Venice, January 14.

THE Day after the publick Devotions for the Christmas Holydays were finished, a Proclamation was published forbidding all Persons in Masks to carry Arms of any Sort, under the severest Penalties. The Captain of a Ship which is come from Corfu in six Days reports, that all was quiet in those Parts, that the Captain-General Pisani was careening all the Ships of the Line of Battle, and that General Schulenburg was preparing every thing necessary for making an early Campaign. Two new Ships of War of the second Rate are ready to sail with the first Transports to reinforce the Fleet at Corfu: A Convoy is preparing, and great Quantities of Ammunition and Provisions are putting on board; and Yesterday was put on board the fine Marble Statue of General Schulenburg, which by a Decree of the Senate is to be set up in the Market-Place of the Town of Corfu, in Memory of his brave Defence of that Place against the Ottoman Army and Fleet.

Vienna, Jan. 15. On the 20th Instant the three Regiments of Foot of Guido Staremberg, Maximilian Staremberg, and Wetzell, are to begin their March from Hungary to Fiume, a Port of Frioul in the Adriatick, from whence they are to be transported by Sea to the Kingdom of Naples. 'Tis advised from Venice, that they had an Account there that the Spaniards design to send a Squadron to cruise in the Adriatick, and hinder the Transportation of the Imperialists; which News does not a little perplex the Venetians, since in such a Case that Republick may be obliged to come to Hostilities with the Spaniards, as well for maintaining their Sovereignty of that Gulph, as for other Reasons.

Two Days ago the Affair of Rhinfeld was decided, against the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel; and the proper Orders are sent to the Directors of the Circle, for executing the Sentence, and putting the Prince of Hesse-Rhinfeld into Possession of that Fortress. Count Wackerbaert, the King of Poland's Minister, set out from hence four Days ago for Leipstick, where he is to meet his Polish Majesty, and give him an Account of the State of his Negotiations here. Count Schwerin, the King of Prussia's Minister at this Court, is recalled.

Paris, Jan. 29. On the 26th of this Month, the Deputies of the Parliament had Audience of the King, being conducted by the Marquess de Dreux great Master of the Ceremonies, and introduced by the Marquess de la Vrilliere Secretary of State. M. de Mesmes, first President, in a Speech to his Majesty represented to him what the Parliament had agreed upon. And his Majesty returned Answer, in very obliging Terms, that this Representation should be considered, and the Parliament should receive his Pleasure upon it.

Brussels, Jan. 26. On the 20th Instant Field-Marshal Count Vehlen set out from hence for the Court of Vienna, after having taken a Review of the two Imperial Regiments of the Teutonic-Master and of Baden, in order to make Report to Prince Eugene what Condition they are in; and 'tis thought they will be sent for to be employed in Hungary and Italy, there having been great Desertion from them since they came into this Country. Count Vehlen was recalled by the Court of Vienna, and will not return to command in Chief the Troops in these Provinces, because of the Differences that have risen between him and the Marquess de Prié. Adjutant-

tant-General Seva is expected in a few Days from Vienna, with a Plan which was settled at that Court on the 29th past, for the Administration of Affairs in these Provinces, as well Civil as Military, and for filling up all the vacant Employments. 'Tis already advised, that Counsellour Thifquens is appointed Chief President of the Council of State, M. Vander Ghote Treasurer-General, and M. Cuvelier Principal Secretary of State. As for the Military Employments, we have not had any Account yet how they are disposed of; but upon the Departure of Count Vehlen, General Count Wrangel Governour of this City, was provisionally appointed by the Marquês de Prié to command in Chief; and he has had some Conferences with his Excellency about changing the Imperial Garrisons. Yesterday arrived from Vienna the Count d'Aspremont, Son-in-Law to the Marquês de Prié; and the Marquês of Westerlo is on his Journey from thence likewise to come hither. 'Tis said the Differences relating to the Barrier-Treaty are in a fair Way of Accommodation, and that the Marquês de Prié is to go to the Hague to bring it soon to a Conclusion.

Hague, Jan. 28. Though the Resolution of the States of the Province of Holland to fit out 30 Men of War for the Baltick, was said to have been unanimously approved in the Assembly of the States General, yet we now learn that the Deputies of some Provinces, not being authorized for that Purpose, took the Matter *ad referendum*; so that the Consent of their Provinces is expected, before Orders are dispatched to the Admiralties to begin the fitting out of that Squadron. A Placard of the States of Holland has been published, for continuing the Tax of the hundredth Penny on real and personal Estates, and twice the hundredth Penny on all publick Annuities, and on Stocks in the East-India Company. The Deputies of this State and the Emperour's Envoy have newly had Conferences, for settling what remains to be executed of the Barrier-Treaty; their High Mightinesses Resident at Brussels having not yet obtained an Answer in writing to his Memorials, nor on the last Resolution of the States which was sent to him. The Prince of Portugal has not appeared in publick since his Arrival here, nor received any Visits.
