A N humble Address of the Principal and other Masters of the King's College in the New Town of Aberdeen, has been prefented to His Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Roxburgh, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Which Addrefs His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Venice, Feb. 7. The Weather being changed, and the Rivers open again, great Numbers of People come to the Carnival, among others of Diffinction are the Duke of Guaftalla and the Marquis of Lucini from Milan. A confiderable Number of Recruits are come to Lido, to imbark on the next Convoy for Corfs. The Senate have conferred the Title of Count on the Family of the Bruti Nobles of Capo d' Iftria, in Confideration of the Services which they have done for this Republick in the prefent War againft the Turks. The Proveditore-General Mocenigo, who continues at Spalatro, has fent Advice hither that the Turks are making Preparations to attempt the retaking of Preveza and Voniza; whereupon fix Men of War are ordered to take their Station in the Gulph of Arta, for the Defence of those Fortrefles, the preferving of which is thought to be of great Importance. Vienna, Feb. 12. The Emperour has deter-

mined to agree to a Congress without any Preliminaries, and to propose to the Turks Fetiflaw, a Town on the Danube a little below Orlova, as a very proper Place for it. S:r Ro-bert Sutton and Mr. Stanyan, His Britannick Majefty's Ambaffadours for the Mediation, have been defired to affift at a Conference to be held to Morrow with the Emperour's Ministers, upon this Affair. The Venetian Ambaffadour has been made acquainted with the faid Refolution of his Imperial Majefty, in order to his informing his Mafters of it, and defiring them to send Plenipotentiaries to assist at the Congrefs on their Part : Upon which he dispatched a Courier this Morning to Venice. It is refolved here to befiege as foon as poffible a Town called Bihacz, fituate upon the River Unna in Croatia, belonging to the Turks. The Place is ftrong by its Situation, and therefore a Body of fixteen thousand Men are defigned for that Siege, to be commanded by Prince Alexander of Wirtemberg. The Reason of making this Attempt now, is to fave the Expence of a Body of Troops, which is conftantly kept on that Frontier only to cover the Country from the Incurfions of that fingle Garrifon.

Berne, Feb. 16. The Deputies of Zurich are fill here, and 'tis faid will flay till every thing is adjusted between the two Cantons 5 for which end they hold frequent Conferences with the Committee appointed by the Sovereign Council of this State, and leveral Projects and Expedients have been offer'd on both Sides for adjusting Matters; and though the feveral Articles in Dispute are not yet lettled, it is hoped they will be foon, and that the Treaty will shortly be concluded at Baden, whither the Deputy of this Canton, who came hither lately to give an Account of the State of the Negociation, went back last Week with further Instructions.

Hague, Feb. 25. M. Fontaine, Secretary to M. Collier, Ambaffadour of this State at Conflantinople, who was fent hither fome Months ago, fet out this Morning to return to Turkey, with Difpatches from their High Mightineffes for that Ambaff dour. The States of the Province of Gelderland have feparated, without having given their Confent to the fitting out of the Squadron for the Baftick, the Confideration of which Affair they have put off to the 22d of next Month, when they are to meet again. To Day the States of Holland have nominated M. Hop, Son of the Treasurer, to go to the Court of France in the Quality of Ambaffadour from -this Republick. This Evening came Advice, that General Fagel died Yefterday at Sluys.

Whereas in a Paper Entitled, A Letter from a Livergman of the City of London to a Member of the Honourable Houfe of Commons, relating to the Coinage of Copper Farthings and Half pence, it is fet forth, That it may be made out to Demonstration, that the Nation is grossy impoled upon, ou Account of the faid Coinage; and that although other Perfons capable propoled to deliver in the Blanks equal in Geodness to those coined in King Charles the Second's Time, yet the Person under Contrast is suffered to deliver in Copper of Lis Value, by two Pence in cach Pound Weight, than the faid King Charles : The Lords Commissioners of His Majely's Treasury do bareby give Notice, that if the Rersons who published the faid Letter, or any other Persons, will attend the Treasury, and bring with them Blanks of fine British Copper, equal in Goodness to those coined in King Charles the Second's Time, and will ablige themselves to furnish Quantities of the fame Blanks at the fame Rates which are now paid, their Propolals and Performance thereof, there being no standing Constrast yet made with any Petsons, and those now employed being only upon Trial.
