Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

I must return you my particular Thanks for the Supplies you have so cheerfully granted and for the late Instance of your Considence in me. I pro-mise you that my Endeavours shall not be wanting to make use of both to the best Advantage for the Good of my People.
