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Buda, April 20.

SIR Robert Sutton, Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Majesty of Great Britain, as Mediator for the Treaty of Peace between the Emperour and the Ottoman Porte, arrived here Yesterday by Water from Vienna. His Excellency was saluted with a Discharge of our Cannon, and entertained at Dinner by the Baron of Lefenholtz, our Governour, and this Day proceeded on his Journey by Water towards Belgrade; where Baron Dahlman, the Emperour's second Plenipotentiary for that Treaty, waits his Arrival, and they are from thence to go to Passarowitz, the Place of Congress.

Constantinople, March 20. The Turkish Men of War and Gallies that have been fitting out in this Port being now in a Condition to put to Sea, the Horse Tails have been exposed as a Signal to the Officers and Seamen to repair to their Posts. Six Men of War that had been sent to the Archipelago to fetch Seamen and Ammunition from the several Turkish Ports in those Seas are returned, and have brought with them five Venetian Prizes, and a Vessel belonging to Malta which they took in their Voyage. The Barbary Squadron, consisting of 34 Ships of Force, is shortly expected, and when our Fleet has receiv'd that Reinforcement it will sail for the Archipelago, to encounter the Venetian Fleet. The Asiatick Troops which are to serve in Hungary this Campaign, are all arrived here, to the Number of about 28000 Men, and are forthwith to proceed on their March to join the Turkish Army. About 60 Saicks and other Vessels are getting ready in this Port, to carry a Train of Artillery and Supplies of Ammunition and other Warlike Stores up the Danube for the Use of our Troops in Hungary. All the Foreign Ministers are gone to attend the Sultan at Adrianople, except M. Bomac, the French Ambassadour, who waits the Return of a Courier he sent some Time ago to Paris.

Vienna, April 23. The Emperour held a Council the 20th Instant, in which the Instructions for his Ministers who are to transact the Negotiation for a Peace with the Turks were perfected; and Yesterday Count Virmond, his Imperial Majesty's first Plenipotentiary for that Treaty, went from hence towards Passarowitz. The Cavalier Ruzzini, Ambassadour and Plenipotentiary from the Republick of Venice, will set out the 25th on his Journey thither. By all our Advices from Turkey the Grand Signior and his Divan shew so good a Disposition to Peace, that there is all Reason to hope that Negotiation will in a short Time be happily concluded.

Stockholm, March 28. Baron Gortz came hither about three Weeks ago, and had several Conferences with our Governour, to consult upon the Means of providing Supplies of Corn, which is become very scarce in this Kingdom, and among other Methods agreed upon for that Purpose,

one was to oblige the Merchants of this City to send for a certain Quantity from foreign Parts; they were accordingly sent for by the Governour, and commanded in the King's Name to import 100000 Barrels of Wheat before the End of next Summer, upon Penalty of forfeiting a Rixdollar for every Barrel they shall fall short of that Number. They were ordered at the same Time to deliver forthwith 6000 Tun of Iron to the Chamber of Negotiation for the King's Service, for which they are to take Copper Mint Tokens in Payment. Orders are likewise sent to the Burghers of Gottembourg, upon the like Penalties, to import 50000 Barrels of Corn, and to deliver 5000 Tun of Iron for the King's Use. Some Libels having been dispersed here containing Threats against Baron Gortz, as one whose Councils have chiefly contributed to the Pressures under which the People suffer, he thought it convenient, during his Stay here, to have a Guard of Soldiers to secure him from any Insult. The King having desired an Interview with the Princess Royal his Sister, the Duke of Holstein, and the Hereditary Prince of Hesse, at Christinahamb, a small Town in the Province of Wermeland on the Frontier of Norway; the Prince of Hesse and the Princess accordingly set out from hence the 14th Instant, in order to repair thither; and they were followed the 18th by the Duke of Holstein and Baron Gortz. The Sieurs Trobelskoy and Gollowyn, two Muscovite Generals, who being taken Prisoners of War, have been several Years under Confinement, are lately brought hither, in order, as is said, to be set at Liberty.

Hague, May 6. The States General have notified to the several Provinces, that the British and French Ministers residing here have communicated to them a Project of a Treaty for accommodating the Differences between the Emperour and the King of Spain, and acquainted them that their respective Masters desire the Concurrence of this Republick in their Endeavours to bring this Negotiation to a good Issue, the Terms of which are already accepted by the Emperour. The States of the respective Provinces have accordingly taken this Matter into Consideration, and those of Friseland have already sent up their Consent to this State's concurring in the Measures proposed, expressing their Sense of the great Wisdom and Sagacity of His British Majesty and the Regent of France in projecting such Terms as are so adapted to the several Interests of the respective Powers concerned, that there is no Room to doubt but that as the Emperour has already done, the other Parties will cheerfully embrace the Proposal, and that we may soon see the Prospect of a fatal War in Europe changed into that of a solid and lasting Peace and Tranquility. The Marquis de Prié is daily expected here to put the last Hand to the adjusting of Matters relating to the Barrier. Baron Frisheim being lately appointed General of the Foot in the Service of this State,
