Paris, April 8, We are certainly told, that Monfieur Magalotnis lately gone towards Italy, to raise two Regiments for the service of this King, one of which is to confift of two thousand men, and to be com. manded by himfelf: the King as is faid, hath-beftowed on the Prince de Piedmont, the Command of another Regiment of Foot, confisting of Twenty Companies, as likewise of a Regiment of Horle, and a Company of Gens d' Armes, to be all Savoyards, and to be railed forthwith in those parts.

We have advice, that the fix thips which lately. went hence on the account of our East-India Company for those parts, were in the late flotms difperst ed ; and that the ship on which Monsseur Guesson, who wasgoing in quality of Director-General for the faid Company, was embarked; having fpent all her Masts, lost her Cables and Anchors, and being extreamly torn and thatter'd, was with great difficulty, after having been for feveral days driven like a wrack upon the leas, at laft got into Rochel : that the day after there arrived two more of their company, in no better cafe then the former ; but that they had not yet heard what was become of the other three; all hands are fet at work to refit them again for fea, but that it is thought will require fome time.

The King is still with the Courtat Verfailles, and continues refolved to begin his journey the 23 inflant tor Flanders.

Hague, April 10. The time limited by the States for the railing the new Levies, being now expired, order is accordingly given for the general Multer, to which end the respective Officers are bringing their Companies together; it is faid the States have allowed 14 days longer for the compleating the Caval+ ry, when it is not doubted but they will be likewife ready. The, report which was lately fpread abroad of the States having refolved to raile 6000 men more, hath brought many Reformed Officers to this place in hopes of employment. Ihere having been a long and troublesome difference between the Count de Benthem and his Lady, in relation to their Children; whom it feems he would have brought up in the Roman Catholick Religion, which he had fince his Marriage himfelf embraced ; for the avoiding of which, the Countels retired with them into Holland, where notwithstanding all his endeavors for the bringing her back, or the recovering the Children, the hath fince remained; at which the faid Count having been highly displeased, hath proceeded against her in the Imperial Chamber at Spiers, where he hath lately obtained a sentence, That she ihall not for the future be acknowledged as Counteis of the Empire.

From Munster we are told, that the Envoyes which have sometime resided there on the part of the Dukes of Lunenburgh, seeing the little inclination there was to an accommodation, were returned home according to the directions they had lately received from thence, which hath somewhat surprized the other Ministers' which are at prefent there from feveral Princes of the Empire, who after all their endeavors for the composing these differences, find now less appearance of a Treaty then before; We are further told, that that Bishop in the mean time affures the States Minister refiding with him, that he defires nothing more, then the establishing the repose and quiet of Europe, and that thither all his endeavors tend , further adding, that the States shall on all occasions, find him most ready to serve them in all he may, without notorious prejudise to himself: from Lunenburgh they speak of nothing but raising of more forces, and that new Commissi-ons are daily given out by those Princes, who proceed vigoroufly in their military preparations.

His Highnels the Prince of Orange being for fome days paft, diversing himfelf with Hunting at Zuy-

lesteyn, within few miles of Utrecht, was there taken ill, and continued fo fome days, but having been let blood, it appeared a kind of Erifipile's which thanks be to God is now wearing off.

Hambourg, April 7. Some days fince here unfortunately happened a fire in the Market-place, which burnt with fo much violence, that in a fhort time deftroyed leveral houses, and would certainly have done much more milchief, had not the care of the Magiftrates, and the timely affiftance of the Inhabitants, who immediately flocked thither in multitudes, put a ftop to its furher progress, and at length happily extinguished it.

Bruffels, April 8. The 4th inftant his Excellency the Count de Monterey returned hither in great haft trom Antwerp, upon the Receipt of some Letters from Holland by two feveral Couriers; and yesterday morning his Excellency went back to Antwerp, where he only stayed two hours, and then feturned again in as great hast to this place; what was the occasion of his fo suddain going and returning is not known, but varioufly conjectured. It is faid that at his Excellencies being at Antwerpy he cauled two Captains to be committed to prison, for preluming to raile men there for the Service, of the States of Holland without his permission, , His Excellency hath given Orders for a fourth Moneths pay to the Souldiers, which they will accordingly re-ceive very fuddainly. This day it is faid his Excellency hath fent Orders to the Count de Grubendonck, who at prefent commands in chief the Cavalry at Liere, to be ready to march within two or three days, according to fuch directions as he shall receive from his Excellency to that purpose. It is faid that his Excellency hath received Orders from the Queen Regent of spain, to permit the French Troops to the number of 8000 men to pais the River Meuse near Namur, where preparations are already making for their pallage.

From Lorrain we are in the mean time informed that the French Troops are on their March hither; and that the Marshal de Crequi hath lately caused feveral places to be demolished, disposing of the Canon and what Ammunition he found remaining in them, according to the directions he had received from his most Christian Majesty in that behalf. From Cologne we are told, that those Inhabitants are not yet without apprehension of some design which is forming against them, and that therefore they omit no care to provide timely for the fafety of the Town. The Duke of Lorrain continues still there with his Family; the Count de Vaudemont is returned from Munster, where he was to confer with that Bishop. The Marquis de Trelon is returned hither again, to clear himfelf of what was objected against h im upon his retiring from hence.

Deal, April 2. The winds are very high here at South and Southweft, though without doing the leaft damage to any of the ships in the Downs, where there are at prefent fafely riding, eleven of His Majefties men of war.

This day happily arrived in the Downs, Sir Fohn Harman in the S. David, with some others of His Majesties Fregats, and part of the Fleet of Merchant men he had under his Convoy from the Streights, the reft not being as yet come up, but are hourly expected.
