The western boundary of the Conservation Area is the edge of the Whitegate Church of England Primary School playground and is defined by a timber fence. Until the end of the fence where the boundary continues and is marked by a hedge along the line of ditch. Following the hedge line, which bounds the graveyard, the Conservation Area boundary then crosses Whitegate Road.
