or intends to be at Constantinople very fuddainly at the Circumcifion of his oncly Son; notwithftanding fome omit not to perfwade him from hazarding his perton fo far in a place, where his enemies are fo ftrong and numerous; they farther fay, that the Grand Visier advises him not to suffer his Army to be idle any longer, but to employ them on fome occasion abroad; and that many apprehend, his intentions may be against Hungary, induced thereunto by the constant Sollicitation of those Rebels.

By a Barke arrived from Dalmatia we are told, that the Turks have lately demanded feveral import four Milions of Gilders they have refolved to take tant places in those parts, at present in the po on of this State, as Cattaro and Sebenico, about four miles from Ragousa, on we know no score, they have further defired, that the Garrison parture having been the more hastened, by the ad-which this Republick hath in feveral Frontier Towns vice we had of the approach of some French Troops in Dalmatia may be withdrawn, till fuch time as the towards those parts. The Heer Pieck, and the Heer matter of the Limits is finally determined, which Van Deefen, lately fent by order of the Council of affords much matter of discourse here, concerning the intentions of the Port towards this part of Christendom.

Bruffels, April 12. From Oftend we are told, that there were arrived 220 Spaniards from S. Schaftian, and that they daily expected the arrival of the reft, which were to make up 1500 men; the Joth instant his Excellency the Count de Monterey departed from hence towards Luxemburgh, intending to be back again very fuddainly.

Here hath lately been condemned to die an Officer, for having left the fervice here without his Excellencies leave, and taken command under the Bishop of Munfeer, according to an Order lately published to that effect, but the Count de Marcin, who in his Excellencies absence hath the chief management of affairs, hath tho ght fit to defer his execution till his Excellencies return, hopeing the follicitations of his friends may so far prevail, a to obtain his pardon.

The French Forces are at prefent about Philipville drawing down towards Dunk rke 5 in the mean time we hear of fome Troops that are marching towards Lorrain from other parts of France, as if his most Christian Majesty intended likewise to form a body of an Army to encamp in those Countries this Summer

From Munster our last Letters advise us, that that Bishop had caused one Collonel Bentnick at present in his Service, to be fecured and committed to prifon, upon a fuspition that he was treating with fome neighbouring State, to pais with his Regiment into their Service and to leave his, but it is generally thought, though this be pretended, that onely fome private milunderstandings between him and fome principal perfons about the Bishop hath occasioned this proceeding against him; they farther add, that a general Affembly is appointed to be held for the Circle of Westphalia at Bylefelt, whither the Bishop hath likewise lent his Deputies : it is thought the chief caule of their meeting is to confider of the present differences which disturb those Countries, and of the most effectual means to adjust them, and bring all parties to a peaceable agreeement.

Paris, April 15. Their Majesties are at prefent with the Court at Versailles, where they intend to remain till Thursday next, and then to remove to St Germains, from whence his Majesty will begin his journey into Flanders on the 23 instant, all things being in the mean time making ready for that purpose.

The Duke d' Enguyen hath received orders to repair with all convenient speed to Bourgogne, to be prefent at the Affembly of the States of that Country to be held the 28th inftant, in the room of the Prince de Condè, who by reason of the cerned are to take notice.

Gout with which he is at prefent very much as flict-ed, cannot himself be there, having upon the same account likewise excused himself from accompanying the King in his progress; the faid Duke d'Enguyen is to meet the King at Dunkerke to give his Majefty an Account of what hath paffed at that Meeting.

From Westpha e our last Letters bring us not any thing of news, fot l we know not what to judge of the affairs of thole parts; Monsieur Braffer and Monfieur Cuneas, Ministers at prefent refiding on the part of this State with the Princes of Lunenburgh and Bishop of Munster, are as we are told ac+ cording to directious received from hence, on their way home, more particularly, to inform this Government of what hath paffed in their negotiations there,
