria (which Place alone would require above 10 for it Defence) and 2 in the Town and Citadel of Turin: That the other 3 are distributed in Coni, Demont, Susa, Exilles, and Fenestrelles: And that all these Battallions have continued where they are for two Years past, without being changed. The King of Sicily has returned an Answer to the Letter of the Protestant Cantons in favour of the State of Geneva upon the Subject of the Tithes of Fonsenex; by which his Sicilian Majesty denies the Right pretended to by the City of Geneva, and justifies the Claim of the Curate of Fonsenex, on which the late Decree of the Senate of Chambery is grounded. The Deputies of this Canton set out Yesterday for Arau, to meet those of Zurich, in order to prepare Matters for the Conference which is to be held at Baden the 5th of January next with those of the Abbot of St. Gall.
