deferring, by reason of the bad weather, we have of lare had here, his journey into Flanders till the 5th of May; it is not yet certain whether the Queen will accompany his Majesty, though some are apt to think She may. This day Monsieur Colbert goes hence towards Rochesort to visit the Magazines there, and give all necessary orders for the forwar-

ding the Ships that are there building.

Hamburgh, March 18. From Warfam our Letters tell us, that their Majesties of Poland were gone from Czentochom towards Cracom, to see the Salt Mines which are within two Miles of that place, and that they were expected back again before Palma-Sunday; they fauther inform us, that they had advice from the Borders of Russia, that those Rebets perceiving into what a desperate condition they were reduced since their late deseat by the Czars Forces, had cut off their General Stephan Radzins head and sent it to the Emperour, hoping by that means to obtain their pardon for what was passed; but this will need a farther confirmation.

From Vienne we are informed, that the Counts de Serin, Franchipani, and Nadaffy, who have been some time Prisoners at Leopold, being persons concerned in the late Rebellion in Hungary, were sent to Preshourg in order to their Trial, before the Commissioners by the Emperors order assembled there, but that not one of the Hungarian Gentlemen that were summoned by the said Commissioners to appear before them for the same purpose, have rendred themselves; so that we expect now to hear how they

will be further proceeded against.

From Restistance they write, that the Diet there had lately received an answer from the Emperour, to the Letter they write concerning the Complaints of the Elector of Cologne upon the States General of the united Provinces, refusing to reflore to the said Elector the Town of Rynbergh, in which his Imperial Majelty gives them full satisfaction, promising to write effectually to the said States about that matter, and to send Orders to his Resident at the Hague, to interpose vigorously in it.

Front Calagne, that the Levies which they were there making of 2000 were almost compleated; that those Inhabitants continue to work with great diligence at the Fortifications of the place; and that the Count de Vaudement was returned thither from Munster, where he had been to conter with that Bishop, though upon what Subject was not known.

From Hammelon; that the Forces of the Dukes of Lunenburgh continue still encamped near the River Weser, being ready to march upon the first orders; in the mean time that several Envoyes are there arrived from most of the Princes of the Empire, to offer their Mediation for composing of the present differences they have with the Bishop of Munster, notwithstanding which, there seems to be little appearance of a Treaty.

Higue, April 3. Monsieur de Louvigny, lately sent hither by his Excellency the Count de Monterey Governor of the Spanish Neatherlands, to inform this State of some things relating to the present possure of affairs, and to consult with them thereupon, having accordingly had several Conferences with these Ministers upon that Subject, is gone hence on his way to Brussels. Here is arrived the Count de Risaucourt on the part of the Duke of Lorrain, but what his errand may be is not yet said.

We are certainly informed that the Ships fitted out by the Admiralty of Amsterdam for this Summers Fleet are quite ready, and that the great Ships will with the first Spring tide fall down to the Texab for the taking in their Guns, Stores, and other Provisions. Here is a discourse of two several Bodies of Men, which this State intends to keep on

foot this Summer, the one to be encamped upon the River Iself, the other near Bergen of Zoom, to be ready to march, as occasion shall require, besides the 8000 Men in Maestricht.

From Covenbagen we are told, that that King had refolved to lend 6000 Men to the affidance of the Dukes of Lunenburgh, in case they were attacqued by the Bishop of Munster, and that he had to that end already nominated the Regiments to be ready to march upon the first warning, and given directions for providing Artillery and other necessaries for them; that they were building there several shout men of War, some of which were almost sinished; and that they were very intent upon advancing the Trade of that Kingdom, giving all imaginable encouragement to the Merchants, and endeavoring to draw in others to employ their Moneys in Trade.

The Magistrates of Amsterdam have fately confine cated several great quantities of French and other Brandies, to the value of above 60000 Gilders, imported contrary to the Orders of this State of Fanuary last, which will not a little discourage others

from offending in the like nature.

Don Estevan de Gamarra Ambassador Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain to this State, is as is said preparing to leave this place, in a Month or Six weeks, and to go to his Government of Ghent, which the Quoen or Spain some time since conterred upon him; who will succeed him in his Employment here is not yot known. From Vienna our Leavers tell us of the Emperesses having miscarried lately, to the great assistance of the Emperor and the whole Court.

Lyme, March 25. The 123 instant arrived streethe Samuel of this place from Crosseque, from whence she came in Company of about 50 Sail of French, and 9 English Vessels, the first bound to the Bastward, the others to the West of England, from Names, Rochet, Bourdeque, and other pares thereas bouts; that they had at their coming out, met with a wery violent Storm, in which masily of the French Vessels had been wracked upon that Coast, but that the English gained all their Ports, though not without some damage; they farther tell us of about 50 men of War that were making ready at Brest and other Ports on that Coast to put to Sea with the first Orders, that the French are lading there several Vessels of their own with Salt and Brandy for the Sound and those Northern parts, where it seems they would willingly be able to settle that Trade, so as to mannage it for the suture by their own shipping.

Whitehall, March 29. This Morning His Majefly, accompanied by his Highness Prince Repers, and attended by his Grace the Duke of Monmouth, and several other persons of quality, went hence for Newmarket, where His Majesty intends to pass a day or two, and to be back again by

Saturday.

This last Sessions, at the Old-Baily, Elizabeth Calvert was Indicted, Convicted, and Fined for Publishing of Seditious Books; and at the same time one Thomas Palmer a Book-seller in Westminster-Hall, was for the same Books, as likewise for another dangerous Book called Nehushan, also Indicted and Convicted, and by the Court sined and adjudged to stand in the Pillory, for Uttering, Selling, and Publishing of scandalous and seditious Books, knowing them to be scandalous and seditious. And to tend to the disturbance of the Peace of the Kingdom; according to which Order he received his punishmet the 15th instant at the Nome xchange, and on the 27th in the Palace-Tard at Westminster.
